PARCEL POST IS COSTING RAILWAYS

MORE, WORK AND LESS PAY IS PLAIN OF CARRIERS

Chairman of Committee Tells How Payments for Carrying Mail are Determined and Makes Some Recommendations Therein.

"The railways of the United States carried the parcel post from January 1 to July 1 without any compensation from the government.

The government does not attempt to weigh the mail carried; it arranges a weighing period, to occur in about four years.

The consequences of this system of weighing are that the mail is not so uniformly packed as it should be.

The parcel post is a business of the government, and the rates of pay for the carriers should be fixed by the government.

# Automobiles and Good Roads

**NOT IN TWIN FALLS.**

Nothing daunted, he turned about again to resume his errand of mercy. At this point an eye witness of the whole affair called out impatiently to the victim:

"Look out, you idiot; he's coming back again."

**FOR USERS OF THE HIGHWAYS.**

The appearance of the motor cars as a common vehicle on the highways of the state as well as the streets of the cities of the state, has led to the making of laws for the guidance of both motor cars and drivers of farm wagons, delivery wagons and other than motor car vehicles, that need not leave any in ignorance of the state's protection for all users of the state highways.

Section 27 of Chapter 379, of the state's legislature, in addition to the general laws of the State of Idaho, bearing particularly upon the conduct of vehicles when passing each other on the state highway, reads as follows:

"Whenever a person operating a motor vehicle shall meet on the public highway any other person driving or riding a horse or horses, or other draft animals or any other vehicle, the person so operating such motor vehicle shall reasonably turn the same to the right so as to give half of the traveled road if practicable, and a fair and equal opportunity to pass, to the other, without interference; or, if they are traveling in the same direction, the person overtaking shall pass on the left side of the person so overtaken, and the person overtaken shall give the other a convenient opportunity so to pass, if it can be done without endangering his own vehicle, person, horses, or other draft animals."

**GOOD ROAD WORK.**

We had occasion recently to go over the new road which has been constructed from the rim rock at Shoshone falls to a point within a short distance of the south leg of the reservoir. Those who have had occasion to use the old and winding road through the lava beds to the break of the canyon cannot but appreciate a trip over the new road. It takes almost a direct course through ravines and hills and has been put on a grade that makes it easy to travel, and the constructors are deserving of much praise for the good work they have accomplished.—Lincoln County Times.

**U. S. LEADS IN MOTOR VEHICLES.**

At the recent International Road Congress held in London, a complete census of the world's motor vehicles was compiled for the first time. In the United States leads in the production of automobiles, so she also leads in their operation. It was learned that this country possesses more than half of all the motor vehicles in the world, the number, including more vehicles being 2,227,225, compared with England's 1,857,225. The balance of a total of 1,161,911 is distributed throughout the other countries of the world. France is third with 89,186, and Germany fourth with 70,000.

The total number of motor trucks, included in the above figures, is given as 62,552. Usually the number of automobiles in any country greatly exceeds the number of trucks, although Germany is reported as having 49,128 trucks and only 15,618 pleasure cars. It should be noted, however, that these figures are based on reports dated June 1, 1912, and probably fall far short of the actual number of vehicles in use today. It is estimated that there were no less than 200,000 motor vehicles manufactured and put into service during the past year.

**HENRY FORD DOES BUSINESS.**

CONSERVATION AT NATIONAL CAPITAL

MINIATURE REPRODUCTIONS OF FOREST SCENES IN WEST Pacific Coast States Will Show How People and Children Are Educated to Importance and Protection of Forests.

Rollie's train stunts and foresters riding the rail, fighting fires and herding thousands of sheep and cattle, will be seen in miniature at the Twin Falls National Conservation Center, Washington, D. C., November 18, 19, and 20.

Forest rangers, both from the trail, and other men in charge of the practical management of the nation's forests will be on hand to explain in addition to the foresta themselves, the exhibit will include an interesting display of many queer instruments used by conservationists.

One of the most interesting exhibits will be a miniature look-out tower, where the rangers watch for forest fires. From these stations, the rangers often discover fires that escape before it takes days to reach them.

Water-power development in national forests will be shown by charts and colored transparencies. This feature will include the amount of water power available in the national forests in the West and in the southern Appalachian region.

Another feature will be a realistic waterfall, One half of the model filled with earth is covered with miniature trees and moss, the other half the earth is left bare.

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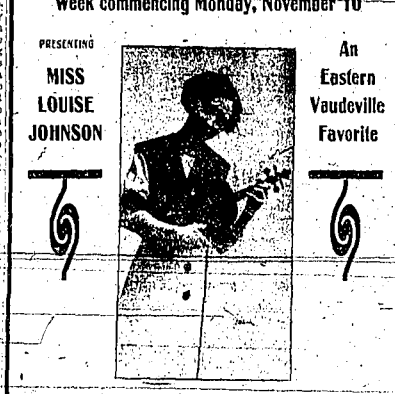

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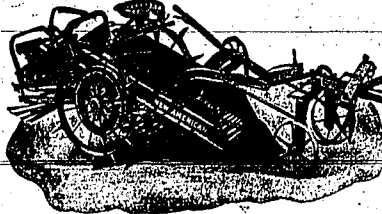
