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POWER COMPANY FILES SUIT

Charges Beaver Dam Company With Destroying Power Line—Ask Damages to the Amount of \$25,000.

The Great Shoshone and Twin Falls Water Power company has brought suit in the district court of Lincoln county against the Beaver Dam Power company and J. L. Nunn, its president.

The Great Shoshone and Twin Falls Water Power company, which is a Kuhn concern, alleges that employees of the Beaver River company, under the direction of L. L. Nunn and A. L. Woodhouse, destroyed a large part of the former company's high tension power line between Glenns Ferry and Mountain Home.

A. L. Woodhouse, who is said to be a director of the Beaver River company, was indicted in the district court of Lincoln county under section 7116 of the Revised Statutes of Idaho, prohibiting the removal of the wires or power companies from poles or brackets or from buildings to which they are attached.

The suit is for \$25,000 damages for the destruction of the power line, and also for \$25,000 imprisonment in the penitentiary not to exceed 10 years.

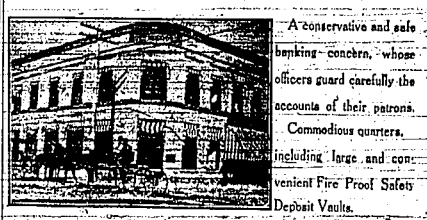

Family Telephone Organization

Modern conditions have brought about the need for what might be called a long distance telephone organization of the family.
