# THE VALUE OF PRAYER

**THE VALUE OF PRAYER**  
Nehemiah's Position for Israel.  
Nehemiah—November 25.

"The official, earnest prayer of a righteous man avails much."—James v, 16.

Thirteen years after Ezra's company returned to Jerusalem, Nehemiah went to the king of Persia to rebuild the wall of Jerusalem and to restore its people. It would appear that Ezra's people, brought against them the violent opposition of their neighbors, as was to have been expected. The Jews, considering the numbers, were despised by their neighbors, who wished to drive them out of the land. The wall of the city was poor and did not withstand the attack.

Josephus says that Nehemiah, wealthy and favored of the king of Persia, resided in the king's palace at Susa, and that he was a man and deeply interested in the land of his fathers. While walking one day he overheard two men talking in the Hebrew language. One of them had been to Jerusalem and had returned. One of them proved to be his own relative. He gladly inquired regarding the city and its prospects. The other told him the story of the Jews' God's temple, and concerning the Jews who had returned from Babylon. The sad story of their trials and the desolation of the city and its exposure to enemies touched his heart and led him to pray. That prayer is the subject of this lesson.

Indubitably the recorded prayer of Nehemiah is merely an epitomized statement, for we read that he made the matter a subject of earnest prayer for four months before he reached the wall of action where God used him in the fulfillment of his own petition. This reminds us of how our Lord instructed His disciples, saying, "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that He would send forth more laborers into His harvest." While the disciples thus prayed it would imply that they would be laboring in accordance with their prayers, that they would be doing all in their own power to forward the harvest work, as well as to interest other laborers in the same. It must always be that earnest effort will accompany prayer. Prayers not accompanied by efforts brand themselves as failures. The prayer which is not of faith is insincere, sacrilegious.

**The Soul's Sincere Desire.**  
The poet has well defined prayer as being "the soul's sincere desire, uttered or unexpressed." Another has defined it as "the Christian's vital breath," that is, to say, Christian character cannot be maintained without prayer any more than a human life can be sustained without breathing. Who has not noticed that all the great Bible characters used of the Almighty were accustomed to go to him regularly in prayer and to seek for guidance from Him in respect to every matter? Even the great Redeemer, holy, harmless, undefiled and separate from sinners, needed to pray to the Father—needed His fellowship and communion—needed to be in touch with the Infinite One. Several of His prayers are recorded and we read that He spent the entire night in prayer on more than one occasion.

Some may ask, Would the Almighty change His plans in answer to our petitions? Assuredly He would not. Indeed, on the contrary, we are cautioned in the Scriptures to ask only according to His will. We are warned that if we ask amiss our petitions will not be answered. Hence the necessity for studying God's Word and being enlightened thereby respecting

the Divine program in His Word, and in harmony therewith, to receive strength and encouragement through the answer to our petitions.

The Redeemer was the perfect man, His abiding in Me, and My word abiding in you, ye may ask what ye will and it shall be done unto you." (John 15, 7.)

Let us review the two limitations of this promise:

(1) The one asking must be in Christ—abiding in Him. This means that the petitioner has turned from sin, has accepted Christ and the terms of discipleship. It implies that he has made a full consecration of his new life to the Father, and become a new creature in Christ Jesus. Such abiding in Christ, may pray to the Father.

(2) After having come into membership and fellowship with the Head of the Church, these must ask in harmony with God's Word and promises; in order to know what things to ask for, they must abide with the Head of the Church, that the man of God may be thoroughly furnished.

So far as the world is concerned, many of the ideas and principles of laws under the permission of natural laws with which God does not generally interfere. It is in the affairs of His consecrated people that God desires us His highest and special interests. These are so supervised by His Providence that He guarantees His children that all things shall work together for good to them who love Him. God is pleased to make use of the little talents possessed by His consecrated people, and their usefulness as ambassadors for God in their families and our cities, will depend very much upon the earnestness of their prayers and endeavors. Those who pray for opportunity to serve the Lord and His cause and who watch for the fulfillment of their prayers in the open doors of opportunity will surely have them. "For he that sows bountifully, and to him that knocketh it shall be opened."

