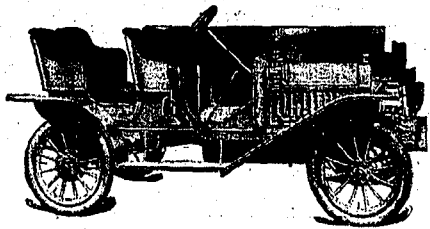

ANOTHER RECORD FALLS AT MARDI-GRAS MEET

BURMAN CLIPS ELEVEN MINUTES OFF 100-MILE MARK.

Woman's Record Also Falls—Jimmy Ryall's Narrow Escape From Death—Program for Today.

Kansas City Journal, Feb. 22, 1909. NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 21.—Robert Burman in his Model 17 Buick car, today broke the world's record for 100 miles on a circular track in the Mardi-Gras auto meet of the day. Burman made the distance after a most remarkable drive, in 1:42:39.2, this being 13 minutes faster than the previous record set by Clemens in Indianapolis in 1907.

There were six other races, all of which were short distances. The weather was cloudy, but the track in almost perfect condition. In the first race, Jimmy Ryall made too wide a turn at the beginning of the stretch and, losing control of

his car, it ran into the fence. The machine was demolished beyond repair. Ryall escaped with a remarkable, as he was traveling faster than a mile a minute.

The 100-mile race open to stock cars started with three entries. Burman (Model 17 Buick), Robertson (Simplex), and Strang (Hoata). Robertson started off in the lead with Burman second and Strang third. At the end of the first mile Burman had taken the lead, which he held until the end of the race, with the exception of one mile.

In the seventy-fourth mile Strang was forced to stop in the second time, his steering gear being out of order. It could not be repaired in time, so he retired permanently.

Burman's driving was the most sensational ever seen in this city. He drove hard from start to finish, cut his turns sharp and never once during the whole race was he forced to stop for anything. Burman drove alone with the aid of a mechanic and his stock car was stripped to a skeleton.

Buick Model 10

Won First Place Among American Cars and Second Place in International Light Car Road Race Held at Savannah, Ga., November 25, 1908.

Notes of Race. After leading the entire first half of what proved to be the most excit-

ing and most stubbornly fought speed battle in automobile racing history, the Buick Model 10's gasoline tank came loose and because of stops totaling over twenty minutes on this trouble, the Buick lost the 100-mile Savannah race by six minutes.

Hillard in his \$300 Lancia (a foreign car) won. Burman in his \$1000 Buick gave him the fight of his life and brought his car in with such a lead over the remaining contestants that there was no question concerning the standard which the Buick has set in low-priced automobile construction.

E. A. Hearne of Chicago, driving his own car, a Buick Model 10, won fourth place and was at all times a contender for the highest honors.

The great duel between the leaders was a sight which the spectators will never forget.

The Buick used was a regular stock chassis except the frame and machinery were under hung, so as not to upset in taking the turns at such terrific speed, and because of stops, transmission and axle parts were used.

During the entire race, the hood over the engine was not raised. The Buick tires were used and absolutely no tire trouble was had.

70 miles per hour was made on the smooth straightaway stretches. The three fastest laps made in the race were made by the Buick. The Buick made each of 17 laps in less than 11 minutes. The length of each lap was 2.8 miles. The fastest lap of the race was made by the Buick in 10 minutes and 5 seconds.

FOUR THOUSAND ACRES IN FRUIT
IS THE APPROXIMATE AMOUNT PLANTED THIS SPRING.
 Kimberly Correspondent of the News Bases His Figures Upon the Number of Trees Sold—Farmers Take Advantage of Fine Weather.

KIMBERLY, Idaho, March 17.—D. Kennison has reneged the ranch recently purchased and owned by M. Clyde and will farm it the coming summer. This is the place formerly owned by Carl V. Moore.

GOVERNOR SIGNS THE PARK BILL

FOR THE BEAUTIFYING OF THE SHOSHONE FALLS.

State Appropriates \$2400 for Purchase of Land and \$2000 for Improvements and Authorizes County to appropriate for Latter Purpose.

Senator Sweeley's bill creating a state park at Shoshone falls has been signed by Governor Brady and steps will now be taken to carry out its provisions. The measure authorizes the state land board to sell the land and provides an appropriation to reimburse the school fund for the value of the property. It also carries an appropriation of \$2000 for beautifying the grounds, contingent upon a similar appropriation by the board of county commissioners, the authority for which is granted in the bill.

With an expenditure of \$4000, it will be possible to make the park site presentable by putting the roads in good condition, improving the grades and developing the springs. Trees and shrubbery will be planted, and a system provided for the irrigation thereof.

Thanks are due Senator Sweeley for his efforts in preparing the bill and securing its passage in the senate, and to Representative McKinlay, who took care of the measure in the house.

