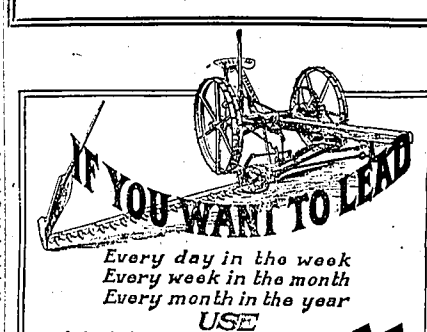
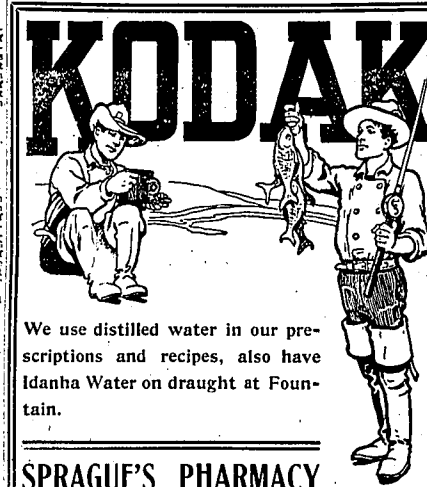

BIG PROFIT IN DEWBERRIES
 Emmett Farmer Receives \$1000 from One Acre.
 According to the Emmett Index, \$1100 is the amount received from the sale of dewberries from one acre by Andrew Jensen this year. To those not acquainted with the marvelous productivity of the soil in the valley near Emmett, the above statement may seem a fair tale or a dream of a rarest fiend. But it is true as gospel, and Andrew Jensen has the records to prove it.
 Two weeks ago the index gave the record of sales of strawberries made by the Warden fruit farm from half an acre—\$770 for 700 crates, or an average price of \$1.10 per crate. This was not a year for strawberries, but berries earlier, the cold, backward spring and late frosts cutting down the yield. The record of Mr. Jensen in raising \$1100 from an acre of dewberries adds emphasis to the claim that in this section of Idaho it is possible to make more money off 10 acres, than in the labor that is possible on an eastern farm of 80 or 100 acres. Neither the strawberry nor the dewberry story is an exceptional one. They are published here to induce other men to get out and run across them in his quest of news, and because both Mr. Warden and Mr. Jensen are in the habit of keeping a record of sales of their products.
 The dewberry patch is located on what is known as the Emil Johnson farm, a few miles southwest of town. It comprises 80 acres and was bought by the Jensen family for \$2000 for \$4500. From one acre the new proprietor has this year received 13 per cent on his total investment.

 W. P. Stark, president of the Missouri State Board of Horticulture, and James H. Gates, editor of the Western Fruit Grower, St. Joseph, Mo., will visit Twin Falls on August 8, 9 and 10. MODERN METHODS OF HUNTING
 It is Now Proper to Shoot Sage Hens from the Tannau of an Apron.
 In the place of the old Tannau John Hansen was a young spruce, Jim Flower a daring young vaquero and Luke Rice a dashing young blonde, the hunters were to search the notice of the true sportsman and the notion of the state. The approved way to big them was to knock them off with a stick or whip their heads off with a gun. The best method considered worth wasting ammunition upon. It is different nowadays. Vandalism is scarce, the antelope is almost extinct and the eagle has been moved up a few pegs in the category of sport.
 But to pursue the toothsome bird in his native style at present it is necessary to use an automobile equipped with a passionate red, guaranteed steady to wing and shot and not gunnery. The auto does not cut hay, nor does it get tangled by a fence, nor does it get or break away from its moorings and leave the hunter afoot on the desert. Still, it has its drawbacks.
 The first of these is the cost. John Maxwell, Ed Laverling, Chas. Chandler, Charley Mull, Allen Fisher and George Lacey were the first to introduce the new method of sage hen hunting in this section of Idaho. They started out last Sunday in two automobiles. In Charley Miller's car were himself, Charley Chandler, John Maxwell and Will Taylor. The rest of the party were in Mr. Laverling's car. The hunters were thoroughly equipped for the slaughter. They made the high trail on an excellent time and as they struck out southwest across the Salmon tract they began to worry about the disposition of the prospective game. It seemed so easy to slip the birds and get them in the net of his Shoshone basin in a few hours and flush every bird in that section of the county.
 But beyond Hubbs butte a rocky ridge was encountered and some of the party took light exercise removing stones from the road. The contour of the road also changed at the ridge and the party was with high ridges reduced the speed and called for careful guidance. By hard "shoving, rock rolling and copious use of the automobile's motor, Gay Traumer's farm on Soller creek, in about three hours. It dawned upon them at this stage that they would be unable to make the basin and get back to the Tannau. They decided to secure the vicinity of Soller creek and spare the rest of the hunting ground for some future excursion.

