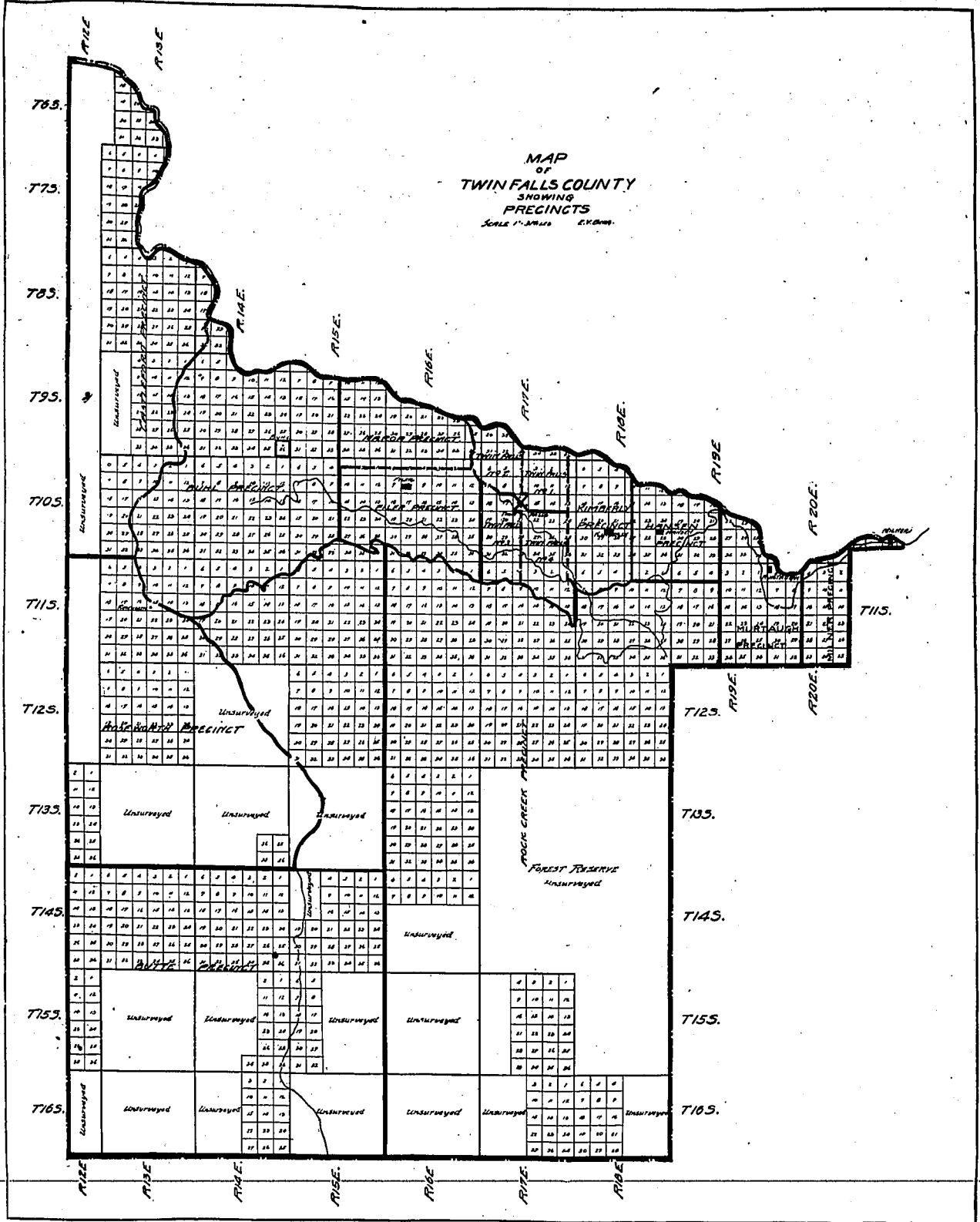

Windy Days are quite common in southern Idaho, but that does not justify the Democrats in putting one on their ticket. Still, they tried hard enough to do better.

