BOISE IS PEEVED.

Blair City Takes Cry of Unfairness In Report.

The city council of Boise has gone on record as being very indignant over the report sent out from Washington, D. C., to the effect that there have been frauds in connection with the taking of the census in this city.

At its meeting Tuesday evening a ringing resolution was passed, which will be spread upon the records, and a copy will be sent to Director of the Census Durand, to the effect that Boise has been greatly wronged by the report, which has been given great prominence throughout the entire country and that in order that this city may stand in the right light before the public at large, an entire recount should be made at once.

The resolution was introduced by Councilman Walker, who said: "I believe that the city of Boise has received a direct slap from the hands of this director of the census. It is really an insult to this city, and I believe that it is up to this council as a body, representing the feeling which is prevalent in this city, to refute this charge and demand that a recount be made. We are dissatisfied before the eyes of all the country. We are accused of perpetrating a fraud which the United States statutes make a felony.

"We must take such steps as are necessary to have this charge either withdrawn or an entirely new count made. We cannot estimate the actual damage which this report will do us, not only during the present time, but in the coming 10 years.—Statesman.

It might be well for the county board to offer a reward to the first person finding someone at work on the court house. There would be little danger of the board having to pay.

If the campaign season could be changed to spring the hot air now being disseminated by the office seekers might be used for orchard heat. At any rate it may stave off the coal bill.

Every newspaper editor is a good fellow until the politicians either get into office or get in the editor. It does not take long for the editor to fall from the pinnacle of their esteem after election.

If James H. Hawley would stop berating Governor Brady in his speeches for a short time, and expound some reasons why he personally should be given the place it might make some votes for him. His raising the cry of stop the thief tends color to the idea that he does not want his own record to become the issue. A few of Jim Hawley's speeches during the local option campaign in Ada county might prove interesting at the present time.

Burton L. French in his speech of Friday night, gained a large number of votes by the manner with which he came out squarely in opposition to Cannon for speaker of the next house. Mr. French proved an interesting speaker and in his defense of the administration gave some body blows to the Democratic charge of extravagance. Mr. French is a good campaigner and seems to gain the sympathy and attention of everyone with whom he comes in contact. Mr. French has made a clean campaign free from abuse and should be able to poll a big Republican majority.

The men who are running for office on the Republican ticket are an average bunch of citizens with few who can be classed with the eternal office seekers. In such respect the ticket should appeal to the voters, because it means that men of capable business judgment will be put into office if elected. It is purely a case of the best men for the office and everything being equal, a Republican is entitled to your vote and any claim that a change in the whole administration is needed is based on a false assumption. Citizens of the county can claim such honesty and just as much as for its aspirants to office.

In spite of the protest of the Democratic press and of the rotund Tanner of Filor, the Times is going to support W. G. Thompson for the office of sheriff, believing that he is by all odds the best qualified for the place. In doing so the Times does not wish to say a word against the character of his opponent. Its reasons for supporting Mr. Thompson are sound enough to press that idea home to its readers. The enforcement of law and order is at best a hard matter and it is up to the voters to pick the man who has had the experience in such work. Mr. Thompson has that experience and also has the qualifications for the office and also has the good will and respect of every man in the county, where his record is known.

An article published in the Mining Review of Salt Lake City, reflecting on the necessity of the Twin Falls route to Jarbridge, should give the boosters here food for thought. The amount of trade which the new camp is giving to Twin Falls cannot be treated lightly. It is worth working to retain. The article in question is signed by a well-known Elko booster in the Big camp; and he is, of course, attempting to divert trade to Elko by his insinuation against the Twin Falls route. His work is coarse and some of his statements are untrue. But the fact remains that the route to the camp from here should be given more attention and consideration by the business men that it may be improved and made

so accessible that Elko or any other town's boosters cannot truthfully administer a knock. With the winter season approaching despite Elko assertions, the Twin Falls route is the only route, but it should be improved.

A point that received considerable attention from Mr. Hawley on Tuesday evening, was the charge of extravagance, which he aimed at the present administration. In submitting the figures he was wise to stop where he did, but in doing so he was guilty of unfair, although often used, methods. It was a notable fact that in the figures he quoted he failed absolutely to mention the relative revenue received in the years 1901-2 and 1909-10, facts that any thinking man demands. If it is true that a particular office raises the revenue of that office 100 per cent, it is perfectly natural to suppose that the expenses attendant upon the collection of this added amount will also increase. Yet in his speech at the Airframe he failed to mention in a single instance what the receipts were in the two contrasted periods.

The business of the state government is governed by the same laws that hold good in any business. With increased receipts there are also increased expenses, for the two go hand in hand. Why then did not Mr. Hawley give the figures in their entirety? Simply for the reason that if all were given, the charges would have no foundation. A single instance will prove this. Mr. Franz stated that the expenses of the treasurer's office showed an increase in 1909-19 over the years 1901-02 from \$5,876 to \$17,750. Yet he did not recognize or state that the revenue of this office in the years mentioned had increased from nothing to \$87,765. Viewed in this light then, the charges fall flat and show the unfair methods used.

