

ALL-PULLING FOR THE HIGH BRIDGE

ACROSS SNAKE RIVER BELOW SHOESHONE FALLS.

Business Men of Twin Falls Pledge Their Co-Operation With the Kuhn and Will Meet With W. B. Kuhn on the Subject This Week.

The proposed bridge across Snake river below the Shoeshone falls, which was at first regarded by many as nothing more than a dream in the mind of J. B. Perrine, has now assuming very substantial proportions.

The American Bridge company, at the request of the Kuhn brothers, prepared estimates for two structures across Snake river, one with a span of 1000 feet and one with a span of 700 feet.

The longer span with a span of 1000 feet, which would cross the Snake river at a structure above the Twin falls.

The shorter one with a span of 700 feet, which would cross the Snake river at a structure below the Twin falls.

Estimating the cost of the bridge at \$300,000, its earning capacity would have to be \$52 per day in order to pay 6 per cent interest on the investment.

The men interested in the Hansen and Hollister townships are naturally in favor of this route.

A committee of ten, consisting of C. E. Booth, G. B. Fraser, Geo. F. Guthrie, James McCollum, W. F. Guthrie, James McArthur, J. M. Kuhn, G. D. Alken, F. D. Kimball and S. H. Bolton was appointed to call on the Commercial clubs of Jerome and Blaine, and to the purpose of ascertaining how much of the proposed bonds could be disposed of in those cities.

CITY WILL BUILD FINE FIRE HALL

COUNCIL NOW HAS PLANS UNDER CONSIDERATION.

Another Lateral Sewer District Created in Precinct No. 2—Bond Issue of \$50,000 is Required for New Trunk Sewer.

At the meeting of the city council on Monday evening plans for the new fire hall prepared by Burton E. Morse and C. Harvey Smith were considered.

The hall will contain ample room for fire apparatus, property room, meeting room, office of the city clerk, city engineer, sleeping quarters for the firemen, baths and other conveniences.

The council created a new sewer district comprising 13 blocks, beginning at the rear of the News office on Main street and extending north-west to the city limits.

It is estimated that a sewer 10 feet deep would cost approximately \$14,000, or about \$75 per lot.

An approximate \$5,000 has been authorized and the citizens will be asked to vote bonds to this amount.

The council has appointed W. O. Taylor, C. J. Hahn, George H. Smith, commissioners of the new lateral sewer district.

I. B. Perrine said he would undertake to dispose of \$25,000 worth of bonds, and many others declared their willingness to take smaller amounts.

NEW INVENTIONS.

(Scientific American.)
Manure Pulverizer and Loader—J. N. Frost, Arlington, Mass. In a general way the invention is carried out by the provision of a carriage on which the pulverizing mechanism is mounted. This mechanism is fed by an elevator arranged at the rear end of the carriage and the mechanism discharges upon a conveyor leading to one side of the carriage, the mechanism, elevator and apron all being driven from a motor mounted on the carriage.

Cotton-Cleaner—A. L. Treves, Jamaica, Okla. This invention concerns itself especially with providing means for ejecting the treated cotton from the device. The invention further provides means for removing the cotton with the boll to remove the boll and dirt, and it is also adapted for treating the cotton without the boll when it is simply necessary to clean the cotton.

Double Hake—R. M. Kenney, Clinton, Okla. The more particular purpose here is to provide a vehicle body with two sets of rake teeth operated to some extent independently, and to further provide the body with a turntable whereby the horses used for drawing the body may be turned around without materially disturbing the relative position of the rake members, that one of the rake members may be filled and afterward practically turned to the rear in order to allow the other one to be filled.

Beater—H. C. Carr, Plummer, Minn. The invention has reference to threshing machines, beaters, and particularly to a beater comprising parts rotatable about different axes so that one is eccentric with respect to the other, and the quantity of material carried by one of the parts and controlled by the other so that the teeth have a constant angularity when the parts rotate, and is, the teeth are always at the same angle.

HOW ONIONS ARE GROWN IN TEXAS

INTERESTING ADDRESS BY DR. PERRY OF WENDELL.

The Doctor Has Just Returned from the Famous Onion District of Texas, Where He Went to Study Onion Culture Methods.