At a mass meeting held on Tuesday evening in Filer, where there is considerable opposition to the proposed bond issue, some novel and amusing arguments, if such they might be called, were advanced by the opponents of progress. Filer is a good town, but it suffers from snob or barnacles and a dose of sheep dip would be a good remedy for some of the croakers. They are so busy hollering down other sections of the tract that they have no time to do anything for themselves or the town. It will be recalled that from Filer came the principal opposition to the division of the county. There are men there who would doubtless have tried to stop the immaculate conception had they lived at that time. The moss is so long on their backs that the birds could nest in it, and still they wonder why people laugh at them. They would have people believe that all the farmers around Filer are paupers who cannot support their families or educate their children. Perhaps they are foolish enough to think that such rot helps their town, but they have a monopoly of that sentiment. There are no better farmers in Idaho than those in the vicinity of Filer; nor are they paupers, as Mr. Allen, Mr. Carnahan and Mr. Munyon stated in the meeting. They pay their debts and attend to their own business and do not need such wet nurses as the men named. Furthermore, they do not roll the gross insults heaped upon them by the men who are making their living by the efforts of the farmers. From the tone of Mr. Allen's remarks it might be inferred that the Filer farmers sat on the steps of the Filer State bank day and night, waiting for a dollar to come in.

Mr. Allen said that over \$30,000 of the \$45,000 deposits of the bank was loaned out. Is he taking any risks in loaning money to the Filer farmers? If so he is not a good banker. It is a safe bet that every dollar of his security is good. He knows mighty well how the farmers are fixed and he shows very poor taste when he pleads poverty for them. They need no pleader. Read some of their crop returns in this issue of the News. If the Filer farmers are so poverty stricken as Mr. Carnahan, Mr. Munyon and Mr. Allen stated, how can they subscribe \$50,000 for a courthouse in Filer, as these three worthless have asserted they would do and are now actually trying to do? Why is it many of the leading farmers in the vicinity of Filer get their mail in Twin Falls? They are sick of the eternal knocking they hear every time they come to town; tired of hearing mossback lamentations. There are some progressive citizens in Filer but the town needs a few first class funerals before it will amount to much. Mr. Carnahan stated at the meeting that the county was misgoverned, but he offered not a scintilla of proof in support of his assertion. He insinuated that the county commissioners were crooked and would not spend the bond money honestly. What right has he to make such a break? So far as citizenship or any other trait goes, Carnahan is not fit to blacken Dr. Crocker's shoes, and if he thinks he can defame the bonds by trying to besmirch Dr. Crocker's character he is very much mistaken. If Carnahan had been nominated for representative on the Republican ticket, would he dare oppose the bond issue? Not much. He fought for the direct primary at the Buhl convention and tried to repudiate it at the Twin Falls convention. This is his measure of consistency. His statement that at the time the county was divided it was generally understood a courthouse would not be built for five years is perfectly correct. Nobody could foresee the remarkable growth of the county. Nobody dreamed that the business in the recorder's office would exceed that of any two counties in 18 months. What has Mr. Carnahan done for progress? Has he ever raised his voice or let go of a cent for the public good? Where are Allen's medals? Where are Munyon's monuments? Contrast their attitude with that of T. E. Moore, a man, every inch, who came out frankly and said he was willing to bear his share of the taxes. He is under no obligation to Twin Falls but he is a public spirited gentleman, big enough and broad enough to stand for the right, and when he wants anything within the gift of the people of Twin Falls they will remember how he stood on the bond issue and see that he gets what he wants. The people of Twin Falls are proud of the Filer community, proud to have such neighbors. Every capitalist who comes here is taken over to Filer and Sucker flat to look at the good farms. There are no poverty stricken farmers there; nobody living in tents or shacks. Nor is there any need of apology for the Filer farmers. A man has a right to his opinion on any public question, and a right to express his opinion, but he has not the right to attack the reputations of his neighbors without cause. Cut some of the anti-progressive weeds out of the town and quit knocking. It will pay better.

