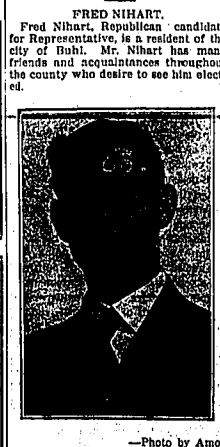

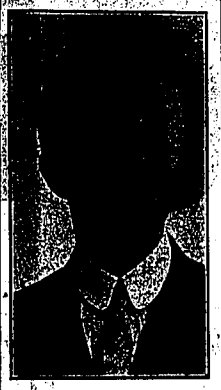
L. G. HAYFORD

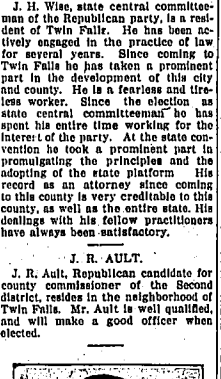

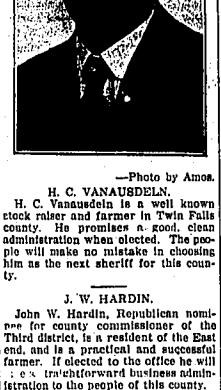

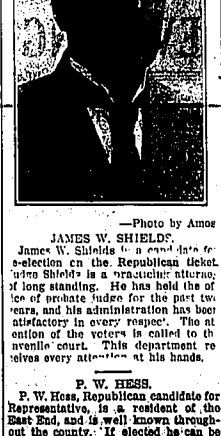

He has held the office of probate judge for the past two years, and his administration has been satisfactory in every respect. The opinion of the voters is called to the attention of the county. and his election will mean a continuance of the present good moral conditions in the county and city. Mr. W. G. Thompson, the Democratic nominee for sheriff, stands on his present splendid record in the city as chief of police and is worthy of the support of all voters who believe in enforcement of laws irrespective of persons. The fact that certain sympathizers with the lawless element are knitting Mr. Thompson because of his well-known ideas on enforcement should cause every citizen to give him support in the Tuesday election.

SOME WORDS THAT RING TRUE.
Spoken By Robert J. Burdette.
What does a man owe to his town?
"He owes this duty to himself and the town—to OWN a part of it. Ever so small a lot. If he can't own a big one. A forty foot front. If he can do no better. But he should OWN a part of the town. That gives him a stake in

"That man who owns a home in the town never calls his town IT. When he speaks of it, whether it be London or Tall-Holl, New York or Walkkik, he says WE—OUR town. And he has a right to. He is a stockholder, a partner.

"More than that, when he owns a piece of ground, farm or town lot, he has a stake in the EARTH. He is a citizen of the universe. His property extends from the brimstone out to the stars. Even now, they are disputing concerning the right of an airship to sail through the air over a man's house without the owner's permission. The very thought is enough to make a man feel chummy. And with good cause. "A man who owns his home begins to study his ticket six weeks before election day. He scrutinizes every name on it, and looks up the candidate's record. It is the man who can tie up his real and personal property in a handkerchief that shuts his eyes and votes the ticket the boss gives him without unfolding it."

"A man owes it to his town to boost it, in public on all occasions, and at all times. The correction of its failings and faults are for the privacy of the home circle. A man who would thrash his boy on the front steps of the court house ought to be whipped out of town. The citizen who welcomes the stranger by telling him what a rotten city government we have, what a corrupt set of officials misrule the town; how the town lags behind the age in all matters of progress and de-

velopment, that it is a dead town and will be, so long as certain men rule it, is an undesirable citizen.

"When a man tells you that what his town needs is half a dozen first-class funerals, he may be correct. But HE should be the first to be buried."