 Profiting by their experience coming out, the hunters reduced their speed to one or two miles an hour. Journey. That it was not possible for them to make the basin without any trouble but they were pressed for time. Two cars behaved nicely and the party was on its way to middling. They attribute their failure to find birds to the purring of the automobiles which, they believe, was the cause of the murmurings of gigantic rattlesnakes and caused the birds to lie close.
 These alleged facts were obtained second hand and are subject to contradiction by the parties concerned.

GOOD HOG PASTURE NECESSARY
 Various Crops Grown on Twin Falls Tract Make Good Feed.
 Experiments show that as much profit can be made from one acre of good pasture as from one ton of shorts or corn. The Minnesota Experiment station says that clover makes the best pasture in that state, but Professor Waters of Missouri says that it is not safe or even desirable to rely upon a single crop, excepting alfalfa where it is an almost sure success. The alfalfa grows throughout the season. He favors a succession of pastures from the beginning of the season until the hogs are ready to market, keeping the feed richer and more concentrated toward the close of the season as we approach the finishing or fattening period. For this purpose he recommends alfalfa, clover or alfalfa, cow peas and soy beans.
 It will pay the farmer who is raising hogs to provide a good pasture, and to make his hogs pay for their feed for clovers, cow peas and soy beans are rich in protein and make a good adjunct to any ration. The cheapest gains that can be made in hog raising are where the hogs are fed alfalfa and allowed to run on a good supply of either clover or alfalfa. Where possible to do so a pasture 1 to be preferred to any other feed. Hogs, not only in the interest of cheapened gains but also for the better health of the animals.

 There is No Better Investment Than Irrigated Land.
 The greatest rush of people today "back to the land," and all of them are looking for the best land. It is the influence of irrigation. Either burn or the inoperative coulee. Either burn or evaporate your waste water.

Still, the farmers who have to depend on canals to carry off their waste water might be able to sell their surplus moisture to the Twin Falls Waterworks company.

If that hole in the high line canal should happen to flood the cellar of the King of Spain, his majesty would have no trouble in finding an attorney willing to bring action for damages against the Twin Falls Land & Water Co.

How'll you handle your waste water, Mr. Murphy? Will you run it in the air or in the ground?

If you aren't mighty careful, Mr. Murphy, you'll find yourself in trouble, I'll be bound.

The civic wants of Twin Falls exceed the city's revenue by a large percentage. Under the law, the city council can appropriate only \$10,000 for the expenses of the ensuing year. This is less than half the sum which will be required to meet requirements.

The annual interest on the sewer bonds amounts to \$2400, not an unreasonable burden by any means. The salary of the police judge is \$600, city attorney \$600, city clerk \$300, a total of \$1500. It costs at least \$2500 a year to police, it costs \$150 a year for lights, or \$1800 a year. This gives a total of \$5200 for what might be termed fixed charges. The appropriation of \$2000 for streets and alleys is inadequate, but it is all the council can authorize. Nor can the fire department be maintained for \$500 a year. Not less than \$2000 could be profitably spent on the fire department immediately, but where is the money to come from? The appropriation of \$500 for public grounds and buildings is likewise insufficient. Under the head of miscellaneous, the council has appropriated \$600. It costs \$15 a month to flush the sewers and from \$160 to \$225 to sprinkle the streets, not including the cost of the water, which is \$1 per day for each sprinkling wagon in commission, which amounted to \$58 last month. Unexpected expenses are constantly cropping up. Last month, for instance, it cost \$424.50 to plank the Shoshone avenue bridge. A foot bridge across one of the main laterals on Shoshone avenue this month will cost \$75. It will thus be seen that lighting and sprinkling alone will cost the city \$3000 a year, for which there is an appropriation of \$600. Conservative estimates of the cost of running the city during the next 12 months show that the revenue is insufficient by one-half at least. Last year the city received \$2711.16 from licenses, \$806 from poll tax, \$550 from taxes, \$1616 from the county in road taxes and liquor license money, \$525 for dry licenses, and \$175 from miscellaneous sources (citrus and peddlers licenses, etc.), a total of \$6979.65. Should the county go "dry" next year there would be no revenue from liquor licenses. In any event, it is not safe to count on revenue in excess of \$6000 outside of taxes. Under the most economical administration the city cannot hope to hold its end up in the matter of civic improvements without a deficit of approximately \$8000 to \$10,000. These are facts which the citizens should bear in mind when they call upon the council to spend money. It will be necessary for the city of Twin Falls to obtain a special charter from the next legislature in order that it may keep pace with its growth.

