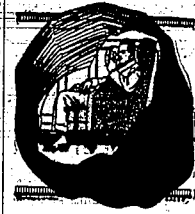

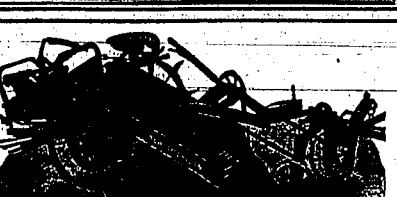

### SMITH'S ELECTION IS WELCOMED IN CAPITAL

STANDS HIGH IN THE RANKS OF A PARTY SERVICE.

Congressman-Elect Jo Well Known in Washington—Political Circles—His Return There to the House Is Well Received.

The Evening Star, a leading paper in Washington, D. C. was quick to announce the election of Adolph T. Smith as a congressman from Idaho, after being officially connected with the senate for the past twenty years.

"For more than twenty years Mr. Smith has been in Washington during the sessions of congress, and for the greater part of that time he has been officially connected with the senate."

"During the two years following he remained in Washington at the senate's request, to represent him as the Republican national committeeman from Idaho."

"When Nelson B. Gardner was elected from Idaho in 1903, Mr. Smith became his secretary, and held that office continuously, except for one year when he was secretary of the United States land office at Boise."

In Party's Service.

"Mr. Smith's service to the Republican party organization in Idaho began in the campaign of 1905, when he acted as assistant secretary of the state central committee. During the campaign of 1902 he was secretary to the vice chairman and took charge of most of the correspondence. In 1904 he became secretary to the state committee, a position which he held during the four succeeding campaigns. In Washington he continued his service as state secretary, and was re-elected about a year ago. He is a graduate of the George Washington University, and attended the law course in the National Law School, both of these being in Washington."

### O. S. L. IMPROVEMENTS

Sliding Being Laid and Material Arriving for New Bridge Across Rock Creek.

Extended improvements are being made in the local Oregon Short Line yards, in the way of additional tracks, and a quantity of material in one hand is being used to reconstruct the Rock Creek to replace the present structure. Both improvements have been needed for a long time and will be completed in a few days. In the way of trackwork, a new siding is being laid parallel to the main track from east of the stockyards to the west end of the yard, a track fitted with heavy steel for the carrying of heavy traffic, and will be used both for siding and a passing track. The new bridge will be a trestle structure capable of carrying the heaviest of rolling stock and trains. The present bridge will not bear the weight of the large locomotives, which the road plans putting into service on this branch after the improvements are completed.

### FINE PAINTING EXHIBITED

George Schroeder Completes Oil Picture of Shoshone Falls—Is Attracting Much Attention.

There is being exhibited in the office of the Loggerson hotel a magnificent oil painting of Shoshone falls, by George Schroeder, the well-known Idaho artist. This picture is being met with much interest and is attracting much attention.

Selecting the morning hours in which to get the most perfect and effective light on the scene, Mr. Schroeder put the first stroke of paint on the canvas at the early hour of four, one morning of this month, and the result his lighting is exceptionally effective and the tinted sky carries with it that clear coolness of the early morning. The perspective is perfect, yet the distant rim rock stands out clearly, and the nearest waters look as if they were actually moving over the precipice and the spray seems to be actually rising from the depths of the falling torrent. The immense rock-delta at the right stands out against the background of water seemingly measuring exactly the distance in the rock scene. The lady standing on the ledge at the right shows the proportion of the human stature to the magnificent height of the falls. One who views this scene

is struck by the many beauties of the hotel from which the view of this picture was taken can realize no better lights than are brought out in his canvas. The artist who has studied the river scenes for a number of years chose the early morning as the time when the beauties of the swift waters, the black canyon walls and the Idaho sky were at their height.

Mr. Schroeder, who makes his home in Burley, has been frequently complimented by eminent artists of the east on the beauty and realism of his productions, and he is gradually coming to be known and appreciated by leading artists everywhere and has attracted the attention of the American Society of Artists, an exclusive organization to which only the best American artists can belong. 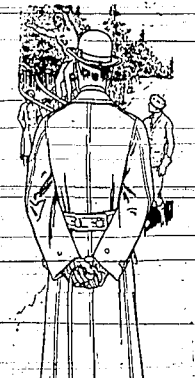
The members of the board who did the active work in securing these two dramas were W. Zeans Smith, W. E. Nixon and Professor O. M. Elliott.