"A man owes it to his own town to about its advantages from the house-tops. The entire registry list should be the promotion committee. If necessary, put blinders on the visitor, and let him see, but what you WANT him to see. When he asks you what chance a poor man has in town, tell him the truth. Tell him the poor man is the only man who has a chance. And that is no joke. Show him the beautiful homes of the men who came here with a capital of working hands and thinking brains. Tell him the story of the man who began with day wages. Tell him you think there should be a law compelling the poor man to give the rich man a handicap when they come into competition with each other, so as to give the rich man a chance. It is penniless boys like John Rockefeller, Andrew Carnegie, Phil Armour, and that class, who backed the rich men's sons, of their poverty-stricken days, clear off the earth."

With this issue The Times makes its final appeal to the voters of the county to use reason and intelligence in voting the ticket on Tuesday next. The issues in some cases make no difference in the support of the candidates, it being merely a question of qualifications for the office. This applies to the county officers in particular, with the exception of those who have to deal directly with the lawbreakers, like the prosecuting attorney and the sheriff. The best man for the office, irrespective of political prejudice will in a large measure bring about the reforms needed in the county offices. It is a question of the honor and honesty of the candidate whether extravagance and neglect of duty are to be his conception of public office holding, or whether in his conception of political office citizenship and righteousness are placed before party loyalty. No man, Republican or Democrat, should ever be guilty of sinking sense of moral fitness of candidates below that of a merely servile loyalty to the party as an organization. If the principles of your party are right it is no guaranty that the man standing upon that platform is a fit person or a morally responsible man to carry such principles. If such moral responsibility exists in the man who is standing on the Republican platform your secondary loyalty should bind you to the party only to that extent. The people of the state

of Idaho are on trial as to their moral fitness for franchise. The direct primary law did that for the voters of the state. The primary election eliminated all of the objectionable state candidates from the Republican list and placed on the ticket candidates who are truly representatives of the people. The Republican ticket stands for some needed legislation with Governor Brady pledged to its support. In order that it may be safeguarded after passage in the house and senate it is necessary that a Republican governor be elected. Governor Brady has kept his pledges during the past two years and can be counted upon to do his duty for another two. The state ticket without exception is far beyond average in its strong and able men on it. Your vote will not be a regret to you after election if you vote for the entire state ticket this fall.

In the county the voter is urged to support the Republican candidates for the legislature in order that the pledges of the platform may be carried out. The character of the candidates for the legislature cannot be attacked in any way either as to their ability or their integrity. 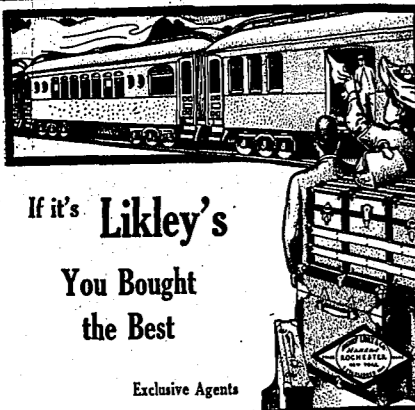

HAWLEY AND HAYS

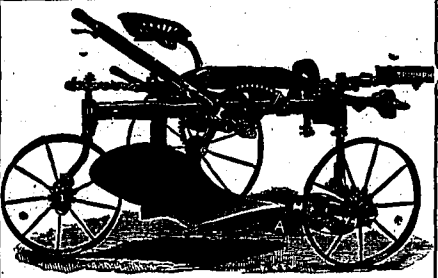

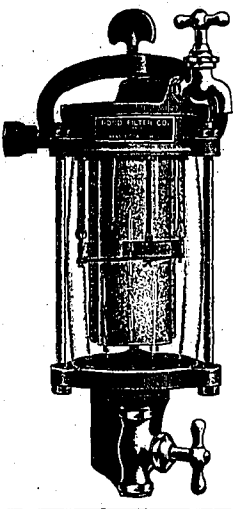

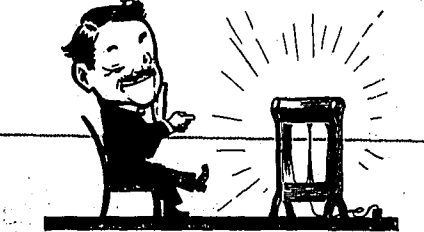

CONVENTION FOR THE WEST

San Francisco To Be the Scene of Active Conference.