**WORK BEGINS ON SALMON TUNNEL**

TO-DIVERT-WATER-FROM-RESERVOIR TO CANAL.

Hand Drills Being Used Until Compressor Arrives—Traction Train and Automobile Are Making Good Time on Improved Roads.

SALMON RIVER DAM, Sept. 29.—Work on the tunnel which is to connect the reservoir with the main canal on the Salmon river tract has been started. Although the compressor has not been set in position, so that it is impossible to operate jumbo machines, it has been decided to go ahead with hand drills. Consulting Engineer Wiley has been in camp for the past two days, inspecting the work, and has made several important changes involving shifting of the southern section of the tunnel and an entirely new location for the concrete plant. According to this recent adjustment it is possible that none of the concrete plant will be located in the canyon since the length of the traveling cableway has been lengthened sufficiently to allow crushing and stacking over the east abutment. The slawing leading to the bottom of the canyon has been completed and makes the descent into the canyon a comparatively easy matter.

The work of stripping the dam site has just been started on the top side near the elevation of the top of the dam. A second crew is drilling up the large boulders lying in the bottom.

The traction train is doing better work all the time despite the fact that we are having considerable trouble getting water at Deep Creek. The road has been sufficiently improved so that the running time of the train has been reduced to 11 hours (distance 34 miles) and the best time for the automobile is 1 hour 55 minutes.

Mr. Brackett of Cedar creek is to take the contract for furnishing meat to the camp and will begin delivery about the 10th of October.

Within the next month it is probable that bids will be called for the stripping over the open cut between the two canal sections. The work will be done by teams and will amount to about 25,000 yards.

The paraphernalia for a weather bureau has just been received here. Mr. Alex. MacPherson, who visited the camp several days ago, stated that it had been decided to install a weather factory at this point and that a movement was on foot to locate several over the project.

W. M. Taylor of Pittsburgh has declined to return east, giving up his position here. For the past few days he has been up in the Contact count-down on a hunting trip but returned empty handed.

A. J. Lucker spent Sunday in Buhl on business and returned to camp yesterday.

D. H. Blakelock of Boise has been visiting the dam for several days as a guest of Assistant Engineer Gilbert.

Takes Over the Business of McCormick & Co., but Mr. McCormick Still Retains His Original Interest, to Which \$50,000 Has Been Added.

The Twin Falls Bank & Trust Co. took over the business of McCormick & Co. in this city on Thursday, October 1. The transfer is merely an enlargement of McCormick & Co.'s bank, the capital stock of which has been doubled, Mr. McCormick retaining one-half of the stock, the remainder being held by local people. The stockholders are W. S. McCormick, A. C. Miller and F. D. Kimball of Salt Lake City; C. B. Wintell, F. A. Voigt, I. H. Hill, E. Taylor, H. W. F. Guthrie, Henry Wall, Urban Tracy, I. Pettit, Chester Baird, A. McPherson, Mark Coffin, A. N. Sprague, J. McMillan, C. A. Taylor, H. C. Bench, M. J. W. Craven, R. C. Bench, M. H. Murtough, E. C. Lavering, Earl Hood of Twin Falls and George A. Baird of Chicago. This constitutes one of the strongest financial organizations that could possibly be formed in this country. All the stockholders are well known leading business men of Twin Falls and their names will be the strength to an already strong institution. The additional capital will enable the bank to enlarge the scope of its operations and will be the means of assisting in the development of the country.

W. S. McCormick is president of the bank, Fred A. Voigt vice president, C. B. Wilfong cashier and Carl Habu assistant cashier. The directors are W. S. McCormick, Fred A. Voigt, F. D. Kimball, T. O. Boyd and C. B. Wilfong. The bank will occupy quarters in the new building now being erected on the lot next to the present location.