On Tuesday evening, Feb. 9th, 1909, Dr. E. H. Perry addressed the members of the Wendell Farmers' association on "The Raising of Onions," following a two weeks' trip to the onion belt of southern Texas. The following is taken from Dr. Perry's talk:

"The real reason for my talking to you tonight is the fact that I took a trip into southern Texas for the purpose of studying 'Onion Culture.' The profits of the onion business are so attractive that I thought I could not rest until I had investigated the matter, so I went to those that raised the onions, where onions were raised as a business and where nothing else was raised but onions.
"Cattula, Texas, was where I went, and the farmers there do not raise anything else but onions. Most all of the people have small tracts of land in the country about, upon which they raise onions. The Mexicans do the work. 'The Mexicans work for 50 cents a day. The soil of this section, which is devoted exclusively to onions, is a red sandy soil. In some sections it has to be fertilized in order to produce a crop of onion. I was not able to learn why that particular section of Texas should be especially adapted to onions, whether it was due to the climatic conditions or to soil conditions, but I have been informed, and was informed there, that the richer the soil (if it had a mineral content) the more surely it would raise onions.

Irrigation Practices.
"The onions in this entire section are raised by irrigation. That was the first thing I was told. Most all of the people visit a rainfall country that raised onions, but I wished to visit a country that raised onions by irrigation. It was interesting to me from the fact that all of this country, with the exception of probably one-half mile either side of the small stream there, is irrigated from wells. All of the water from the stream is forced up upon the land by steam engines and other pumping devices. The wells, for the most part, are artesian wells, especially those around Laredo. In irrigating from these wells they build large reservoirs upon the highest points of the land and pump from the wells into the reservoirs. Then they draw the water from the reservoirs. It seems to me a very insecure way to have the water, and I could not help but believe how secure and satisfactory must be our system of irrigation when compared with that, because an irrigation well will certainly, some day, cease to flow, and then they would cease to have any irrigation water and the land would be worth 50 cents an acre."

Imported Seed.
"I visited a number of plantations where onions were raised. The onion which they raise down there is the Red Bermuda onion. The seed is imported from the Teneriffe Islands. The Teneriffe Islands grow onion seed; they do not grow the Bermuda onion. There is no seed raised in Texas or anywhere thereabouts. All the seed that is used in the Texas region, I was told, was imported seed. The seed of the onion in Texas is planted in November, from the 1st to the 15th. On the 1st of January, a little before or a little later, the seed has grown into a set about three or four inches long. They are planted in rows, in onion beds, and they are watered by irrigation by the flooding system.

Culture Methods.
"The onion is a very hardy plant. The onion seed will germinate in very cold ground, and the plant, or the set, will not be destroyed even after transplanting and the onion frosts, and even a slight freeze, will not destroy the set, although the tops may break over and will down. The climate down there from the 1st of November to the middle of January, a little before or a little later, the seed has grown into a set about three or four inches long. They are planted in rows, in onion beds, and they are watered by irrigation by the flooding system.

"I was very much disappointed when I went down there and found that there was no successful way of raising the onion without transplanting it. All those that have raised onions down there by drilling them into the ground—or sowing them, or planting them in any other way directly from the seed without transplanting, have returned to the method of transplanting. They complain that the onion seed was too small in size and did not make a uniform tract, and ought to be very carefully graded, and if sowed in drills it would be impossible to raise the seed thin enough so the bed would not have to be weeded out, and the process of thinning them out would be as laborious as transplanting them in the first place. There may be some method of planting the onion without having to transplant it, but I was assured by an onion raiser there that he could not give me his considerable experience, that the onion was improved in quality by being transplanted, and that by transplanting they became absolutely uniform in size.

"The onion plants are taken from the bed in which the seed has been sown and carried to the field. The field is prepared in this manner: After the soil has been very carefully prepared we will know what is meant by the expression, 'we will prepare this piece of ground as we would have an onion bed.' Of course the idea carries with it a fine pulverization of the soil, disk and making it soft. It is laid off in rows about 10 inches apart. They are elevated just a little. I think that I

should plant a large field of onions I would plant them flat and make corrugations between the rows for the purpose of watering. The rows are 12 inches apart, and then they make them crosswise after the rows have been marked 10 inches apart with a little roller. The roller has little markers upon it. Little iron beams, which are 3/4 inches apart, and when that is run crosswise over the rows it will make the rows 3 1/2 inches apart so that the onion sets are planted 3 1/2 inches apart and the rows 10 inches apart.

Labor.
"It is very interesting to see the Mexicans plant these onions. They are very adept at it. It takes a Mexican 4 1/2 days to plant an acre of onions, or transplant an acre." Dr. Perry then illustrated how the Mexican will plant these onion sets by taking the horn of a cow, making his hole in the ground with the horn in one hand and placing the onion set in place with the other hand, working hand over hand, as it were.
"One man can care for 20 acres of onions after they are planted," said Dr. Perry. "There is no more work after these onions are planted until after harvest time. They are ready to harvest the 1st of June. By the 10th or 15th of June they are all harvested."