**What to Pray for**  
The baptized in Christ may pray for earthly necessities, as in the Lord's prayer, "Give us this day our daily bread," but we are not to pray for more than the bread of special interest. The Lord has authorized His people to pray for the true Christian, instead of thinking about what he shall do for the man of God, and that which will be clothed—instead of making earthly things the subject of his prayers, will be thinking of his prayers, about his highest and heavenly interests. 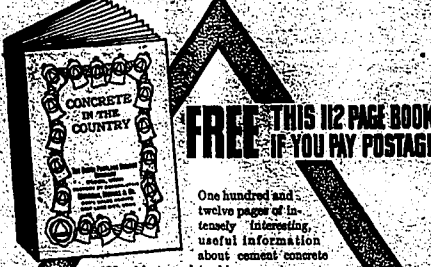

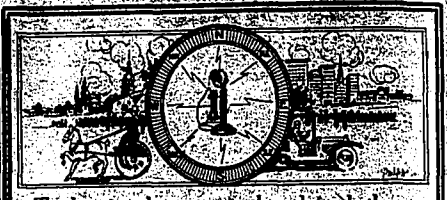

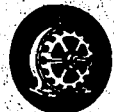

**THAT ROBBETT PARDON**  
 The question as to just how far state's evidence should be allowed to count in justification of an offense is brought to public attention in a striking style through the action of President Taft in granting an unconditional pardon to Clarence W. Robbett on the same day that the self-confessed bank thief was sentenced to ten years by the United States court of Idaho.

Governor Hawley in a statement to the public declares unconditionally that the chief executive was deceived into this action by agents of the United States attorney general's office. He goes farther and says that the people of Idaho should bitterly resent the entire line of procedure indulged in by the special prosecutors of the government who secured the services of Robbett to enable them to obtain a five-year sentence for Kester and Kottenbach on a purely technical charge, while the man who actually furnished the books, got the money and spent it, all of which Robbett has cheerfully admitted time and again, goes scot free.

Apart altogether from the political aspect of the case, it does seem a queer brand of justice which will permit of such practices. Kester and Kottenbach were the owners of the Lewiston National bank. They were men of large means and large operations. They were good citizens, public spirited men and admittedly of splendid value to the community. Clarence W. Robbett was a ledger keeper in the bank, a protégé of the owners and a good clerk for the \$100 salary which was paid him. He looked the institution; with the aid of others he financed land schemes for his own gain, covering his speculations with false entries. He stole small sums and large and finally, when the show down came, he was indicted by a grand jury along with the rest of the bank officials.

Then came the long series of trials in which the fine Italian hand of the special agents of the government was apparent from the start. It is admitted that it was largely on account of Robbett's testimony that Kester and Kottenbach were sentenced to five years' imprisonment. The sentence was pronounced on the count which accused them of rendering false statements to the comptroller of the currency. This was five or six years ago.

Now to bring this about it was necessary to make a farce of justice; sentence the real thief to twice this term of service and the same day turn him loose on the world a free man. Now the question is, Was the service worth the price. Are such practices to be regarded as properly serving the ends of justice or of defeating them? This pardon will hardly tend to increase the popularity of the special prosecutors of the attorney general's office in Idaho.

**PREPARING FOR BIG DITCH.**  
 The Panama canal will be opened to ships June 1, 1919, according to the annual report of the isthmian canal commission, just made public. This date is fixed, unless some unforeseen cause delays the opening, as President Taft warned us might be the case in his speech at Bellingham, Washington. Considering that the engineer's estimates have been on the basis of opening two years later, the progress made on the canal is highly creditable. Because of the prospect, the commission urgently recommends legislation by congress to govern canal tolls and to provide for permanent operation and administration of the great waterway. 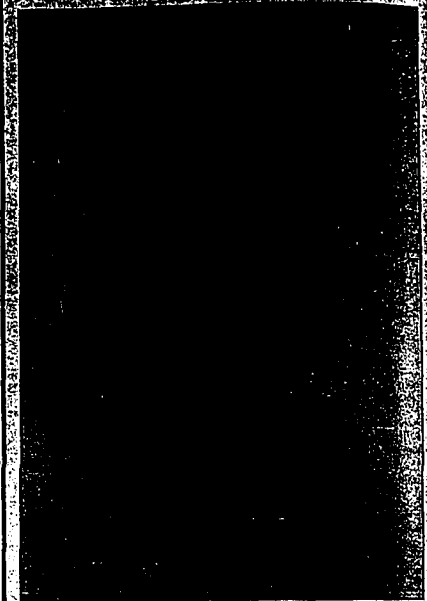
