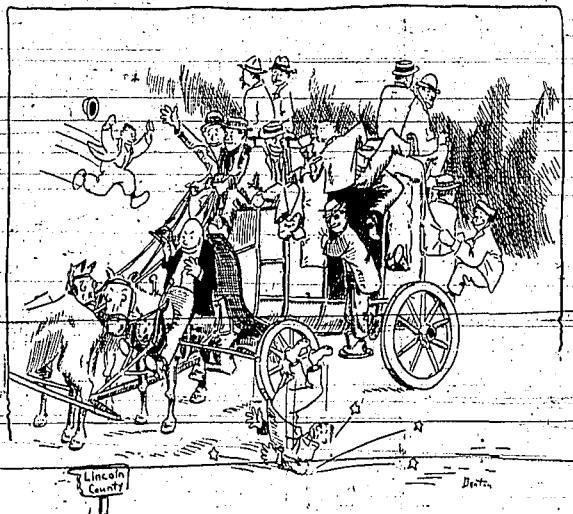

OUR EARLY RAILROADS.

A curious relic of railroad operation some thirty years ago in Tennessee is being shown at the following extracts from the rules then in force. The engineer will keep a watch which shall be regulated by the time of his conductor at the commencement of each trip and will always have, in his possession, the current schedule book.

Should any stock be killed which may be likely to endanger the safety of the train, the engineer shall stop his train until track is cleared. As a general rule, when trains meet the train nearest the train shall be the first to stop. Any dispute as to which train has the right to pass shall be determined at once by the conductors without interference on the part of the engineer.

EXPERT DAIRYMEN VISITING THE TRACT

FIND CONDITIONS HERE, IN FIRST CLASS SHAPE

E. F. Rhinehart and J. E. Dorman Much Pleased Over Dairying Advantages of Southern Idaho—Best in the Country.

E. F. Rhinehart, state dairy promoter, with the agricultural department of the state university, and J. E. Dorman, of Salt Lake, who is in charge of the western dairy investigations for the Federal government, have been spending a few days on the tract in the interest of their department. Mr. Dorman has been but recently assigned to the supervision of the work in the western states.

Mr. Rhinehart was here six weeks ago and stated yesterday that he is much pleased with the work that has been done by the dairymen during that time in taking up the work as outlined by him on his last visit. He is especially interested in having the dairymen and stockmen equip themselves with silos, and states that several will be erected on the tract during the next year. Caspary county, according to Mr. Rhinehart, is foremost in the state with respect to silos and dairy barns. He is much encouraged over the work of the past year and a half and sees no reason why the tract and southern Idaho should not rank first in this department in view of all the advantages for dairying purposes.

This was Mr. Dorman's first trip to southern Idaho. He has been stated that the tract looks better from a dairy standpoint than any other in the country, California and Wisconsin having nothing to equal it. He is at this time getting acquainted with his field and expects to frequently visit the various states in the western field. He has been with the Federal government in the department of dairying for the past 25 years.

DAILY DEVELOPMENT GOOD AT JARBIDGE

SUBSTANTIAL, NOT SENSATION-AL, ARE RESULTS OF WORK
Large and Small Properties Make Encouraging Showings—High Grade Ore Found in Tunneling Process—Camp Becomes Active.

Jarbridge, Nevada, June 29.—Each day's development strengthens the conviction that Nelson and associates of the Arizona group are in the making of one of the big and rich mines in the Jarbridge district. In the new showings in 125 feet the vein is getting better defined, and the ore richer, as depth is gained. The rich ore is coming in in bunches and streaks, now the face of the tunnel striking the whole body as it is broken down average up to an excellent grade of milling ore. "Pebbles" of rich ore are being made during the week—indicating values of \$200 or better to the ton and if the improvement continues as depth is gained, it is more than a profitable body of ore which will stand shipment will be developed. Flattening indicates rich ore, and the fact that some of the quartz is getting harder as the tunnel advances.

Significant Features.
There are two features of the Arizona development, that are especially worthy of mention. The first is that the gold is just as free as that of the Succaba and Hunter, 2100 feet higher, and the values are there also. The question of the vein continuing to great depth and carrying their values is always a pertinent one in every mine. It is now proven that the veins continue across Bonanza gulch and carry high values on both sides. This shows the strength of the veining. It is the first time that ore in place has been found crossing Bonanza gulch.

Substantial Results.
Good, but not sensational, are the results shown by the new showings. The vein in the drift from the 63-foot tunnel in the mine at the Flaxio mine. The high grade streak is now on the Bonanza side of the vein and where cut is 8 inches wide, which is half of the usual width at other points. This is an especially rich vein, which comprises the bulk of the vein, which is quite a little richer than above grade. Also, it is apparently rich in this ore and the high grade body is a bunch streak of rich brown tale that is always associated with good ore. On the other hand, there is a body of fine soft sugary quartz, with hematite of iron in it. It is about as rich as any other place in the mine. There is at least 6 feet of very good ore here, and with the bulk of the vein getting richer at the lowest workings—253 feet from the surface—there is every reason for contentment. The vein will at once be sunk another 50 feet from which point more drifting and crosscutting will be done.

Better Ore Daily.
The Bonanza vein, which strikes was recently made in getting a little better with every foot of development. In the foot vein there is about 2 feet of ore that carries good values in the pan. Very rich float has been found on the Pan but it is not yet sure that it came from the vein proper. An assay of float was secured from one place of this float, by Jim Hagan, but shows nothing in the prospect other than what has gotten much better assays. An

Baking Powder Biscuits

Light as a Feather
By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine.

Baking Powder Biscuits made with this recipe are so far ahead of ordinary baking powder biscuits that, if once tried, they will never use any other recipe. Try the next time you run about a bread. Save this recipe.

3 C. Baking Powder Biscuits
Three cups flour, 1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup baking powder, 1/2 cup water.
Sift three times, the flour, salt and baking powder together. Add the milk and water, using a rolling pin for shortening, using lard or butter for shortening. Then mix to a very soft dough with the milk. The softer the dough the better the biscuits. Use a rolling pin to roll out the dough. Roll out to a thickness of 1/2 inch. Cut out with a biscuit cutter. Bake on a sheet or very shallow pan at 400° oven. In placing biscuits in the pans place well apart, not allowing edges to touch. Small biscuits need less than large ones. Large biscuits do not have the proper amount of time to rise and bake.

McDonald is in charge of the work. The crosscut from the 400-foot tunnel on the Succaba, now out 70 feet, has gone through a very hard rib of chert similar to that encountered on the upper level. The vein is getting better defined, and the ore richer, as depth is gained. The rich ore is coming in in bunches and streaks, now the face of the tunnel striking the whole body as it is broken down average up to an excellent grade of milling ore. "Pebbles" of rich ore are being made during the week—indicating values of \$200 or better to the ton and if the improvement continues as depth is gained, it is more than a profitable body of ore which will stand shipment will be developed. Flattening indicates rich ore, and the fact that some of the quartz is getting harder as the tunnel advances.

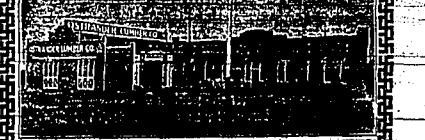