ACTION ON WATER QUESTION

Will Be Taken by the City Council on August 17.

The city council has given the Twin Falls Waterworks Co. until August 17 to decide what it shall do toward furnishing the city with better water. Paul S. A. Bickel, consulting engineer for the Waterworks company, stated that the company would be willing to extend its mains to the "high line" canal and put in a filter bed system, provided it was assured that this would be satisfactory. If the city proposed to put in a competing plant, the Waterworks company would be hampered in its efforts to better its system. The company wished to find out what the people wanted, said Mr. Bickel, and to satisfy their wants.

The council requested the officials of the Waterworks company to meet the city officials on Monday evening, August 15, when definite action on the water question will be taken. E. A. Moon was given the contract for putting down sidewalks at 32 1/2 cents per running foot. The contract for planking the Shoshone avenue bridge was awarded to P. P. Curtis for \$424.50.

In order that the business of Internal sewer district No. 1 might be completed and the surplus money refunded to the property owners, George B. Fraser was appointed commissioner in place of C. P. Thomas, whose term of office expired June 1 and who is now out of the city. The compensation of the sewer commissioners was fixed at \$25 per month.

The budget for the ensuing year was passed as follows:
Salaries.....\$1600
Public grounds and buildings... 500
Streets and alleys..... 2000
Fire department..... 2500
Police..... 500
Interest on bonds..... 2400
Miscellaneous..... 600
Total.....\$10,000

This is all the revenue the city is allowed to appropriate on an assessed valuation of \$1,000,000, and is utterly inadequate for the growing requirements of the town.

MISTAKES IN FEEDING HOGS

Common Blunders Pointed Out by Kansas Expert.

J. F. Stratton told the Farmers' Institute of Franklin county, Kansas, of these 21 mistakes in feeding hogs:

- 1. It is a mistake for one inexperienced to undertake the feeding of hogs unless he expects to make a study of it and improve upon his mistakes.
2. It is a mistake for the city farmer, living in town, to trust the feeding of his hogs to the average hired man. He is not likely to make a success of it.
3. It is a mistake to try to raise hogs on an exclusive diet. You ask what kind of feed to give them. I will ask what kind of feed can be produced on your farm and in your locality, then give them a variety of it. These feeds should be given in such relation to each other as to meet the varied needs of the swine system.
4. It is a mistake to forget that the hog is a grazing animal.
5. It is a mistake if the hog is not fed in a clean place, free from both dust and mud.
6. It is a mistake to overfeed or underfeed.
7. Ordinarily it is a mistake not to feed the liquid before the solid food.
8. It is a mistake to feed constipating food and nothing to correct it.
9. It is a mistake to feed breeding stuff as if you were fitting for the market.
10. It is a mistake to feed all sizes together whenever the smaller ones are at a disadvantage.
11. It is a mistake not to provide the herd with comfortable quarters at all times. Failure to do this will impair the usefulness of the feed.
12. It is a mistake not to grow the pigs rapidly from birth to market. They should gain every pound possible on the way.
13. It is a mistake to feed the brood sow much corn before farrowing. She should have cooling and laxative foods.
14. It is a mistake to feed her heavily for some days after farrowing.
15. It is a mistake to feed her pigs sour food when they are learning to eat.
16. It is a mistake to fall to feed bone and muscle-forming materials during their growth.
17. It is a mistake to try to feed the pig or hog and the worms that may be in him or the lice that may be on him. And the hog would tell you so if he knew how.
18. It is a mistake if hogs are not fed at regular intervals.
19. It is a mistake, as a rule, to feed too many months before marketing.
20. It is a mistake to feed high-priced feeds and then market at a loss. Figure your probable gain or loss, and govern your feeding accordingly.
21. It is a mistake for any feeder to think himself so wise that he can learn nothing more.

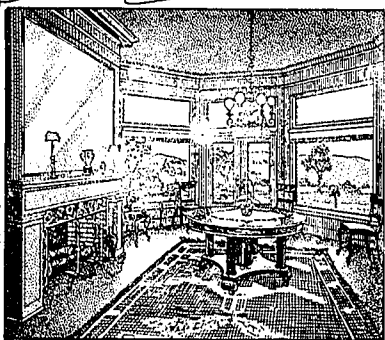

COULEES NOT WATER COURSES

Interesting Decision Rendered by Judge Walters.

