### PROPOSE BRIDGE OVER THE SNAKE

#### FILER CITIZENS UNDERTAKE ITS CONSTRUCTION.

Intention is to Locate the Structure at Clark's Grade Where a Feasible Site Has Been Found - Wendell Citizens Co-operate.

FILER, Idaho, April 7.—The proposition of building a grade and bridging Snake river at Clark's grade, north of Filer, was fully discussed at the Commercial club meeting on Monday evening. The committee which was appointed at the last meeting of the Commercial club, consisting of H. Carahan, M. G. Ripley and W. R. Swicegood, to investigate the feasibility of bridging Snake river, reported that they had been over the ground and were highly surprised with the conditions and that a grade could be made much easier and with much less expense than they had anticipated. It is the intention of the club to co-operate with the Commercial club of Wendell, also with the ranchers and fruit-growers in the locality of the grade who would be benefited by the building of such a bridge. The move is a very commendable one and should receive the hearty support of both clubs and the farmers as well as the merchants of the city. It will establish a direct connection with the North and South Side tracts and afford a local market for both sides of the river. Committees have been appointed to push this work to maturity, and soon will have a direct route between this city and Wendell.

While delivering a load of coal about 2 p. m. April 1, Charles Andrews was suddenly stricken with apoplexy, which caused his death a few hours later. The attack came while his wagon was standing in front of the blacksmith shop and he fell from his seat unconscious. The helpless man was at once removed to his home, where he received all the medical aid that could possibly be rendered, but he never regained consciousness and passed away about 5:30 p. m. the same day. Mr. Andrews came here in November of that year and about a month later formed a co-partnership with T. D. Smith in the livery and feed business. He died about a week before his death and had rented a farm for the coming season. Mr. Andrews was 51 years of age, strong, hearty and healthy looking, and his death came as a great surprise to his many friends and acquaintances. Funeral services were held Saturday, April 2, at 2:30 p. m. under the direction of Filer Camp No. 1556, Modern Woodmen of America, of

which Mr. Andrews was an active member. Interment was made in Odd Fellows cemetery. Besides a wife, he leaves a brother in Wichita, Kan., to mourn his loss.

**BOOM AT CONTACT STILL CONTINUES**

MANY NEW ARRIVALS AT THE COPPER CAMP.

Ten Saloons Will Be in Operation Within Two Weeks, But the Camp Still Lacks a Store for Which There is Urgent Need.

CONTACT, Nev., April 1.—People continue to arrive at the camp and the place has assumed the shape of a good boom. Most of the arrivals are taking chances on the railroad being built, but many are sure. News from Twin Falls tells us that work will start on the 10th of this month, and Mr. Woods, road overseer of the wagon road from Wells to Contact, is actively for the statement that the money has been appropriated by the board of county commissioners of Elko county, Nev., to put the road in shape for heavy hauling. Anyway the boomers are coming in every day and a town is springing up where formerly all was sagebrush.

The first saloon to start was the Northern, owned by George Haas, who has been doing a rushing business for the past two days. McGuire and Rowell are putting up their building as rapidly as possible and J. S. Finn who has just left Twin Falls, has his manager, C. H. Foster, rushing the work on his Elko street saloon which is a temporary tent 24x35 feet and framed. Mr. Finn expects to erect a temporary block on Main street and Copper avenue which will be a duplicate of the Jones block in Twin Falls.

Baine Hanks arrived today with the news that Mr. Luckenbach, now of Elko, Nev., who is in the field for strong Philadelphia capitalists, will be in shortly to examine some of Mr. Hanks' properties with a view to taking hold and developing the same.

Paddy Haas starts tomorrow morning for Houghton, Mich., to confer with his company concerning the development of the Park group. Mr. Haas has expressed himself as well pleased with the progress of the district, and knowing a railroad is assured, he is anxious to begin digging on the ore disclosed to date.

The crying need of the district at present is a general store and there is a population at present that can support one and support it well. By the end of two weeks we will have 10 saloons and as 10 saloons in a mining camp demand one store, we are in hopes the old ratio will be sustained. The best available news is that Mr. Eldridge of Twin Falls will be in within a week or 10 days.

**IDAHO SHOULD**  
**COME FORWARD**

WITH SILVER SERVICE FOR THE  
BATTLESHIP.

Only State in the Union That Has Not  
Shown its Appreciation of the  
Honor of Having a Battleship Bear  
its Name.

Idaho is the only state in the union  
that has not shown its appreciation  
of the honor of having a battleship  
bear its name. All other states so  
honored have responded by supplying  
the vessels bearing their names with  
magnificent silver plate. When the  
commander of the Idaho enters port,  
he has to borrow plate for the oc-  
casion. This should not be and it has  
been humiliating to those who repre-  
sent the state in congress.

Some time ago the women of Twin  
Falls proposed to raise funds for the  
purchase of a silver service for the  
battleship Idaho, but they were dis-  
couraged. They were told that the  
legislature would make an appropria-  
tion; that others would take up the  
question. Nobody has paid the slight-  
est attention to the matter and Idaho  
is acquiring the reputation of being a  
"piker" among the sisterhood of  
states.

