MINE DEVELOPMENT OPENS GOOD ORE

FINE SPECIMENS TAKEN FROM SEVERAL PROPERTIES

Cutting of Veins at Low Depths Gives Encouraging Results—Extensive Work on Bluster Property—Mine News.

Jarviside, Nevada, June 27.—The forces at the Bluster mine have finished timbering, catching up the heavy ground and cleaning up generally, and the entire workings are now in excellent shape. The work of developing is again proceeding and few mines respond so favorably to systematic development. At a point in the vein 225 feet south of the main crosscut tunnel the drift was what was supposed to be the top of the vein. It was broken into here and was opened up that averages 300 feet across 2 feet. An assay from a sample across 18 inches gave returns of \$41 per ton.

Four feet further to the south another crosscut was run into the supposed footwall and again ore was discovered. The assays were taken here but pan assays indicate ore of commercial grade. In cleaning up at the bottom of the vein the boys took out the finest specimen ever found in the Bluster. Gold is plainly visible all through the rock and as this is the deepest working in the vein 220 feet below the surface—it is especially gratifying.

Bluster Development.

There is 303 feet of development on the Bluster, as follows: crosscut tunnels to top vein, 978 feet; drift and crosscut on the vein, 175 feet; shafts, 80 feet; winzes, 110 feet; raises, 170 feet. This work blocks out 50,000 tons of ore averaging \$15 a ton—a total of \$750,000. In doing all of the above and purchasing water rights, timber claims, etc., the company has expended only \$40,000. Shares of the \$500,000 shares of treasury stock.

Rich Ore Uncovered.

In the drift on the vein from the lower tunnel in the Buckeye a small streak of high grade, evidently the continuation of the streak found in the tunnel, was discovered. The ore was picked up. Beautiful specimens came from this, but a bigger body of less rich ore is what is being sought for and expected soon.

Stormy Vein Reached.

From the varied industries in the north to the extensive agricultural sections of the south, Mr. Reed will have no trouble in finding material to exhibit. He has to experience difficulty in making selections from the vast resources that the state offers for such an exhibit as will be required at the great exposition.

Mr. Reed expects to make a number of trips through the state and into the exposition work, and he states that he finds the task an enormous one.

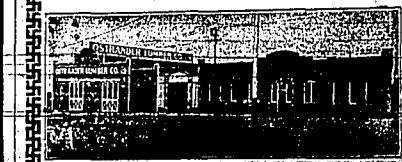