A point of great interest to the Twin Falls farmers has been raised in his decision in the case of A. B. Bevelin vs. Henry Workman. It affects the disposal of waste water in so-called coulees which, Judge Walters holds, are not natural water courses and cannot be burdened with an unusual flow of water, or with any annoyance or damage of the land owner through whose property the coulees pass. Touching upon the question as to whether or not the defendant, Workman, has a legal right to use certain natural depressions locally designated as "coulees," which traverse the land of the plaintiff, Bevelin, for the purpose of carrying off waste water from the defendant's land, Judge Walters says:

"The testimony indicated that this 'coulee' was not a natural water course, but a depression made by the contour of the land and in which surface water flowed during the spring rains and the time of melting snows."

If the "coulee" in question in this case is a natural water course, that is a stream of water usually therein and flowing in a particular direction, with well defined channels and banks, plaintiff's land would not be injured by the flow of waste water in such "coulee" from defendant's land, but a natural water course does not include a depression in the land which conveys water only in the time of heavy rains and water that may accumulate from melting snows.

If at the time plaintiff herein selected and filed upon his land he found a stream of water flowing across the same or a depression that conveyed water from some natural source during the greater part of the year, the law will presume that he so selected his land with the fact in mind that his land was burdened with the flow of a stream of water, and if defendant's waste water did not so augment the natural flow to so extent that damaged plaintiff, then defendant would have the right in law to flow the waste water from his holdings across the lands of plaintiff; but where, as I view the facts of this case, the plaintiff's land, in its natural state, was not burdened with a flow of water in said coulee only during a few days during the year and possibly not every year; that is, during heavy rains and melting snows, the law does not subject plaintiff's land to the burden of a flow of waste water from the land of defendant, or any other source, during the entire year, or at such time or times as defendant selects to cause it to flow.

"If plaintiff may choose to cultivate the land with the best of soil, or apply it to any number of other possible uses, which the occasional flow of rain and snow water in the early spring of the year would not render impossible, and if he should so select, this is his privilege and right under the law, and defendant is not privileged, under our law, to defeat this right of the plaintiff by causing waste water to flow from his fields down, across and upon plaintiff's lands."

In irrigating one's fields, as in all other matters in this state, a citizen must use, control and care for his own property that its use by him does not injure his neighbor. If it is a hardship or annoyance to him to be forced to control the waste water from his fields, the law very rightly places this hardship and annoyance upon the author of the act himself, and does not shift the burden to the shoulders of his neighbor. His neighbor has the right to enjoy his own land free from any encumbrance or privileges in favor of another, except such as the law imposes, and the law does not impose any encumbrance such as is here sought to be invoked. Defendant exposed the flow of such a quantity of waste water by offering testimony that a part of this waste water was caused by leakage from the canal and over which he had no control, and for which, of course, defendant is in no wise liable.

CASH FOR ROADS AND SCHOOLS

Twin Falls Will Receive Revenue From Cassia National Forest.

Announcement has just been made of the amounts which each state containing national forests will receive under the new law giving 25 per cent of the gross receipts from forests to these states. The total amount to go to the states, from the receipts of the fiscal year which ended June 30, is \$47,663,775.

The amounts to go to each state or territory are: Alaska, \$2,684,78; Arizona, \$42,610,44; Arkansas, \$313,68; California, \$52,437,78; Colorado, \$50,855,97; Idaho, \$50,907,84; Kansas, \$645,55; Montana, \$75,807,41; Nebraska, \$2,345,77; Nevada, \$4,677,95; New Mexico, \$25,464,12; Oklahoma, \$65,448; Oregon, \$73,313,52; South Dakota, \$8,456,59; Utah, \$32,151,02 (including Uinta Indian refund of \$5,348,07); Washington, \$18,032,79, and Wyoming, \$41,402,58.

The law requires that this money be expended upon public roads and schools by the counties which contain national forest land. In this way the counties are compensated for the reduction of taxable area brought about by the existence of the forests. Before this year the states have received 10 per cent of the gross receipts, but congress voted last winter to increase the amount to 25 per cent. The Cassia national forest, which lies within the boundaries of Twin Falls and Cassia counties is one of the smallest in the state, likewise one of the most beneficial. What proportion of the receipts from the Cassia forest will be received by Twin Falls county has not been announced, but it will be as welcome as it is unexpected. Presumably the money will be distributed pro rata among the various school and road districts in the county.