In the following letter, Senator W.  
B. Heyburn outlines a plan which  
should meet with the heartiest ap-  
proval:

To the Editor:  
The state of Idaho has been se-  
lected sponsor for one of the great  
battleships of the United States navy.  
For many years it has been customary  
for the people of the state thus repre-  
sented to present to the battleship a  
silver service of appropriate design  
and character. No such step has as  
yet been taken on the part of the peo-  
ple of Idaho in this matter. It is en-  
tirely proper and appropriate that  
steps should be taken in recognition  
of the fact that this vessel now con-  
stitutes a part of the fighting force  
of the United States navy, having  
been in commission for more than a  
year.

Idaho is proud of her representation  
in the navy. Her boys have quickly  
won for themselves distinguished  
honor and high rank as officers and  
whether the battleship Idaho is com-  
manded by Idaho men or not we con-  
fidently count on the ship maintaining  
the honor of the state wherever and  
whenever called upon to defend our  
assert the same. It is high time that  
the people took up this question for  
action. An appropriate silver service  
could be purchased for something be-  
tween \$7500 and \$10,000. This sum  
should be contributed by all of the  
people from childhood to old age.  
They should be taught to have pride  
in the fact that they had contributed,  
whether the sum be very small or  
large. Subscriptions beautiful in size  
should not be either solicited or re-  
ceived. It is not an occasion for  
verifying any person but one for open-  
handed, patriotic participation. Every  
school in the state should be advised  
that the movement is on and the pur-  
pose should be explained to the chil-  
ren and they should be given an op-  
portunity, as in the case of the Wash-  
ington monument, to know that they  
had contributed their mite to this  
purpose. There are 60,000 school  
children in the schools of Idaho. Five  
cents apiece from them would realize  
\$3000. This would be a splendid trib-  
ute to the children and to the state  
and to the occasion generally that the  
school children should have con-  
tributed such a proportion of the  
necessary sum. Individuals other than  
the school children could readily  
make up the sum of \$10,000 without  
depending upon any large subscrip-  
tions.

It has seemed to me without serious  
detraction from the fund an  
acknowledgement of these subscrip-  
tions, however small or large, might  
be made upon an appropriate certifi-  
cate that would be valued by those  
who subscribed.

County, city or town organizations  
should be formed at once on a basis  
of no expense for the collection of  
this fund. There should be in each  
of these divisions, whether they be  
cities, towns or villages, an organ-  
ization that should be responsible for  
the collection of the fund and these  
several organizations should report to  
a central state organization. The

# PIONEER TALKS OF TENDERFEET

ONLY THE "KNOW IT ALLS" GET "BUMPED."

The Youngster Who Has the "Savvy" and Acts Like a Gentleman Has All the Show in the World to Make Good in the State of Idaho.

"I have noticed since I've been knocking around here for the last three or four days," said the old pioneer, as he balanced his heels on a railing in the Hotel Percheron, "that the tenderfoot of today is slightly different from the tenderfoot of 25 years ago. It seems to carry more nobility, to suppose that none of them could rope him while he carried a sabre, or a stick about the weight of the sabre. # KIMBERLY LOTS ARE IN DEMAND

LIKewise FARM PROPERTY IN THE VICINITY.

Several Big Sales of Lots and Farm Lands Made This Week—Kimberly State Bank Increases Its Capital Stock to \$50,000.

Tyler Bros. sold D. G. Zuck, Clarence Lynch and A. E. Ritchie a five-acre tract this week for \$300 per acre. This is in what will be known as Tyler's addition to Kimberly and it will be surveyed and platted as soon as the county surveyor can get around and complete the work. Tyler Bros. are to set the entire tract out to winter apple trees and take care of them for two years at the above price.  
George Fritz is busy erecting a nice barn on his father's place, just south of town.  
The friends of F. E. Bigger gave him a surprise party last Friday night at his home near the power plant. It was his birthday and quite a number were present and enjoyed the evening very much.  
W. H. Thomas went to Payette Monday evening where he will spend a few weeks looking after his business affairs.

W. F. Breckon has a supply of fishing and game licenses on hand which are selling fast to the local sportsmen and fishers. Messrs. Domrose and Elgnor are among the first to go fishing and they have already set a pattern in fish stories which record will probably be broken by others here soon.  
Ed Claiborn expects to move to his North Side farm near Hilldale the next few days where he will prove up on his Carey act land.

W. F. Breckon has been laid up with a severe sore throat the past week but is better at this writing.  
Nearly a thousand dollars worth of town lots were sold Monday in Kimberly. That is not bad for one day's business in that line. This means more residences which are badly needed.  
Work is being pushed on Johnson's barber shop which is being erected near the Nibley-Channel lumber yard. The plans have been on canvas since it was first planned and it will be a nice building, which is being built by E. DeWitt and son.

The school board has ordered furniture for the auditorium on the third floor of the schoolhouse and the room will be finished soon and the closing exercises of the school will be held there.  
A representative of the Salt Lake Drug Co. was here this week and a complete order was given him for the new stock of the Davis and Carter drug store. This will be here this week and we will then have one of the best selected stocks on the tract.  
The fraction of a block north of the park has been purchased by the school board and will be used by the larger boys for a ball ground. This is a good move, as it will be far enough away from the building so that the windows are not in danger from the ball and the smaller children can use the grounds near the building for their playgrounds.