That the Democrats are trying to hide the real issue of the campaign was acknowledged by Mr. Hawley in his speech Tuesday night, when he said: "You who believe that the temperance question is the paramount one, realize that in placing the emphasis on that you are sacrificing efficient administration at its expense." He then confessed that two years ago he made a careful canvass of the saloons in the territory that he campaigned for Moses Alexander, and bid for their support and for their influence with this argument, "I called the attention of the saloonkeepers to the fact that Brady was for local option and said 'Why shouldn't you vote for the Democratic ticket, for we have made no promises on local option and you have a chance with us.' I did not go to one, but to every saloonkeeper, to solicit votes for my candidate." In these words Mr. Hawley has stated clearly what he does not regard the temperance issue, as the issue. He admits that he solicited the vote of the saloon element two years ago. Yet in this campaign he stands as the exponent of temperance.

He made no attempt to refute the oft repeated charge that in a Boise speech he declared the local option law to be an "iniquitous" one, and that "it was not an enactment to advance the cause of temperance, but a make-shift for scheming politicians." In the same introductory speech he declared that "there are some men who pretended to be local optionists but who are so far for political purposes only." Yet in the face of this, Mr. Hawley is adroitly getting over the biggest stumbling block in the road of his political success, by standing for a measure that he declared to be "a make-shift for politicians." In his speech he stated that he had Governor Brandy on the horns of a dilemma but seemed to ignore the fact that he is in the same position. Either he is sincere in standing on a plank that his party has accepted or he was insincere when he introduced Mayor Rose some months ago. His speech at the Airframe left in no doubt and unless the still, small voice of other Democrats set the voters right, the effect left by the gubernatorial aspirant will be that of a jingle of words. His two utterances cannot be reconciled and are capable of equivocation.

THE CAUSES OF REVOLUTION.

It is possible that the dynasty of Braganza is at the end of its fortunes, so far as Portugal is concerned. It is one of the oldest in Europe, dating from the fourteenth century, when Alfonso, illegitimate son of King Joao I, was created Duke of Braganza. When, in 1580, the old line of Portuguese kings became extinct, Philip II of Spain, in virtue of his descent from a Portuguese princess, became King of Portugal; but in 1640 Don Juan, the then Duke of Braganza, dispossessed the Spaniards and was proclaimed King. If the later Braganzas had shown an intelligent comprehension of the spirit of the times, the dynasty might still have remained entrenched; but the reigning house has been something like the people of Portugal—more detached than any other in Europe from modern tendencies. The Portuguese have not even paid attention to ordinary education, and nearly four-fifths of them do not know how to read or write. The news of last week's revolution will be slow in coming to

many of them. They are mostly agriculturists. For generations Portugal has been misgoverned and plundered by two political rings alternating in office, the comically misnamed Progressistas and Regeneradores, who have plunged the country deeply into debt and stolen public money wholesale. Even this, however, the ignorant populace might have borne had it not been for the better advertised lavish and sometimes unworthy expenditures by members of the royal house, culminating, it is said, in those of the young King himself. This was cleverly taken advantage of by certain conservatives and adherents of the Pretender to the throne, who, angered at the young King's recent attempts at liberalism, made secret and common cause with the revolutionaries. They, however, disarmed the criticism that they too are "grafters" by putting to the fore Portugal's stanchest and most dignified figure. Teofilo Braga is about sixty-five years old, and has devoted his life to study. He has written a great deal of poetry, but his chief work is a history of Portuguese literature. We hope that he will prove himself a man of action rather than a theorist and academic doctrinaire. He has issued a proclamation to the Militars of the foreign Powers at Lisbon declaring that, in the establishment of the provisional government is a guarantee of public safety and order, and has issued a manifesto to the people that the republic is for all of them, and that therefore it expects the officers of the army and navy who have not taken part in the revolutionary movement to present themselves at headquarters to guarantee loyalty to the new administration. This is indeed the critical condition before the new government. It could not have come into being without the dissatisfaction of the army and navy, and there remain army and navy forces still loyal to the King. There is thus really as yet no assurance that a strong republic will take the place of a weak monarchy.—The Outlook.

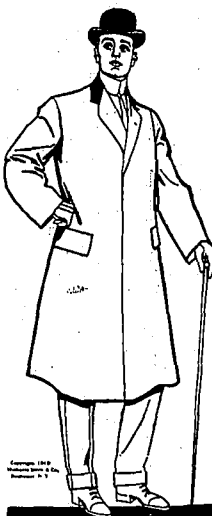

"That" the state will issue individual patents to the settlers.

A request was submitted to the board by State Engineer Martin advising against this, there being no water rights to sell more water rights, and the board denied the application accordingly.

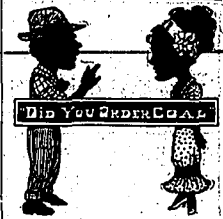
