

## RURAL ROUTES ARE APPROVED

All that is needed  
Opened is for the  
Served to Provide Mail  
proved by Department.

Through the efforts of Congressman French, the postal department has approved two of the three rural free delivery routes to be served from the Twin Falls postoffice. When satisfactory presentation is made to the postmaster, the third route will be opened. The routes approved are as follows:

Route No. 1,  
Beginning at the northeast corner of the townsite, runs three miles east to the southeast corner of 1-10-17, south to the southwest corner of 1-10-17, west to the southeast corner of 3-10-17, south to the northeast corner of the townsite, southwest to the southwest corner of townsite, west to the southwest corner of townsite.

to the southeast corner of 19-10-17,  
west to the southwest corner of 19,  
north to the northwest corner of 19,  
west to the southwest corner of 14-  
10-16, south to the southwest corner  
of 26-10-16, east to the southeast  
corner of 26, south to the southwest  
corner of 36-10-16, east to the southeast  
corner of 32-10-17, north to the south-  
west corner of the townsite.

**Route No. 2**

Beginning at the northwest corner

or the townsite, north-one-half mile, west one mile and north-one-half mile, the northeast corner of 7-10-17, west to the northwest corner of 7-10-17 east to the northeast corner of 4-10-17, south to the southeast corner of 4, west to the southwest corner of 4, south to the southwest corner of 21-10-17, east to the southeast corner of 21-10-17, south to the southwest corner of 3-11-17, east to the southeast corner of 3-11-17, north to the northeast corner of 2-11-17, west to the southeast corner of 2, north to the southwest corner of 10-10-17, west to the southeast corner of 10-10-17, west to the southeast corner of the townsite.

In order to facilitate matters, it is

necessary that 130 families on Route No. 1 should provide mail boxes of a pattern approved by the post department. For route No. 2, 135 families will have to provide suitable boxes.

Postmaster Greenhow has a list of the various kind of boxes which have

been accepted by the department as suitable for the reception of mail on rural routes and those who desire boxes should apply to him. The list in his possession contains a description and the price of each make of box. By clubbing together and ordering boxes by the dozen, the patrons on the routes will effect a considerable saving.

The routes will be opened so soon as the boxes are provided.

Contains Names of Hundreds of Entrymen Filing from all Parts of the Country—Washington and Idaho Furnish Many.

The following list of entrymen on the Salmon project is not official but is as complete as it was possible to make it at present. Nearly all the filings are complete but a few are being held up for correction. For instance, in the case of Mr. Scully of Lewiston, his brother, who filed for him, went through the "branding chute" without signing his contracts. He made the filing all right but neglected to sign all the papers. This was excusable in the crush and will not in any way invalidate the filing. It was such an oversight as might happen to anybody. With the exception of less than a dozen contracts, all of them are complete and ready for the action of the state land board. This is a splendid record, considering the enormous amount of work performed.

Those who have rebates coming will resolve their rebates when their contracts are approved by the land board. Every contract is sent in just as it stands. It will be from 30 to 60 days before the board concludes this work.

## HISTORY OF THE SALMON PROJECT

AND HOW THE ENTERPRISE WAS PROMOTED.

Took Time and Patience to Get It In Shape—It Has Received the Approval of Some of the Best Engineers in the Land.