In short, the decision was that only those elected in accordance with the law could be placed upon a temporary roll and participate in the temporary organization of a convention.

The court decided that the conventions of Ada, Bannock, Blaine, Boise, Canyon, Cassia, Custer, Elmore, Idaho, Kootenai, Latah, Lemhi, Lincoln, Nez Perce, Owyhee, Shoshone, Twin Falls and Washington counties were held regularly and in accordance with the law, but that the convention in Bonner, Idaho, which was organized by those appointed by the state committee men were adjudged to be illegal on account of the irregularity in their calling. The delegates elected to that convention were not recognized and their presence was given on that account to the other wing. The situation in Oneida was similar to that in Bear Lake, with the exception that the anti-Dubois delegates were elected at a mass meeting and were thrown out on that account. It was decreed that the delegates elected in Ada had the legal right over those appointed by J. H. Woodburn, and that Donnor has no legally elected delegate to the state convention, which left a total of 218 delegates.

In regard to the Democratic state convention held at Wallace in August, the law was not set into effect until the Dubois being presided over by McKinley and the anti-Dubois by McClair, the opinion reads:

The anti-Dubois convention could not convert a minority of the legal delegates into a majority by permitting the illegal delegates from the counties of Fremont, Blaine, Latah and Oneida to vote with said legal minority; neither could such legal minority, acting with illegal delegates, constitute the legal minority of the convention or preserve the identity of the convention, or take away the power or authority of the majority of the legal delegates entitled to sit in said convention.

"It follows that as the anti-Dubois convention, presided over by McClair, was composed of a majority of the legal delegates elected to the Democratic state convention, held at Wallace, Idaho, on August 4, 1908, it therefore was the Democratic state convention, and a ticket nominated by such convention and certified to as required by law should and will be recognized as the state Democratic ticket entitled to be filed and certified to the various county auditors to be printed on the official ballot at the general election to be held on the 3rd day of November, 1908."

Former Senator Fred T. Dubois, in defiance of the law, and evincing the same extreme disgruntled attitude which has been displayed by many other Democrats and which has discredited their party in this state, hurried the following stubbornly burning libelous trail:

"The supreme court decision does not change my views. I think it will not change the views of any who have made and intend to make the fight to free the state from Mormon domination."

"There is no difference between a Republican Mormon and a Democratic Mormon ticket. I will not support either."

**ELIMINATION OF SENATOR DUBOIS**

FORMER LEADER IS NOW LEFT WITHOUT A PARTY.

Supreme Court Decision, Placing the anti-Dubois State Ticket on the Official Ballot as the Democratic Ticket, Settles Him.

BOISE, Idaho, Sept. 30.—The elimination of Dubois from politics in Idaho, and as a result the probable retirement of the Mormon question as a factitious issue, was in effect the decision of the supreme court in the fight between the two opposing divisions of the depleted Democratic party yesterday. With the end of the odious conflict, which was a besmirching disgrace to a state with a record for cleanliness in her contests comes a sigh of relief.

In the decree written by Associate Justice Stewart and concurred in by Chief Justice Allright and Justice Sullivan (1) that the primary law enacted in 1903 is mandatory and that every right conferred upon a voter is a legal right which may be upheld and enforced by the court; (2) that a primary in state convention is not superior to the laws of the state, and neither can make rules and regulations in violation of the law, nor con-

**FARM TOPICS**  
BY WILLIAM HEWES.

(This column is open to all farmers in Twin Falls county who desire to express their views on agriculture, horticulture or any other feature of farming. They are invited to relate their experiences in growing fruit, grain or vegetables, or in raising stock.)

