A BAD FAULT.

That the present Idaho direct primary law is distinctly weak in one important particular can be seen to advantage in the recent primary

can be seen to advantage in the recent primary
here.

The fact that there is no provision whatever
in the law whereby the Democrats can be kept
from voting the Republican ticket, and vice
versa constitutes a menace to the fundamental
principle of the whole direct primary theory.
It means that candidates of one political faith
may be beaten at the polls by votes cast by
members of another political faith
may be beaten at the polls by votes cast by
members of another political faith entirely.
It serves to obscure the real wish of the people of each party as to candidates, it influences
the selection of candidates FROM OUTSIDE
THE PARTY, and this is something which
was never intended by the framers of the bill.
The present state of affairs politically in
Lincoln county constitutes the best evidence
so far obtainable of the impracticability of the
law in its present form. And the worst of it is
that there is no way to stop such practices under any law now on the statute books. The

handing out of a Democratic and Republican-ballot to all alike at the polls seems to be the main weakness. Yet it would not in all cases be sufficient to mak each voter which theet he desired to vote unless the judges also be given desired to vote unless the judges also be given the right to make the voter swear his party af-illation where there is any ground whatever for the belief that any voter is violating party affiliation in the matter of the ballot. After all there is no more reason why pri-mary voters should not be challenged and event thin in the case of valves in the election

After all facer is no note reason way planty voters should not be challenged and sworn than in the case of voters in the election. If a man be forced to declare his politics before his election-vote, why not have the same rule in effect at the primary? Indeed, such a law did exist for a brief time, but was vetoed by Governor Hawley for no apparent reason and without a trial of any kind as to the practical working of such a plant.

This is the only plant if the direct primary is to-become really effective in the selection-of-party candidates. With such a provision there would be no recombered and an on the ballot; and a repetition of the troubles encountered in a number of counters as a result of the last primaries would be an impossibility.

THE BRIDGE BONDS.

It is a matter of regret that the good people of Bith! and the surrounding torritors, were, not altogether favorable to the proposition to expend, twenty-five thousand dollars for new bridges in the county.

Such a step would have been little if any extra burden to the tax-pays and would have given Buhi and the west generally a substantial interest in the new fund, which, as matters now stand, is distinctly


