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MOST STUPENDOUS IRRIGATION PROJECT EVER UNDERTAKEN

Twin Falls South Side canal system to be extended west of the Salmon river to cover more than half a million acres between the Salmon and the Bruneau rivers--State land board has granted the segregation to the Buhl-Kimberly corporation and the Milner corporation, the two organizations which comprise the Twin Falls Land & Water Co.

The most gigantic irrigation enterprise in America had its formal inception in Boise on Monday, August 10, when the state land board of Idaho granted the Twin Falls Land & Water company's application for the segregation and extension of the main and high line canals of the original or south side Twin Falls system.

Negotiations had been pending for some time between the state and the Twin Falls Land & Water Co., which includes the Buhl-Kimberly corporation of Sharon, Pa., and the Milner corporation of Salt Lake City.

L. H. Sweetser of Burley is a candidate for lieutenant governor on the Republican ticket. Mr. Sweetser twice represented Cassia county in the legislature and made an excellent record as a representative. He served on the most important committees, was a tireless and effective worker and won the respect of all with whom he came in contact. The Republican party would do itself honor by placing Mr. Sweetser on the ticket. There is no stronger candidate in the state.

The news that Frank H. Buhl and his associates had been granted a segregation under the Carey act of more than a half million acres west of the Salmon river was received with acclamation in Twin Falls. The people in this section of Idaho have confidence in Mr. Buhl's ability to carry out his undertakings and they appreciate the fairness and liberality of his business methods. It would have been equally fortunate for the state had James S. Kuhn and W. S. Kuhn been intrusted with the great work. They are already in the midst of an expenditure of \$5,000,000 on irrigation works in Idaho, and as they are in the habit of doing things "on time," it would have been a heavy additional task to impose upon them. There is also a sentimental side to the case and it seems fitting that the men who courageously put up millions before they drew down a dollar, and who demonstrated the feasibility of reclamation work under the provisions of the Carey act in Idaho to the lasting benefit of the state, should be thus enabled to put the cap sheet on their operations by developing the greatest project in the history of irrigation. The development of the west extension will necessitate the extension of the Oregon Short Line from Buhl to the Bruneau river and thence to some point on the main line beyond. Those in position to know make the positive assertion that the Short Line will build from either Malad or Kelton to Burley and make this its main line, thus materially shortening the distance by rail between Ogden and Portland. The benefit to Idaho, and especially to the Twin Falls tracts, is almost beyond comprehension. With more than a million acres of irrigated land in a compact body, this section of the state will be the greatest agricultural and horticultural district in America. An abundance of cheap electric power will permit of wonderful development and the industrial features may be destined to divide honors with the farm production. It is a very alluring picture to which additional beauty is added by the fact that the men who are financing the work have the means, the experience and the determination necessary to consummate the gigantic undertaking. Another pleasing feature is the fact that millions of dollars will be expended on construction work in Twin Falls county and every town on the south side will profit by the circulation of the money. Furthermore, an assured home market will be provided during the construction period. Looking further into the future, it is reasonable to suppose that other transcontinental railways will be built through southern Idaho. With a million acres of productive land under irrigation, this section of the Snake river valley will offer a profitable field to railroads, and it is more than probable that the transportation facilities will be greatly augmented. It is estimated that the west end extension will cost not less than \$15,000,000. Capitalists who are shrewd enough to accumulate so many millions are not in the habit of investing them where there is an uncertainty of return. It has been fully demonstrated that there is no sounder investment than Idaho irrigated lands. While the cost of water rights under the west extension will not be determined until estimates of the expense of construction have been obtained, they will undoubtedly be so reasonable as to attract an army of land seekers which will make south-

ern Idaho the most densely populated and the richest portion of the state.

CONSTRUCTION ON THE SALMON DAM
(Continued from Page 1)

Two office and drafting rooms, two tanks of 18,000 gallons capacity each, store and postoffice, cement warehouse of nearly 10,000 sacks capacity, meat house, machine shops, rendering room, shower bath, hospital and an eight-room dwelling for the engineering force. The library and hospital are yet to be constructed.

A 350-foot well has been drilled at the camp and as soon as the pump is installed water will be pumped to the elevated tank, providing the camp with an adequate water supply under 40 pounds pressure. Hydrants located at convenient points about the grounds will furnish reasonable protection in case of fire.

All material, machinery and supplies are hauled to the camp by traction engine and train of 48 tons capacity. Three trips have now been made by the train. Aside from the difficulty of waiting quickly at Deep creek, these trips indicate that the usual drawbacks in considering so long a haul by teams will be easily overcome. As soon as the new road has been worked into better shape the trip to the dam will be made in about the same time required by teams.

All machinery used in the construction of the dam will be run by electricity generated at Shoshone falls. The poles of the high tension line are now all set and wires strung within a few miles of the dam site, so that that within the next 10 days this camp will have telephone connection with the outside world and the coyotes will wonder at the sparkle of electric lights in the open desert.

The arrival of the cable way, derricks, stone crushers, drills, concrete mixers, etc., is expected soon and the work of clearing and excavating the foundation of the big Salmon dam will begin the work to be rushed day and night.

The camp now has but 35 men and will be increased as rapidly as the installation of new machinery will permit. The camp is built for the accommodation of about 200 men.

Construction work is under the direction of F. C. Horn, constructing engineer, with E. J. Newell and Arch. M. Gilbert as assistant engineers. Cost keeping and stream measurements are under the supervision of

C. W. Joslyn, who has recently arrived in camp. Henry Lloyd, Wm. Taylor and L. K. Lyon, all from Pittsburgh, and J. E. Denloy of Tennessee, make up the force of roadmen and general aids.