Frank Kosharek finished threshing this week. His grain was a good yield for this season. While it was not up to the standard of previous years on this tract, yet it was very fair. One field of wheat averaged nearly 40 bushels, while the whole yield was 25 bushels per acre. We give this yield, not because it is the largest to be found, but because it is an example for this year. Many yields are lower than this, while many are much higher. The crop was drilled in early in the spring. The ground was first well harrowed, the grain drilled in, then corrugated. The grain was irrigated three times during the growing season. The point which we wish our readers to notice

is the early drilling of the grain. We have investigated this matter carefully and find in nearly every case that late wheat gave a light yield.

Dan Conner had a field of oats which thrashed out 1650 bushels of oats, or an average of 324 bushels per acre. His estimates that he fed about 30 bushels in the bundle to horses. This would give an average of 84 bushels. These oats were drilled in the last of March. The ground was well harrowed, leveled, then three bushels of seed drilled in, then the ground corrugated. This was also the third crop of grain to be raised on the same ground. The grain was irrigated three times. The oats were harvested the last of August. The two points to be noticed here are the early seeding and the heavy amount of seed used. Owing to the peculiar condition of the season this spring, grain did not root well. It took a larger amount of seed to produce a good stand on the ground. Mr. Conner's wheat averaged 35 bushels straight through. On the last 10 acres he ran short of seed so that this amount of ground had a little less than a bushel to the acre. When we take off for the shortage of seed the average was about 30 bushels per acre. Some of this wheat was sown in February and the remainder early in March. It received the same method of cultivation and watering as Mr. Conner's oats. The fact that so much

of the wheat was sown in February is worthy of note.

A few days ago the writer made a trip through the Snake river canyon from Clark's grade to Clear Lake. For a short distance on the trip we took the old Oregon trail. As we followed the thread-like trail over hills and across countless the struggles of the past came before our mind, a panorama, as it were, of the past. At one point, 80 rods to our right, were the graves of four heroes of the early days. They had undoubtedly perished in a conflict with the red man. This is only one incident of the many conflicts and many lives which were lost to develop the great inland empire which is now our heritage.

We passed the Squires and the Newton ranches, which comprise several hundred acres of choice peach and apple land. Several thousand trees have been set this year. It is the purpose of these gentlemen to put out the entire tract to commercial orchards. On the Squires ranch we saw one field of 40 acres of cantaloupes and watermelons. They were very fine, in fact equal to anything produced in any locality. We visited the Smalley ranch, the Madolens ranch, the Bridges ranch, Clear Lake and the Daek ranch. It is not our purpose to describe each ranch or discuss separately the fruit-raised on each ranch but treat the subject as a whole.

The orchards on these ranches varied in size from five acres, the smallest, to 30, the largest. In age the youngest was about 15 years and the oldest about 30 years. The apple, pear, plum, prune and peach trees were loaded with a high quality of commercial fruit. At the Madolens ranch we saw a vineyard of several acres. The grape vines were taxed to the limit to hold the luscious fruit. Of the several varieties found here probably the Concord was the most satisfactory late grape. The quality and quantity of the grapes raised in this vineyard is enough to remove all uncertainty as to grape culture on the Twin Falls tract. If they are properly handled they will be found a good profit producer. The best varieties of peaches which we found were the Elberta and the early and late Crawford. They gave a high yield, were of good size and fine quality. These peaches would make their own in commercial competition with peaches raised in the best peach sections. The Bartlett pear seemed to be the best variety for this locality, and they were fine. In apples the Wealthy, Winesap, Duchess, Snow, Alexander and Jonathan were the best commercial varieties that we next able to find in these orchards.

We saw at least a dozen different varieties of plums and prunes. From our observation of these fruits we are satisfied that almost any standard plum or prune will do well here.

These orchards will yield this year crops varying in value from \$150 to \$500 per acre, depending on the original setting and the present care of the trees and vines. The orchards in the Snake river canyon are past the experimental stage. They are now a profit-producing reality.

In an irrigated country food seeds are continually floating into the fields through the ditches. If you did not cut these weeds before they matured it would be well to burn them at once before the seeds thoroughly settle.