The full text of the bill is as follows:
 Whereas, Shoshone falls, in the Snake river, between the counties of Twin Falls and Lincoln, are among the greatest scenic attractions of the world; and

Whereas, the surroundings of the Falls are but little improved and furnish inadequate accommodations and conveniences for tourists and visitors; and

Whereas, lying immediately west of the falls in section 36, in township 4 of range 17, belonging to the state of Idaho, which provides some of the finest views of the scenery and embraces places that by improvement may be made of great interest and natural attraction; and

Whereas, on the portion of said land which lies in Twin Falls county there have been placed at considerable expense by private enterprise, with the consent of the state board of land commissioners for the accommodation and use of the public, winding stairs leading down to the river below the falls, which in time will require attention; and

Whereas, said state land is rough, rocky, and so cut by the river and ravines as to be of practically no financial value, but with proper outlay and attention can be developed into an asset of great importance to the state; and

Whereas, to vest the title to said land in the state free from the claims

of the school-fund, it will be necessary to have the same sold.

Now, therefore, be it enacted by the legislature of the state of Idaho: Section 1. The state board of land commissioners is hereby empowered and directed to proceed to make sale of the following described lands, to-wit:

Lots six, seven, eight and nine, and the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter and the south half of the southeast quarter of section 36, in township nine, south, of range 17, east of the Boise meridian, in the manner required by law for the sale of school lands; and said board is by this act authorized and directed for and on behalf of the state of Idaho, to buy said lands at such sale and do whatever further is required to obtain for the state absolute title thereto.

Section 2. When the title to said lands is obtained by the state by sale as provided in section 1 of this act, the same shall become dedicated, improved and maintained as a state park for the free use and enjoyment of the public.

Section 3. For the purpose of purchasing said lands and obtaining title thereto, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$2400, or as much thereof as may be necessary.

Section 4. For the purpose of improving and beautifying said park, in the way of planting trees, developing springs, constructing walks, bridges and seats and adding other improvements and conveniences, there is hereby appropriated the further sum of \$2000.

Section 5. The money appropriated by section 4 of this act is to be drawn and expended by the board of county commissioners of Twin Falls county for the purposes set forth in said section 4; provided, however, that before any portion of said appropriation is made there shall have been appropriated by such county the amount at least equal to the portion of the state appropriation about to be expended, for the same purpose, and for the improvement of the sidewalks and footpaths leading to said park, and authority is hereby given to said county to make such appropriation for such purposes.

Section 6. If proper condition of said park, as provided in section 4 of this act, no more shall be used than shall equal the amount used under the appropriation by said county.

Section 7. Prior to the first day of January, 1911, the board of county commissioners of said county shall make full and detailed report of the amount expended under the provisions of this act and the character and extent of the improvements made.

Section 8. All improvements of whatever kind placed on said land shall belong to the state of Idaho, and it shall be the power and duty of the board of county commissioners of said Twin Falls county to make suitable provisions for the care and preservation thereof, without expense to the state.

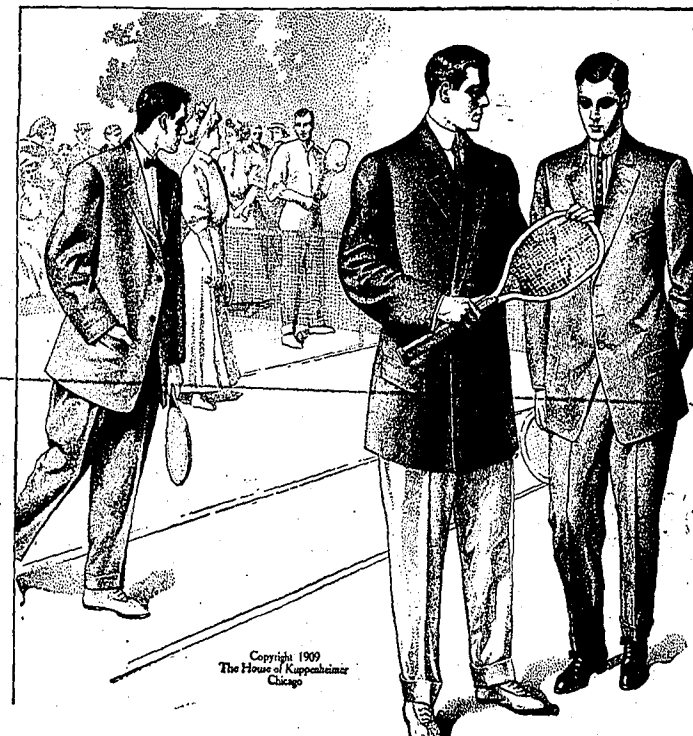