The west will meet in San Francisco November 17th, and have a calm, serious talk concerning the problems of the Pacific Slope States, the progress that may be made through co-operation, and the achievements the next few years may witness. The conference will last three days. It has been called by Governor J. N. Gillett of California, and termed the Pacific Coast Congress. Governors of eight states, officials of those states and of three territories, including New Mexico, Hawaii and Alaska, mayors of all important towns within these closely-allied sections, and prominent men from the whole western country will be present when the congress opens. It promises to inaugurate a new and most significant epoch in the history of the United States that thus far has not attracted particular consideration in the councils of the nation.

For three days San Francisco will make these several hundred prominent westerners her guests, and the occasion will end in a monster banquet, at the conclusion of which a speech or two will be made expressing the sense of the gathering. It may be decided to let the states work out their problems separately, as has been done in the past; perhaps the congress will go on record as the father of a new western union—a solid west—that will work one when striving for benefits the west believes it should have.

At any rate several issues that have been agitating the west for a generation will be fought out. The attitude of the Pacific coast states—of Idaho, Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico, Washington, Nevada, Utah, Oregon, California, Hawaii and Alaska—on an American merchant marine, a battleship fleet for the Pacific, and the scope of the expedition San Francisco and San Diego hope to give in 1915 will be determined upon. These are things for which a strong sentiment has been growing for some time.

But just what the congress will do is a matter of speculation. In every respect those who attend the conference are left entirely free to express their opinions and suggest future work. Care is being taken by those behind the congress to select speakers, even, that have no selfish political standing in their own states—men without obligations, or interests to serve. It will be a clearing house of ideas. Perhaps the most important feature of the conference will be the decision as to whether or not the congress will be made an annual affair. If this is decided upon it will mean that definite policies will be agreed upon, solidly worked for, and reported upon each year. It will mean that the west will decide to unite in making its requests of the nation.

The movement to call the congress had its inception in the desire of the Merchant Marine League of California to express an opinion on the Pacific coast states as to their attitude upon an American merchant marine. But already the congress has outgrown this one function, and became a western parliament. It may become one of

GOODING FOR R. R. COMMISSION

Shows How O. S. L. Dominates In Southern Idaho Despite Protests.

Former Governor Gooding at Rathdrum, on October 23, openly espoused the cause of a railroad commission, and declared it to be necessary. In view of the attitude of various state commercial clubs, this is significant. He explained at length the struggle that the people of southern Idaho have waged against the Oregon Short Line railroad for fair treatment and aid in the purpose of his present trip. He was to enlist the help of the people of north Idaho in urging the passage of a law creating a state railway commission. He said it is the only remedy to break the railroad domination in this state. He said the railroads had controlled the legislators in both parties by giving free masses and by other means. He urged that all forms of trust and corporation control in Idaho must stop in the interests of good government, and incidentally lauded Colonel Roosevelt for his efforts along these lines and in behalf of the people. To show the necessity of a railway commission, Mr. Gooding read a letter from Governor M. E. Hay of Washington in which the latter stated that the state once having such a commission would not be without it, that under its provisions in Washington shippers have been saved hundreds of thousands of dollars in freight rates, and that the assessed valuation in that state has been increased from \$35,000,000 to over \$100,000,000. He urged the need of a state railway commission statistics to show that freight rates for hauling grain from Chicago to New York amount to about one cent a bushel per hundred miles, while between Lewiston and Portland, Ore., the rate is over 3 cents, and between Idaho Falls and Salt Lake, 9 cents.