Many of the farmers are getting their barns and sheds in shape for winter. They know that it is much easier to do the work now than it will be after the cold weather sets in.

Messrs. Drake, Metzger, and Spencer have been experimenting during the past few days with the straw method of clearing sagebrush land. These gentlemen scattered from two to four loads of straw on the land to be cleared. When the wind was favorable they set the straw on fire. The ground was left as clean as a street. One man can clear more than three times faster than he can by using a grub hoe. This method is not only a time saver but it also leaves the ashes of the sagebrush and straw on the ground. The ashes act as a fertilizer and will tend to increase the yield of the first crop. There is another ad-

vanage. All the small pieces of brush are burned. This makes the land more fertile. The writer is to be judged from those experiments, this is a very successful method.

**W. J. BRYAN AS A PROPHECY**  
Some of His Dismal Predictions and How They Proved.

On March 10, 1892, in the house of representatives, Mr. W. J. Bryan was then a member, he delivered a speech on the question of tariff legislation. In painting an agonizing picture of what would be the many consequences of the Republican or McKinley tariff law he spoke as follows: "Protection has been our cannibal and as one after another of our farmers has been driven by the force of circumstances upon that tree, and has been crushed within its folds his competitors have stood around and shouted, 'Great is protection!'"

"In every state, so far as these statistics have been collected, the proportion of home-grown fruit is decreasing and that of tenant farmers increasing. This means but one thing. It means a land of landless and tenant farmers. The history of every nation that has gone down I say to you that no people can continue free people under a free government when the great majority of its citizens are tenants of small masters. Your system (protective tariff) has driven the farm owner from his land and substituted the farm tenant."

How far this picture of the America of today or the America of any day since he made that speech except the four years of Democratic free trade and American canals. Even in Mr. Bryan's own state he can find an answer right at his doors, for the farm lands of Nebraska have doubled in value since the McKinley protective tariff law went into effect.

In 1896 Mr. Bryan, as ever fertile in expedients, had a remedy for the financial and industrial depression which had bankrupted the country during the preceding four years, namely, being the free coinage of silver to the value of 16 cents. He felt, however, his prescription was rejected at the polls. In urging his own election and the so-called cause of free trade he made the following statements at the time and places named:

"I reply that if protection has slain the human life, the gold standard will slay its tens of thousands."—From speech at Democratic national convention, July, 1896.

"The Democrats and Republicans beguile you about the future. The future is written in blood crushed out of you by gold."—From speech at Erie, Pa., August, 1896.

"Ah, my friends, there is another reason why people have gone into the cities and left the farms. It is because your legislation has been causing the foreclosure of mortgages upon the farms." \* \* \* Mark my words: If the gold standard goes on and people continue to complain, the gold standard advocates, interested to keep it, will prove the condition of the people, will be recommending that you close your schools so that the people will not know what they are doing."

—From speech at Monmouth, Ill., October, 1896.

But whom has the gold standard slain? What at future did it write in blood? What district schools did it close? Again the condition of the country makes a calm reply confuting the impassioned orator.

Campaigning again in 1900 Mr. Bryan decided that imperialism was another danger to the country. If it were continued the Fourth of July would be forgotten by all Americans and the "spirit of '76" would become a thing of the past. Speaking at Lincoln, Neb., he said:

"The fight this year will be to carry out the sentiment of that song we have so often repeated, 'My Country, 'Tis of Thee we sing, when we look out on our children's children will not succeed to the spirit of that song, and celebrations of the Fourth of July will pass away, for the spirit of the empire will be upon us."

Will the sensible voters of Idaho help to elevate to the highest office in the nation the man who gives confidence to such swindlers? Each and all of you ask and answer for yourselves in the privacy of your own hearts, the man who says otherwise to such heretics fit to be president of this great nation? Do you believe that with the policies he would inaugurate into the double-headed eagle of the United States that the value of your property would be advanced or the wages you earn be increased? Or is it not probable that the reverse would happen? These are the questions that the interest of all that is dear to us we must answer when we cast our ballots next November.