"It costs, as near as I can figure up, from \$56.00 to \$76.00 an acre from seed to the freight car; that is, it represents an investment we will say, putting it on the outside, of \$76. The smallest net profit which I could find out was \$25.00, not the gross profit. The highest net profit I found was \$90.00. They all raise the Red Bermuda onion. The Red Bermuda onion is not a red onion at all; it is almost a white onion, especially the flesh of the onion."
Dr. Perry stated he was going to try out the following varieties: Red Bermuda, Crystal White, Giant Yellow, Prizetaker, Yellow Club Bonbons and the large Red Welleradid. Dr. Perry further took up the question of marketing the onions, stating that in Texas the farmers had an onion association presided over by a secretary whose duty it was to keep well posted as to the market quotations, he being paid a salary for this work. All the onions sold were billed direct to the secretary of the association, and all payments for the onions were made from his office. All the farmer had to do was to deliver the onions to the car.

AMENDMENT TO THE GAME LAWS

SEVERAL IMPORTANT CHANGES ARE MADE

Dove Season is Opened One Month Earlier, Duck Season Extended to February 1, and Open Season for Sage Hens Deferred Two Weeks.

After weeks of careful preparation, the fish and game committee of the house of representatives has completed and introduced the amended fish and game bill. During its hearings the committee considered recommendations from sportsmen in all parts of the state, many of whom appeared in person. Courteous hearing was given to all who had suggestions to offer and the bill, as amended, embodies the composite ideas of the sportsmen of the state.

The principal change, so far as it affects the Twin Falls sportsmen, is the opening of the dove season one month earlier, to February 1. The doves are migratory birds. They feed on our grain and leave when frost appears. The duck season is extended to February 1, and migratory ducks do not come in until after the first cold weather, frequently later. The sage hens are given additional protection by the extension of the closed season until August 15.

There are several important changes in the bill, but the sections in which most interest center are as follows:

Sec. 5—It shall be a misdemeanor for any person or persons to catch or kill any species of fish, whether in any of the streams, rivers, lakes, reservoirs or waters of this state with any seine, net, spear, weir, fence, basket, trap, gillnet, dipnet or any other contrivance except as hereinafter provided. It shall be lawful, however, to catch or take salmon from those parts of Snake river that constitute the boundary between the state of Idaho and the state of Oregon, and between the state of Idaho and the state of Washington with seines or nets of which the meshes shall not be less than six inches in length when elongated or drawn by two opposite corners across the mesh.

It shall be lawful to take fish with a seine, net or set line from the waters of Bear lake, except between April 1st and June 1st following: Provided, however, that it shall be a misdemeanor to take fish from the waters of the said Bear lake or to fish therefor with such seine, net, set line or other contrivance within 100 yards of the mouth of any stream flowing into the said Bear lake, and the limit upon the amount of fish that may be taken in any one day or the amount of fish a person may have in his possession at any one time does not apply to Bear lake trout or any unprotected fish taken from Bear lake.

It shall be lawful to take minnows for bait or the young of carp, sucker, chub, white fish, perch or silversides with a net not to exceed 48 inches in length. It shall be a misdemeanor to take in such manner for bait, or in any other manner not made lawful by this act, the young of the trout, bass, cat fish, grayling or sun fish. It shall be lawful to catch any kind of fish with the hook and line attached to the pole or held in the hand at any time of the year. It is further provided that salmon may be speared or caught on a snag hook not less than four inches in length. It shall be a misdemeanor to catch any kind of fish through the ice at any time of the year, except from the waters of Bear lake and Penni D'Orville lake, and on the latter lake it shall be lawful to fish through the ice for white fish and charr only.

It shall be a misdemeanor to fish within 300 feet of a fish ladder in any public stream. It shall be unlawful for any person to catch from the public waters more than 20 pounds of trout, bass, catfish, grayling or sunfish in any one day, or to have in their possession more than 20 pounds of these fish so taken at any one time. It shall be unlawful to kill or destroy or have in possession for any purpose any fish by the use of poison or deleterious drugs or by the use of any explosive substance or to explode or cause to be exploded any powder, Hercules powder, dynamite, nitroglycerine, lime gas, or other explosive substances, for the purpose of catching, killing or destroying any kind of fish. Provided, that it shall be a misdemeanor for any person or persons to use any of said explosives for the purpose of internal improvement in any of the streams or lakes of this state such person or persons, before using such explosives, must procure permission from the state fish and game warden or deputy warden of the county in which said explosives are to be used: Provided, further, that nothing in this act contained shall prevent the use of any such explosives in a quarry mill or other place located upon any stream or lake from operations in such quarry mill or reduction works of the owner or owners of such quarry mill or reduction works, or for settling purposes in connection with such reduction works, or for deterring or destroying any deleterious chemical flowing into such stream.

