## FATHER AND SON DROWN TOGETHER

PERISH IN SNAKE RIVER WHILE  
FISHING.

Irving Schuyler Tupper of Twin Falls  
Drowns While Trying to Rescue His  
Son Who Fell Into the River While  
Fishing Near Blue Lakes.

Irving Schuyler Tupper and his young son, Charles Simon Tupper, were fishing in the Snake river, one-half mile above the Blue Lakes ferry, on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The father's body was recovered two hours after the accident, but the body of the boy lodged under a rocky ledge and was not found until Wednesday afternoon. Father and son were buried together in Twin Falls cemetery on Thursday afternoon, the services being held in Hunt's chapel. Rev. John Gourlay officiating. The chapel was crowded and the caskets were covered with flowers.

Tupper and his two sons, Charles Simon Tupper, aged 6 years, and Harry Wilford Tupper, aged 4 years, were fishing from a point on the south bank of the Snake river on Sunday afternoon. Charles had taken a position on a rock a short distance from where his father stood and had landed two fish. His father cautioned him to be careful and finally ordered him to leave the rock as the footing was insecure and he was likely to fall in the river. Scarcely had the boy been admonished when he looked around and, lost his balance and fell into the water which, at this point, is fully 25 feet deep. Tupper was in the act of baiting his hook when he fell into the stream. His fish line was tangled around his arms and hands when he leaped into the water after his struggling boy. With his hands entangled in the line, Tupper was powerless and in a few moments he became exhausted and sank. The boy had disappeared before his father could reach him, and when those who witnessed the accident reached the scene there was no sign of either father or son.

Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Gibson, who were fishing a short distance from the Tupper's, hastened to the rescue. Binding three fish poles together and using large hooks as snags, they did their utmost to reach the bodies, but it was two hours before Tupper's body was brought to the surface. Dots and ruffs were obtained and the search for the boy's body was continued until after dark on Sunday night.

J. B. Perrine placed his boats at the disposal of the searchers and the lumber for rafts. The Twin Falls Land & Water Co. brought down its diving apparatus from Milner and hurried it to the scene of the drowning. Mr. and Mrs. Tupper were employed by the company, and George Peterson of Kimberly, who worked with the diving apparatus at Milner when it was used there, were among those who helped to bring the body of the child, Francis Lettenot of Chicago, who is employed at Blue Lakes, volunteered to go down in the diving suit, although he has no experience of that character. He worked successfully on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, risking his life with every descent and ascending.

Walker, P. R. Gettys and others whose names have not been ascertained were assisting in their attempts to find the bodies.

On Wednesday afternoon one of the blue lakes became foul and fetid and the bodies were released. They were then taken to the shore and buried in the same place where the boy was buried. The father's body was buried in the same place where the boy was buried.

FATALITY ON SALMON.

William Paulsen, foreman on rock work at the Salmon river dam, was struck by a rolling stone on the railway which is being constructed from the rim rock at Edithville, and received injuries which resulted in his death in a few minutes. The accident occurred this morning. Paulsen was at work on the railway and had commenced to roll a stone when he was struck by a rolling stone which fell from the top of the dam.

Paulsen had been on the Salmon work for about six weeks. He came from Edithville, Iowa, originally, but had been employed on work under Engineer Horn's supervision for the past three years. He was a single man. His brother has been advised of his death and the body will be held pending instructions from Catherville.

## STEEL ARRIVES FOR SALMON DAM

LIKEWISE AIR COMPRESSORS  
AND DRILLS.

Material for Derricks and Caisway  
Expected Daily—Diamond Drill  
Work Progressing Rapidly—Rival

SALMON RIVER DAM, Aug. 26.—The drills and the big air compressor which is to furnish power for the same have arrived in Twin Falls and will start for the Salmon river dam site on the traction train today.

Constructing Engineer Horn is in town superintending the loading.

During the past week tons of steel material for the 14 derricks to be shipped in place the concrete were shipped to the dam site.



