UNIVERSITY MEN GET TOGETHER

Plan the Organization of a University Club in Twin Falls.

Twenty-five university graduates attended an informal meeting in the Commercial club rooms on Saturday evening for the purpose of considering the advisability of organizing a university club. Word was received from many graduates in Twin Falls and adjoining counties, expressing regret at their inability to be present and their hearty accord with the proposed movement. It was found that no less than 53 university graduates are located in Twin Falls and vicinity. Several more have since made their presence known and it is believed that the club could be organized with a membership of not less than 100.

Everett M. Sweeney presided over the meeting and John T. Henderson acted as secretary. A committee consisting of John T. Henderson (secretary), E. M. Sweeney, John D. Haughey, C. H. Chaffin, F. H. Sweetser and C. H. Hill was appointed to devise ways and means of perfecting an organization and to act as a temporary board of directors. The committee will meet on Sunday to discuss plans.

While nothing definite has been agreed upon, the plan most favored is to erect a club house in Twin Falls where all university men will be welcome and will find a home while they are not getting their start in the Gem state. High school is attracting an unusual number of young men from the universities, than whom there are no better citizens. Their presence is a compliment to the section of the state and it would be fortunate for Twin Falls were they to make this city their headquarters. VALUE OF ALFALFA FED STOCK

Is Highly Appreciated by the Nebraska Packers.

When a trial load of cattle sold in Omaha last week for \$20,000, being exactly \$8 per hundred pounds for every steer on board, the buyers for South Omaha packing houses said: they are among the finest ever brought to this market and are fattened on a mixture of corn and alfalfa.

The great packers have recognized that the alfalfa fed cattle are of superior quality and are doing all that they can to encourage feeders to mix the exact pound food with corn in such proportion as will enable the stock to utilize all the carbohydrates and oil in the corn. Those they cannot use without waste unless a protein ration is given as a neutralizer. To encourage feeders to take up this balanced ration as the best for cattle the packers are to have exhibits at the National Corn exposition to be held in Omaha next December, and will show in the case of meat the superiority of that from alfalfa-corn fed steers. It will be one of the most interesting exhibits ever shown at any exposition and the expense will be entirely paid by the packers.

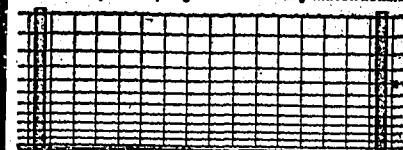

John Peters has set an example worthy of emulation by all other road overcrossers in the county. He is bound to check the practice of flooding roads with waste water in his district and he has the solid support of the public in his attempt to enforce the law. The man who deliberately turns his water into the road because he is too lazy to dispose of it as it should be disposed of should be made to pay for his indifference. The people are tolerant. They will give an offender all the latitude to which he is entitled, and more. In 99 per cent of the offenses, a few minutes' work with a shovel would prevent damage to the road. Every road in the county has chuck holes and mirey spots due to flooding and every road overcrosser should file a complaint against every man guilty of negligence in this respect. John Peters has set the pace and it is up to them to fall in line or confess their inability to enforce the law.

In connection with the proposed bond issue for the erection of a court house in Twin Falls county, it is well to consider in detail the various kinds of bonds and the cost of their redemption. What is commonly known as the "10-20" bond matures in 20 years with the privilege of redemption at the expiration of 10 years, or refunding. This is the kind of bond that the county would in all probability issue in the event that the taxpayers decide upon an issue. It bears 5 per cent interest and it could be sold at a premium of not less than 2 per cent. For the first 10 years the interest only is payable. This would entail an annual outlay of \$7,500, which would necessitate a tax of a trifle less than two mills on an assessed valuation of \$4,000,000. It would mean an annual expense of 90 cents to a taxpayer owning 40 acres of farm land, assessed at \$12 per acre, assuming that the assessed valuation did not increase, which is a ridiculous assumption. During the eleventh year, in the event that the bonds are not refunded, the interest on the entire amount and one-tenth of the principal must be secured. As the bonds are issued in denominations of \$500 each, 20 of them, aggregating in value \$10,000, would be retired during the eleventh year, and the interest on this amount would be stopped. In 11 years' time it is absolutely safe to predict that the assessed valuation of Twin Falls county will exceed \$12,000,000. That valuation is in plain sight. Every acre under the Twin Falls and Salmon canal systems will have been patented by that time and even though the Salmon tract were not doubled in area, as it unquestionably will be, the patented land alone will bring the assessed valuation of the county to \$12,000,000, not counting the improvements. A tax of one-half mill would wipe out the bonds after the principal payments become due, or a burden of less than 25 cents per acre on a taxpayer owning 40 acres. These figures are very conservative and show conclusively what the county is undertaking.