Section 7—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell, supply, trap or destroy any English, Chinese or Mongolian pheasants or prairie chicken or pinnated grouse in the state of Idaho. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to kill any quail within the state of Idaho, except between the first day of November and the first day of December of each year, or to kill more than 18 of these birds in any one day or to sell any at any time. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ensnare or trap any of the birds protected by this act at any time of the year.

Sage Hens, Grouse and Ducks. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or destroy any sage hen, partridge, pheasant or grouse except between the 15th day of August and the 1st day of December of each year or to kill more than 12 of these birds in any one day. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to kill or destroy any species of wild duck, geese, swan, snipe or plover, except between the first day of September and the first day of February, or to kill more than 24 ducks, four geese, one swan, 12 snipe or 12 plover in any one day.

Turtle Doves. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to kill or destroy any turtle dove except between the 15th day of July and the 1st day of December of each year, or to kill more than 24 of them in any one day.

It shall be unlawful for any person to kill a bag of more than 24 birds in any one day. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to destroy the nests or the young of any game bird, or to molest such game birds or their young during the breeding season, and any person or persons found guilty of destroying the nests or destroying game birds or their young during the breeding season or when such birds are protected by law, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. It shall be unlawful for any person to have in his possession any game, dead or alive, during the closed season for such game.

Big Game. Section 8—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to pursue, capture or kill within the state of Idaho any moose, buffalo, antelope, caribou or beaver at any time. Provided, however, that upon a satisfactory showing being made to the state game warden that beaver in any locality are damaging irrigation canals, crops, etc., the state game warden may in his discretion issue a permit for the taking of such number of beaver as in his judgment will stop the damage to such property, and the pelts or skins shall be turned over to the state game warden and each hunter and the money credited to the state game fund.

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, hunt or kill any deer, elk, mountain sheep or mountain goat at any time, except between the first day of September and the first day of September of each year. It shall be unlawful at any time to kill or capture any of the above named animals by means of any pitfall, trap or snare. And it shall be unlawful at any time of the year for any person or persons to hunt, chase, or capture with dogs any of the animals herein mentioned.

Licenses. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to hunt for any game whatever, or to fish in the public waters until a license is first procured as provided herein, and upon receipt of the state game warden or his deputies such license must be produced for inspection. Any bona fide native citizen over the age of 12 years who has been such for a period of six months preceding the application for a license, upon payment of \$1 to any of the justices of the peace, probate judge of the county, or the state fish and game warden or any deputy warden, shall be entitled to receive from the justice of the peace, probate judge, or state fish and game warden a rod and gun license which shall permit such person to pursue, hunt and kill any of the game animals or birds mentioned in this act during the time when it shall be lawful to kill the same, in any of the counties in this state subject to the limitations as to the number of each kind of animals or birds provided herein, and to catch fish with the hook and line according to the provisions of this act. And it shall be a misdemeanor for any such officer to issue a receipt in lieu of such license, and such license shall not be transferred to any other person. Any person who is a non-resident of the state of Idaho or an alien shall upon payment to any justice of the peace or probate judge of this county, or the state fish and game warden or any deputy warden, the sum of \$25 be entitled to receive from such officer to whom payment is made a non-resident big game license which license shall permit such person to pursue, hunt or kill such number of each kind of birds as herein mentioned during the time in each year when it shall be lawful to kill such birds, as provided in this act.

Any person, regardless of sex, who is a non-resident of the state of Idaho, or an alien, shall upon payment of \$2 to any justice of the peace or probate judge, or to the state fish and game warden or any deputy warden, be entitled to receive from such person to whom such payment is made a non-resident fishing license, which license shall permit the holder thereof to catch, hunt or kill only as provided in this act.

Section 9—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell, supply, trap or destroy any English, Chinese or Mongolian pheasants or prairie chicken or pinnated grouse in the state of Idaho. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to kill any quail within the state of Idaho, except between the first day of November and the first day of December of each year, or to kill more than 18 of these birds in any one day or to sell any at any time. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ensnare or trap any of the birds protected by this act at any time of the year.