Idaho and a vital danger to the welfare of our state is contained in the Republican party in state and county for its willing and complete subservience to the polygamous and vicious Mormon hierarchy of Salt Lake and in county convention assembled call upon you to stand by us in our guarantee that our legislative ticket will give all honorable means to destroy the baneful influence of that treasonable organization whenever possible.

After October 31, 1908, and until the commencement of the irrigation season of 1909, we shall not run any water in our canals unless satisfactory arrangements are made to reimburse us for cost of winter operation.

The above notice has been formally served upon the secretary of the Twin Falls Canal Association by Secretary Voigt of the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. In the abstract it means that the water will be turned out of the canals on the first day of November, unless the company and the association can agree upon a satisfactory basis for the maintenance of the canal system during the winter months. The company's contract expressly stipulates that water shall be delivered only during the irrigating season, according to its contention, and it does not propose to stand the cost of running the water after that time.

On the 16th day of December, 1907, A. D. McKinley applied for an injunction restraining the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. from turning the water out of the canals between irrigation seasons. Judge Walters granted the injunction and required Mr. McKinley to put up a bond of \$15,000 to protect the company against any damage which might result through the running of the water in the canals during cold weather, and also to reimburse the company for the cost of maintaining the canal system during the winter in the event that the court should decide that the company was not obliged by the terms of its contract with the state to furnish water ex-

cept during the irrigating season.

The case was transferred to the United States court, the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. being a foreign corporation. The company demurred to the complaint and arguments on the demurrer were heard by United States Judge Dietrich in Boise on September 16. The case is now under advisement by the court.

That portion of paragraph nine of the state contract upon which the question hinges reads: "The water to be delivered from the canal during each and every irrigation season \* \* \*"

The question arose from the litigation incident to the attempted transfer of the canal to the settlers. The company wanted to transfer the canal system to the entrymen on January 1 of this year. The entrymen claimed it was not in condition to be transferred and the company was enjoined from turning it over. Then the company, announced that it would not run water during the winter and the McKinley suit followed.

It is almost a foregone conclusion that water will have to be run during the winter, but who will pay the cost of running it is a problem for the courts to determine.

The governing board of the Twin Falls Canal Association will meet on Saturday, October 1, in the offices of the association, for the purpose of taking action in the matter.

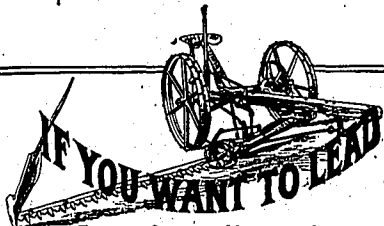

### WHY COURTHOUSE SHOULD BE BUILT

(Continued from Page 9.) It is the duty of the commissioners to provide ample protection for these records. I believe that a new building of stone, brick or even of concrete would not be absolutely immune from fire. What we should have is a fire-proof vault provided for the protection of the records.

Per Argument Punctured. To this Mr. West replied by saying: "I reply to the gentleman's statement that it would be better to vote this \$150,000 bonds for the building of roads instead of the building of a court house. I would say that if he and the people of Buhl district are not satisfied with the amount of money available for road building as given in the figures, certainly they have an adequate remedy already on the statutes, in the law providing for the issuance of bonds of a road district for the improvement of roads within that district, by the provisions of which law you can spend all the money you can get from the general fund of the county, in addition to that amount you may issue your own district bonds for whatever amount you might consider necessary in addition to the amount obtained from the general fund of the county and build as much and as good roads as you wished. This is entirely within your own power and discretion.

"I wish to make the further statement that there is now laying within the limits of the town of Buhl three carloads of lumber and one carload of steel culvert pipe for use on your roads here, waiting to be put in wherever needed, and there is no one to blame but yourselves if you don't put in the bridges wherever needed."