It would be interesting were the members of the state board of equalization to explain the theory they followed in cutting the assessed valuation of Twin Falls county over a quarter of a million dollars. The board should know that this will retard the development of the county. It matters not to the taxpayer whether he pays 10 mills on an assessment of \$1000 or 20 mills on an assessment of \$2000, but it does matter much to the growing school districts and the towns which must issue bonds to carry on improvements. If any discrimination is to be made, it would seem that the farmers' improvements should be favored that he may be encouraged to continue the improvements and thus add to the production. The improvements on patented lands in Twin Falls county were increased \$16,819, which is scarcely encouraging. The valuation of patented lands was reduced \$238,340. The lands can be sold at a handsome profit but the improvements can not, which makes the action of the board all the more inexplicable.

The Twin Falls Canal association has invited its members and all land owners under the original South Side canal system and those located on the first segregation on the North Side to join as plaintiffs in an action to secure a decree from the courts showing the priority of their water rights. Superfluous as this action might appear at first glance, it is really of vital importance and no land owner should hesitate to join. While the South Side water rights are nominally unassailable, it is well that they may be legally defined to avoid possible complication in future. So many filings have been made upon the waters of the Snake river that the legal status of all water rights should be established. In the upper Snake river valley, interchangeable litigation has resulted from the multiplicity of filings and failure to decree rights. In the case of the Twin Falls tract, nothing should be taken for granted. While it is possible that the rights of the Twin Falls land owners may never be assailed, it is well that the settlers should see that they are adequately protected.

## TAFT REPUBLICAN CLUB IS FORMED

BIG REDUCTION IN VALUATION

State Board Cuts Twin Falls County Assessment \$310,259.

The state board of equalization has played havoc with the Twin Falls county assessment roll, cutting the total valuation \$310,259, which places it at \$3,581,170. The latter figure does not include the railway, telegraph and telephone lines, which will bring the total above the \$4,000,000 mark.

The biggest slash made by the board was in the value of patented lands, which was cut from \$2383,391 to \$2,145,051, a reduction of \$238,340.

The value of city and town lots was trimmed from \$784,915 to \$667,177, a decrease of \$117,738. The farmers got it in the neck to the tune of \$45,819 on patent land improvements, which were raised from \$51,638 to \$137,457. Merchandise remained unchanged.

At a meeting of the governing board of the Twin Falls Canal association it was decided necessary, upon the best legal advice obtainable, to procure a decree from the courts showing the standing of the water right for the land on the original Twin Falls tract. This is necessary in order to secure the rights of land owners in case a dispute arises as to the prior right of the South Side Twin Falls tract over the surrounding tracts which have made claims on the waters of Snake river, or in case any of the surrounding tracts show a disposition to encroach upon the rights of settlers upon the lands of the South Side Twin Falls tract.

Every owner of land on this tract, which includes the original appropriation of 30,000 acres on the North Side, is invited to join as a plaintiff in this suit to be brought, and if he so joins the expense will be nominal. If he fails to join as a plaintiff he will be deemed a defendant in the case, making it necessary for him to secure legal help at a considerable expense.

The secretary of the Canal association will be in his office over the Commercial Savings bank in Twin Falls every Saturday from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. and will receive the names of all those wishing to be made plaintiffs and answer any questions to those desiring information.

The secretary has also been instructed by the governing board to call upon as many of the land owners as possible for him to see and give them an opportunity to become plaintiffs in the case.

Messrs. Stockinger & Bowen are the attorneys for the association and will conduct the case. They, as well as others who have given this matter much thought and study, consider an early action of the courts most important, and it is necessary in order that the decree be of benefit to any particular piece of land that the owner of that land shall signify his intention to join in the suit. The whole tract cannot be treated as a body, and the fact that your neighbor has a decree does not put your land in the same standing as his unless you are a plaintiff in the suit, so it is important to you that you are not overlooked.