The Salmon river project had its inception in 1904. John B. Hayes first saw its possibilities in 1904, while he was engaged in engineering work for the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. At that time Mr. Hayes was running a line for the high line canal. He noticed that on the east bank of the Salmon river, there was a pronounced "hog back" which prevented drainage into that stream from the east. He also observed that it was possible to build a dam at the site on which the Salmon dam is about to be constructed. Mr. Hayes first idea was to build two dams. The first retaining dam he concluded should be built near San Jacinto, Nevada, where there is an ideal reservoir at the junction of Shoshone creek and the Salmon river. Mr. Hayes' idea was to build the retaining dam near San Jacinto, which could be drained from the bottom, which would feed a secondary dam at or near the Salmon river bridge, where the present dam is now being built. The San Jacinto dam would hold the water back, and the secondary dam would raise it to a point from which the water could be distributed over the Salmon tract. Later, however, it was found that the San Jacinto dam would be unnecessary as it is possible to impound and distribute the water from the dam now under construction. Mr. Hayes made his first filing on the waters of the Salmon and its tributaries in the spring of 1906. He personally bore the preliminary expenses. Subsequently he interested Geo. P. Sprague in the enterprise. The necessary surveys were made and the land in the Salmon river canyon which will be submerged by the waters backed from the Salmon dam was secured. There were times when the outlook for the project was the reverse of encouraging, but Mr. Sprague and Mr. Hayes never lost hope, continuing their efforts until they encountered success.

The surveys for the segregation were made in 1907, being approved on August 12 of that year. The segregation was made by George P. Sprague, C. B. Hurt, H. L. Hollister and W. B. Perrine. It was worthy of mention to know that the preliminary surveys have been completely corroborated by the detail work which speaks very highly for Mr. Hayes' good judgment and engineering skill. Mr. Hayes estimated that the reservoir would have a capacity of 300,000 acre feet. The total surveys show that the available water supply which can be stored in the reservoir above the level of the outlet tunnel, based upon the minimum flow of the Salmon river will be 253,000 acre feet. The minimum flow of the Salmon this year is lower than it has been within the memory of the oldest pioneer, this being an unusually dry spring. The flow, however, will doubtless be augmented considerably by the rains and snow storms in the southern end of Twin Falls county, which have occurred during the last fortnight. The area of the reservoir is 3453 acres. The area is available for use above the level of the tunnel in the reservoir 300,000 acre feet of water, according to contour lines carefully run. This amount of water, of course, is greatly increased as the lines could not follow all the dips, curves, angles, holes and nooks in the Salmon Canyon.

The survey lines on the Salmon thus far extend 200 miles in length. The project has been examined and strongly approved by a number of noted engineers, among them T. A. Parsons, the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. A. J. Wiley and D. W. Rosa of the government reclamation service, F. C. Horne, formerly of the reclamation service, a consulting engineer at the Salmon dam; W. H. Rosencrans and others of the Blon J. Arnold Co., Chicago; Stewart Brok, of New York, one of the leading contracting firms in America; and other prominent engineers, all of whom agreed that it was one of the most compact and feasible projects they have ever inspected. Upon the strength of the reports made by these engineers, W. S. Kuhn and James S. Kuhn of Pittsburgh, who are at the head of the Twin Falls North Side Land & Water Co., were interested in the project and once they took hold developments followed rapidly. They have shown the same spirit in handling the Salmon dam project as they have in the North Side and those who have invested in Salmon land may rest assured that they will be supplied with water on schedule time. The Kuhn's never overreach and they live up to the letter of every undertaking in which they embark.

When the Twin Falls project was first launched it was due to the fact that the Salmon river project was financed the population of the Salmon river country above the dam was 200 souls. The country together with the few families around Rock Creek and the Three Creek country constituted the entire population of what is now Twin Falls county and which amounted to less than 200. What the increase has been those who are familiar with the country of today well know. The assessed valuation of what is now Twin Falls county scarcely made a mark on the county records prior to the inception of the Twin Falls project. This year it will exceed five millions.

What the people of Twin Falls, who are thoroughly familiar with the ground and are capable of grasping the merits of the Salmon project, think of the enterprise, is evidenced by the fact that while the preliminary surveys were being made, they filed up over 15,000 acres of desert land within the sec-

regation; on the chance that they would be able to secure water rights. Many of the desert claims will doubtless be watered by artesian wells; others will be originally irrigated, be irrigated from a reservoir which has been constructed on Deep creek, in the heart of the Salmon tract. All these claims are held by Twin Falls citizens who appreciate their value. What others think of the Salmon project is shown in the list of entries printed in this issue. It will be noted that "Twin Falls" occurs more frequently on this list than the name of any other place.