Mr. White then replied: "In regard to the \$7000 which was spent on this side of the tract, since we are now two-thirds of the entire tract, and since we have a large territory, it would seem that we ought to spend one-third of the money. It would seem to me that the money could be used to much greater advantage on our roads, which are in a deplorable condition. I know of a great many parts of the canals and culverts which need bridges, and of a great many rocks which should be taken out of the roads. I am not informed on the law in regard to bonding a district for the purpose of constructing roads and bridges, but I do think that this money could be better used for our roads than for a new court house."

Who Paid the Bills? Mr. West replied: "You overlooked the fact that you have spent \$25 every dollar you have contributed. Whose money was it? It was our money. We sent it to you and you spent it. I know whose money was it that we spent. Why, we spent our own money. You did not contribute one cent of it. We have done all that we did ourselves. You have been spending our money for two years. We were glad to send it to you, but it is no more than right and just that you should drop in your check for \$100, and help to build a court house."

**REMEDY IN THEIR OWN HANDS**

Those Opposed to Having Water Decreed Are Shown the Way.

A few days ago, while in Filer, I overheard a conversation between the resident of Twin Falls and Mr. Darrow, secretary of the Twin Falls Canal association, and who is now engaged in circulating a petition amongst the farmers and land owners asking them to become parties plaintiff in an action to obtain a decree showing priority of our water right. The Twin Falls resident intimated in quite forcible language that the whole thing was a graft, first on the part of the attorneys to obtain a fee, and secondly on the part of Mr. Darrow to obtain employment. After the wrathful resident had had his say and left, I asked Mr. Darrow how he was getting along with the signing up on the suit. He showed me a list of nearly 500 names of those who had signed and he informed me that up to the present time not over half a dozen people to whom he had explained the nature of the suit and its purpose had refused to sign as a plaintiff during the four weeks he has been working on the matter. He also said he was carrying a notice in each of the newspapers in the county asking the land owners to call at his office in Twin Falls on any Saturday and sign up for the suit. That up to the present time but comparatively few people had voluntarily called upon him, though they almost invariably signed when he called upon them and a great many of them had already read the notice and made up their minds to sign.

Now, it strikes me that if this is a graft on the part of Mr. Darrow that it can't easily be stopped by the land owners calling upon him and signing up or making known their intention not to do so, thus saving themselves and me and the rest of the people who have signed up the expense of some one chasing over the country after them. His job will certainly be done if each one of the owners of land will show enough interest in the matter to call at Mr. Darrow's office, and the expense of those who have signed up will be that much lighter. In conclusion I will say that I have since learned that the irate individual who was making such a protest over the graft was no land on the Twin Falls tract and consequently cannot be a member of the Canal association.

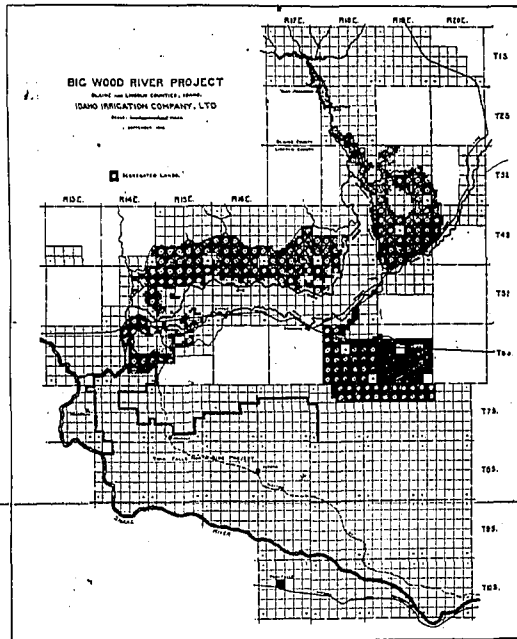
