SPEAKERS AT CONVENTION

LEAD IN TWIN FALLS AT THE

PRESIDENTS PRESENTED THAT

Twin Falls is Coming Dairy Country

The banquet given by the Commercial Club to the speakers of the State Convention at the Hotel Perrine on Thursday evening, January 4, was well attended and proved a most agreeable affair.

Cards were laid for 16, and at 7 o'clock Secretary McCall introduced the speaker, the newly elected president of the association. His subject was "The Future of the Dairy Industry in the Twin Falls Trade and Markets," showed a remarkable knowledge of the conditions which make for the ideal dairy country. While the industry is in an experimental stage at the present time, he is able to draw past experiences to predict what things for the future with considerable degree of accuracy. He demonstrated that it can produce unlimited quantities of butter, cream, and with an ideal climate, an aromatic and delicious cheese. There is no reason why it should not from rank to rank in the dairy country." In this opinion President D. R. Hubbard fully concurred.

The growth of the dairy industry in the Past Decade was the chief topic assigned to the retiring president, D. R. Hubbard, who gave full details from the inception of the movement up to the present time. As an example of the progress being made he pointed to the fact that the attendance on Thursday afternoon was over 1,000, as against 200 for a corresponding period last year.

Professor A. R. Blaser spoke of the task of the USA Dairy Inspector of the Twin Falls Trade, whom he will be appointed in the near future. Professor Blaser stated that such a man would be invaluable to the dairymen, as he will be able to advise them on how to obtain the best butterfat, how to obtain a balanced diet, tests for butter fat, so to speak, the "borders" or nonproducing animals, and thus bring up the efficiency of the herd.

Mr. W. L. Parker, editor of the "Globe," gave a humorous talk on the "Milkmen of Idaho," and was much appreciated. It may be mentioned that "Bounty" is the name of the editor's cow.

W. J. Anstett, Farmer on the North Hill, by H. E. Walker, through his update, A. J. Johnson, the east representative of the Snake King, was negative. However, his arguments were well received by the audience, and he was allowed to remain.

W. M. McAllister gave a talk on the uses and abuses of the subject assigned to Gustave Kunze, the returnee chosen member of the club. Mr. Kunze endeavored to communicate the manufacturers of this article with a year's history of the business, and said in the West End City that Twin Falls shows a tendency to confound everything in sight; he believed Bush would allow to retain possession of the factory in peace. Taking on the character in a serious vein, he stated that opportunity was excellent for the production of cheese, and world-wide opportunities offer this branch of business in the future.

Results of Judging Contest

Samitation in Dairy

Professor G. H. Maughan of the Academy of Idaho at Pocatello was the first speaker on the subject of "Sanitation in His Barns on 'The Care of Milk on the Farm'." Sanitation was the point he brought out in his discussion.

He urged the farmers to be very careful about letting dirt go into the milk, as much of the dirt that gets into the milk comes from the cows.

The subject of pastures was also discussed by Mr. Bark and he recommended as a good mixture of seeds for pastures the following: Three pounds red clover, 1/2 pounds Kentucky blue grass, 1/2 pounds bromegrass, 6 pounds rye grass, and 6 pounds timothy grass, making a total of 25 pounds of the mixture.

Good Individuals Necessary

John T. Calfee of the Utah Agricultural college gave an interesting talk on "The Economics of the Dairy Business," and advised the farmers to get new utensils, buildings, and machinery, new utensils.

The necessity of a state inspector who would not only inspect the dairies, but one who would know enough about dairying to give the farmers some information, was urged by Prof. T. C. Calfee.