Cauterous view with regard to the development of the Salmon project. It deprives them of what has been their water range for many years, and while it does not exactly cripple them permanently it certainly retards their business on the building of the Twin Falls canal system which robbed them of a quarter million acres of range. Under the circumstances it is natural that they should look cross-eyed at the Salmon, although they are taking the development with good grace, doing what they can to assist.

## CAUGHT A MONSTER STURGEON

Great Capture Made by Three Hagerman Fishermen.

A live sturgeon, measuring 102 7/8 inches in length and weighing 675 pounds, was brought to Twin Falls on Monday by George A. Parton of Hagerman and placed on exhibition. The fish was kept in a big tank which was kept filled with fresh water. It lived for some time after it was exhibited and occasionally made things lively by showing signs of animation. Hundreds of visitors and local people inspected the plant and expressed their amazement that the Snake river could produce such a monster. As the hook was attached to a half-inch tin, this was a ticklish operation but George Parton, Art Montrose and Bob Hagerman succeeded in pulling the Jumbo of the Snake to a place where it could be loaded into a wagon and brought it to Twin Falls. Billy Colthard declares that the boys picked up one of the minnows which he was using for bait while fishing for trout in the Malad. He said that if people want to see some really big fish, they should come to Hagerman.

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The scramble for crumbs at the Salmon opening was amusing, if it did annoy. Towns which have been dormant for years suddenly woke up and clamored for business which might have been theirs long ago had they displayed the live spirit of Twin Falls. That they should have descended to trucking is deplorable, but they probably know no better, as their immediate condition heretofore would indicate. However, Twin Falls is big enough and generous enough to overlook all attempts to discredit the biggest and best irrigation enterprise on the face of the earth and it has too many friends who stand loyally by the right.

The citizens of Twin Falls should not be held responsible for the arrangements, or rather lack of arrangements, to care for the delegates to the Democratic convention. It was a mistake to bring the convention here at the time of the Salmon opening, but those who extended the invitation were unaware at the time that the two events would clash. However, that does not excuse those who were delegated to perfect the arrangements for their failure to do what they could. They should have seen that the delegates had no ground for complaint regarding the manner in which they were received and that they were provided with caucuses and committee rooms free of charge. The cold fact is that the members of the committee were so busy with their personal business that they could ill afford time for political work. It was an unfortunate happening and one which will not do the city any good in future.

## PROGRESS ON THE POWER-LINE

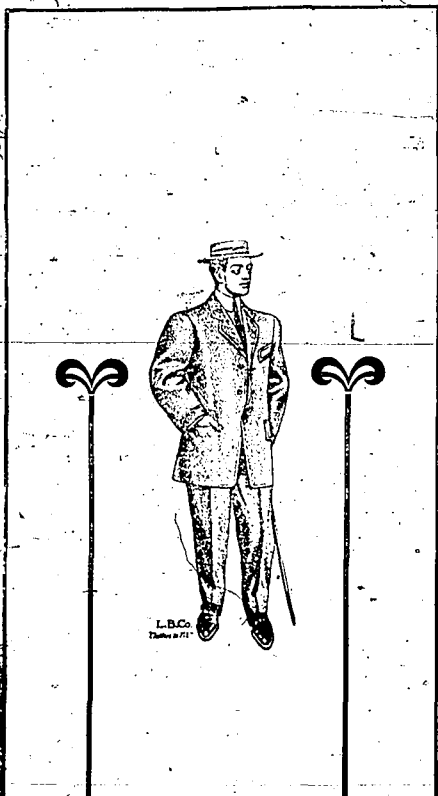

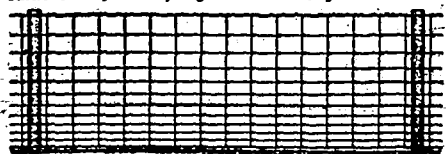
