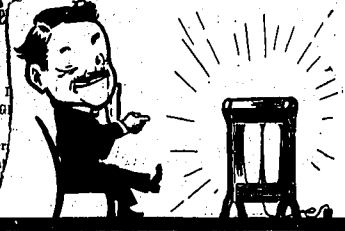

DEMOCRATS CLOUD ISSUE, SAYS BRADY

Real Questions are Temperance and Progressivism

IDAHO'S GOVERNOR IS ON CAMPAIGN TOUL

Makes Defense of His Administration and Expresses Confidence of Victory.

"The Democratic party in Idaho is for local option and its candidate for governor favors the open saloon, while the Republican party is in favor of submitting the question to the people through a constitutional amendment. I am in favor of closing the saloons." This statement was made by Governor James H. Brady of Idaho, candidate for re-election at the Spokane hotel last night. He arrived in the city yesterday on his way to Bonners Ferry, where he will speak tonight.

"This is the plain issue of the campaign," continued Governor Brady, and the Democrats are making their fight on the land board. They are doing this for the purpose of allowing the people to the real issues in our state, which are progressive Republicanism and temperance. I am a progressive Republican and a temperance man.

"Democratic orators are trying to nasal the land board because they know that our state is exceedingly in favor of our party's position on the temperance question."

"I am glad to say, however, that they do not charge me with dishonesty or graft in any form or manner, but simply say that I permitted others to profit through their positions. This is entirely untrue. I found that Register Church was using his official position in an improper manner and ousted him from office. Robert Lawson, secretary of state, had secured 530 acres of land at different times in Carey act projects, but there is no law on our statute books to prevent him from securing the land in the way he did, and everybody who knows the laws of our state is fully aware of the subject. I have always believed that an official should never be interested in any property in any manner belonging to the state, and I recommended two years ago in my message that a non-partisan Carey act board be created to handle these lands and make it a criminal offense for a state official to participate in profits. Lawson bitterly opposed my Carey act bill. We carried through the house, but he succeeded in defeating it in the senate and every Democrat in the senate voted against the bill."

"The Republican party has embodied both of these recommendations in its platform, and such a law will be passed and the Carey act lands will be handled so that the members of the land board can devote their whole attention to their other duties. The property involved consists of more than 2,000,000 acres of land and the canals are estimated to cost \$85,000,000."

Opens Campaign at Troy.
"I opened my campaign in the north at Troy Tuesday evening and I have since delivered addresses at Genesee, Moscow and Pritch. My meetings were well attended and the audiences responsive. I speak tomorrow at Bonners Ferry, Tuesday evening at Sandpoint, Wednesday at Coeur d'Alene, Thursday at St. Maries, Friday evening at Harrison and then return to the south to cover the southern counties. I will probably return and make a short stay north during the latter part of the campaign. I think that my prospects are much brighter this year than they were two years ago. I was well known at that time to a great many of the northern people, but I have come in contact with the people here and believe that my majority in the state this year will be much greater than it was two years ago."

"Our party was never in better condition in the state than it is now. Every department of state has been conducted at a profit, while during the last Democratic administration in 1901 and 1902 every department was conducted at a loss, with the exception of one which showed a profit of only \$22,000.00, while the net profit of the present administration amount to more than \$221,000.00. During the last Democratic administration they not only virtually operated every department at a loss, but also issued \$90,000 in bonds to cover the deficiency that they had created. This the Republican party had to pay off. We have paid off those bonds and in addition within the last 60 days we have redeemed \$203,000 of the state's outstanding bonds and will have money left, which, in my mind, makes an excellent showing on which to go before the people."

At the Primary the Republicans selected H. C. Vanauudeln of Piler to make the race for Sheriff of Twin Falls County at the coming election. There were three other candidates in the race for the same office. Mr. Vanauudeln went by a large and substantial majority. He received 110 more first choice votes than the nearest opponent. He led his opponents in the second choice vote with the exception of Ramsey, who received thirteen more.

This vote means something. The other candidates all hailed from the large voluk precincts, yet in the face of all this Mr. Vanauudeln was an easy winner. He believes in him, and when elected they can stand for and by the people of Idaho. Vanauudeln is well fitted for the

SOCIALIST TICKET IS CERTIFIED

Supreme Court Orders Lanson To Do So.

Noise, Idaho, Oct. 14.—A peremptory writ of mandate was issued, service accepted and certification of nomination on the socialist ticket to the county auditors undertaken by the clerical force in the office of the secretary of state, as the result of presentation of a statement to the supreme court today by Attorney General McDougall, who expressed the opinion that the delinquent to the application of Charles B. Pendleton, socialist candidate for inspector of mines, should be overruled and the writ issued. The attorney general submitted authorities to defend his own case, bringing about favorable action at the hands of the supreme court which withheld an opinion on Saturday of last week pending presentation of additional authorities in support of issuance of the writ by Karl Paime, counsel for the applicant. The authorities were, however, submitted by counsel for the state, the court then ordering the writ to issue without handing down an opinion on the legal questions raised in the arguments submitted last week.

McDougall Files Statement.
The statement filed in supreme court by Attorney General D. C. McDougall and upon which the state based its order to issue the writ follows:
"Since the argument of this case, I have gone more fully into the question

presented, and carefully examined the authorities. I conceive the law to be that when a certificate of nomination has been filed with the secretary of state, which in all respects is regular on its face, that the secretary has no right to refuse to certify the same, in the absence of a bona fide contest by one who shows beneficial interest therein."

Peremptory Writ of Mandate.
The writ of mandate is asked for in the petition of Charles B. Pendleton to compel Secretary of State Robert Lanson to certify his name on the socialist ticket to county auditors was issued by the supreme court after consideration of the statement of the attorney general.

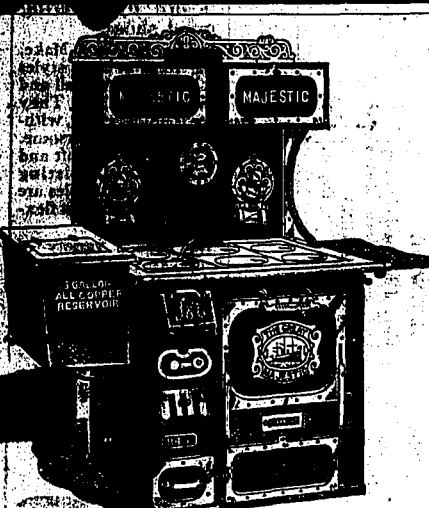