The work of staking out the dam, locating the tunnel and mapping the camp and country immediately adjacent is progressing rapidly under the direction of Mr. Newell, who arrived in camp about two weeks ago.

Mr. Horn has for several weeks been located in Twin Falls attending to shipments for the camp and will soon take up quarters at the dam site. A. J. Wiloy, consulting engineer on the construction work, is expected in camp in a few days, when he will take up matters relative to the beginning of the work.

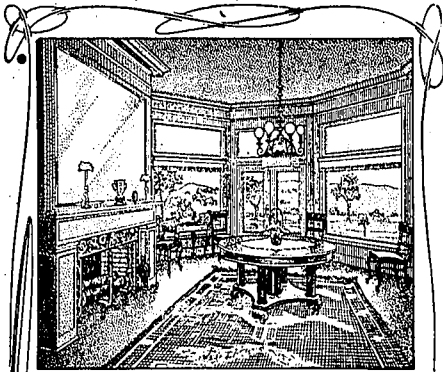

VISITOR'S VIEW OF TWIN FALLS

CITIZEN OF WISCONSIN FINDS MUCH TO ADMIRE.

Culture, Refinement, Thrift, Energy and Progress Appeal to Him, While the Spirit of Loyalty Arouses His Enthusiasm.

A. Decker, Pacific coast representative of The World Today, one of the leading American magazines, published in Chicago, spent several days in Twin Falls this week, noting progress and gathering data for a special edition of the magazine to be published in November, which will be devoted to the northwestern states, California, Idaho, Washington and Oregon will be covered. Senator Bohm will contribute a special article on Idaho and other noted citizens of the west will write on the advantages and resources of their states. two facts—(1) the resourcefulness of the country and a firm faith in its rapid development into wealth, and (2) an admiration of the public spirit of the people, who thus work together sensibly for the growth of their community. This public spirit and this temper of helpfulness attracts good men and makes them good.

Climate is an elusive thing. We enjoy it most when we realize it least. However charming the climate, there is always the question to be asked of us of more vital interest. What does it produce? How can I make a living? What are the profitable openings for a little means? These are questions that must answer themselves after investigation. There is no lottery here. The eastern man cannot put money into property blindly and hope to draw a prize. Success, after intelligent investment, will depend upon the individual.

I am often asked by my neighbors in Wisconsin, "What society shall I find in Idaho? What privileges does Twin Falls offer? What refinement and culture? What air of good breeding and good morals in which to rear my children?" The fact is, we usually find the kind of society that we want to find, and men and women are not far to seek in this new settlement as gentle in manner, refined in speech, as clean in life as can be found anywhere. Life is a little more joyous and light-hearted, I think. There is a little of the frontier of the picnic about it still, but that will take care of itself in time.

To no one has the marvelous growth of Twin Falls come as a great surprise or surprise than to the citizens themselves. They realized all at once that history, and big history too, was in the making. The first business of a western town is to increase its population. A land without a people is a wilderness. Getting a community grown to a spirit of harmony, to the appreciation of civic improvement, is the interesting task of the promoter. Its creation, its history, its independence, may help to explain the fascination. It is not facts merely that I have been looking for, but a perception of their significance. It is an amazing life that greets the visitor from the east. The vast variety of the farm and orchard products, the splendid crops of wheat, oats, barley, alfalfa and clover are a surprise to every newcomer.

I find this country often spoken of as "God's country." Rather it is woman's country, children's country. The country where people can live much of the time outdoors. Man's country, where the greatest progress of the race has been made in the briefest time, and whose beauty and riches promise to make it unequalled in the annals of the west.

Buhl first, Grilley of Hagerman second, Clark of Butte third. The judges were Joe Waters of Twin Falls, J. D. Wiseman of Buhl and Mr. Ingersoll. An Indian from the Fort Hall reservation came up to Pocatello to take part in the contest but was not allowed to ride. This created a storm of indignation among the spectators, especially when the Indian offered to ride on a horse they had provided, and pulling leather, and further that he would ride any of them bare back. He proved to be the best roper present. He roped several horses after the white men failed in several attempts. The Indian never missed a throw and received the applause of the spectators who witnessed his roping. As a last resort in order to get a chance to ride, the red man offered to ride any horse they had without hackamore or saddle, but he was denied the opportunity. Comment is unnecessary. There was no rule made barring anybody, and the Shoshone had corresponded with the managers here about the riding. He was told to come on and that he could ride if he wished. Let it go at that. After the riding was over the crowd started for the barbecue and went for the best bread as if they had not had anything to eat for a week. Many people were badly disappointed at the service and suffered considerable inconvenience. They were informed that the train would be held for three hours after regular leaving time, but it pulled out on time, leaving hundreds of people both from Twin Falls and outside points who were ill prepared to stay away from home over night, and for whom it was impossible for Buhl to furnish accommodations. The citizens did the best they could for the unfortunate ones, throwing open their private homes to the use of the strangers. What is worse badly needed on this tract is another railroad that does not belong to King Harriman.

The baseball game between Twin Falls and Buhl Sunday was a hot number and came near ending in a tragedy. The excitement was intense when Walter Luenz, the umpire, made a decision on a close call for the home plate that did not please anybody, players or spectators. He no sooner announced the decision than a howl went up and both sides rushed at him with bats and every other thing they could get hold of. Walt took to the tall sagebrush with Jim Patten close at his heels swinging a big stick. The last that was seen of the umpire he was making big jack rabbit jumps through the sagebrush. Patten returned to town without the umpire and when asked what became of the latter he replied that he was still in

the sagebrush. Jim's admirers patted him on the back approvingly and said that's the kind of work that will make straight umpires. Later it was learned that Walter turned up alive in Twin Falls.