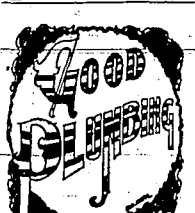

# POSTMASTERSHIP IS DEMOCRATIC GOAL

### TANGIBLE EVIDENCE OF RECENT VICTORY BOUGHT BY MANY.

Most of Candidates for Local Federal Job—C. W. Dyer Talked of For United States Marshal.

That "to the victor belong the spoils" is a belief thoroughly carried in by a good many local Democrats is plainly evident in this section of the state of Idaho.

Almost before the results of the election had been fully determined an unusually large flock of prospective officeholders made its appearance on the streets of the city.

So far the postmaster is the lone exception in all but one. The lone exception is C. W. Dyer, late candidate for sheriff in Twin Falls county, on the Democratic ticket. Dyer himself is mum on the subject, but those who know him as a thoroughly capable officer are looking upon Dyer as being seriously in the running for the post of United States marshal in Idaho. Not only is he a Democrat in good standing, but he was for years a close personal friend of former Senator Dubois, whom rumor points to as the man who will have much to say in the handling of federal patronage in Idaho.

Only One Petition. The embryonic post masters are out in force among these being Mike Sirok, defeated Democratic candidate to succeed himself as county commissioner, Phil Crow, a Democratic attaché of the present court house administrator, John Kline, J. A. Macaulay, and so forth of others. So far Sirok is the only man whose ambitions have risen to the height of a petition, but all are in the race and it is understood that there are several more getting ready to announce themselves. Mr. Sirok's petition merely calls for an endorsement for himself for the postmastership "in the event of change." The Democrats, together with a good sprinkling of Republicans. Of those mentioned, Sirok's chances are probably the best "in the event of a change."

Friends of the present incumbent of the office give it as their opinion that it is very unlikely that there will be any change until the expiration of the term of the commission now in effect, and add that if anything of the kind seems probable they will amass it vigorously.

There is a distinct shortage of Democratic candidates for other minor jobs, over which considerable disappointment has been expressed. However, the Democrats seem to believe that they can be counted upon to take care of any ordinary emergency in the way of a job when it offers.

- No. 3, limiting state bonded indebtedness—Yes 1,878, no 711.
- No. 4, number of state senators and representatives—Yes 1,954, no 657.
- No. 5, the recall, excluding judiciary—Yes 2,345, no 476.
- No. 6, optional labor clause—Yes 1,055, no 795.
- No. 7, education and public schools—Yes 2,001, no 652.
- No. 8, county treasurer as tax collector—Yes 1,094, no 655.
- No. 9, employment of deputy tax collectors—Yes 1,338, no 677.

## BOOTLEGGING IS CHARGED

Sheriff's Office Rounds Up Six Men Claimed to Have Been Selling Liquor.

Hearings on charges of illegal sale of liquor and maintaining a nuisance are being given in Justice Smith's court for "Doc" Padgett, J. H. Harrison, J. E. Healy, Roy Hager, A. T. Drell and Jack Jones, against whom the charges were preferred by the sheriff's office last Saturday. Padgett, Harrison and Treley were arraigned yesterday and the court has taken their cases under advisement relative to the hearing on Saturday in the district court. The remaining cases will be heard today and tomorrow.

It is alleged that evidence has been secured against the defendants, and that liquor was found in their places of business when a wholesale raid was conducted last Saturday. All arrests were made on the charge of bootlegging having been secured for some time prior to the filing of the affidavits for arrest. J. H. Parman, the main witness for the state in the preliminary hearings, alleges to have purchased the liquor, claiming to have caught the defendants by means of marked paper money.

## EGG SUPPLY WILL NEVER MEET THE DEMAND

## SCHRANK PLEADS GUILTY

"How do you plead to the charge?" the prosecutor asked the prisoner, standing at his elbow, holding over his arm a black cloth overcoat.

Enters Plea of Guilty.

"Why, guilty," Mr. Galbel, replied the prisoner in confusion, as though afraid he might not be following the proper procedure.

"You have heard the complaint?" interposed Judge Backus. "You understand that in it you are charged with having attempted to murder Theodore Roosevelt? Do you plead guilty or not guilty?"

Explains His Crime.

"I did not mean to kill a citizen," Judge Backus said. "I shot Theodore Roosevelt because he was a menace to the country and should not have a third term. It is bad that a man should have a third term. I did not want him to have one. I shot him as a warning that a man must not try to have more than two terms as president. I shot Theodore Roosevelt to let him know that I was going to keep myself in office should be killed. They become dangerous. I did not do it because he was a candidate of the Progressive party, either, gentlemen."
