WILL BE ESTABLISHED FROM BUHL.

Funds Being Raised to Bridge the Salmon River on the Roosevelt Road and Commissioners Will Be Asked to Make Appropriation.

BUHL, Idaho, Feb. 24.—Frank Brooks and Miss Laura Miller were joined in the bonds of wedlock Thursday evening in Twin Falls. They are making their home in Buhl. The ladies' Aid met at the home of Mrs. W. D. Yingt out on the ranch yesterday.

The articles of incorporation of the Buhl Creamery, Cheese Manufacturing and Milk Condensing Company, Limited, of Buhl were filed Thursday in the office of the county recorder and in the office of the secretary of state. The board of directors is preparing to commence work on the construction of the building. The Towanite company has generously donated a lot to the company and work on the construction of the building will soon be commenced. The company is capitalized at \$10,000, and about \$2000 of the stock has already been subscribed. It will require only about \$3500 to build and equip the plant and run it for several weeks.
