Proceedings of Board of County Commissioners of Twin Falls County, Oct. Session, 1913.

Regular October Session, November 1st, 1913.

The Board convened at 10 A. M. on this date pursuant to recess. Present: C. H. Taylor, Chairman, O. E. Carlson, O. G. Zuck, and E. J. Finch, Clerk.

Whereupon the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The above report having been previously filed, was presented to the Board and by the Board approved.

The Board proceeded at this time to pay on salaries and other items for the month of October and ordered warrants drawn on the current extension in payment of same as follows:

Table listing salaries and other payments for October, including O. E. Carlson, O. G. Zuck, E. J. Finch, and various clerks and auditors.

The Board also approved estimate No. 7 of the Idaho Bridge Company and ordered a warrant drawn in their favor in the amount of \$375.20; and a check of A. E. Fox for engineering of \$1267.20 and ordered the auditor to draw a warrant in favor of Mr. Fox for the amount less \$500.00 previously paid, leaving a balance of \$767.20.

Whereupon it was ordered that a recess be taken until this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

2 o'clock P. M.

The Board reconvened pursuant to recess. Present all members.

In the matter of the Application of the Twin Falls Railroad Company for a franchise for right of way.

Presented by the Twin Falls Railroad Company, a corporation under the laws of the state of Idaho and makes application to the Board of County Commissioners of said Twin Falls County for a right of way upon, over and along the west side of the public road or highway between sections thirty-four and thirty-three in township nine south, range seventeen east of the Boise Meridian in said Twin Falls County from a point where the north line of sections three and four in township ten south, range seventeen east of said Boise Meridian intersects the present line of railroad belonging to said applicant, north for a distance of about three-eighths of a mile or more or less, to the rim rock of Snake River, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating a line of gasoline or electric railroad, with all necessary appurtenances, cars and tractors.

NOTE: THEREHERE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the said TWIN FALLS RAILROAD COMPANY, its successors or assigns be, and the name be hereby given and granted a right of way for the purposes aforesaid over the public road aforesaid, upon the condition that the said grantee, its successors or assigns, construct a line of road over and upon said right of way on or before the first day of July, 1914.

W. Vaux, delinquent; E. J. Finch, Clerk, Auditor and Reporter; Bertha Noel, County Superintendent; J. M. Shank, Probate Judge; and the auditor's report of O. H. Herrington, Auditor.

In the matter of the cancellation of a bond of the Citizens State Bank.

In this matter the Board cancelled the bond of the Citizens State Bank for the sum of four hundred dollars of county funds and approved a new bond in the penal sum of Ten Thousand dollars, with the Citizens State of Idaho, as principal, and the American Surety Company of New York its surety company.

In the matter of the petition of S. A. Hoken for compromise in the settlement of tax sale certificate No. 222, sale of 1913.

In this matter the Board agreed to issue a 2nd sale certificate by the payment of \$165.00, together with penalties, including interest and redemption fee from the date of said tax sale, October 1st, 1913.

In the matter of the approval of an estimate of the Colorado Bridge & Construction Company.

In this matter the Board approved estimate No. 1 with the Colorado Bridge & Construction Company and ordered a warrant drawn in favor of said company in the amount of Three Thousand Five Hundred Seventy and No/100 (\$3500.70) Dollars, on the Bridge Bond fund. The Board also approved the estimate of A. E. Fox for engineering services in accordance with said estimate and ordered a warrant on the Bridge Bond fund in the amount of One Hundred Five and No/100 (\$150.00) Dollars.

In the matter of the advertisement for bids for filling in the approach to Bridge No. 3.

In this matter the Clerk was instructed to advertise for bids on making said fills and to run said advertisement in the Kimberly Call, Twin Falls Times, and Filer Journal.

In the matter of communicating with the State Highway Commission relative to the construction of a road in the State Highway Commission in accordance with the provisions of Section 5 of Chapter 153, Session Laws of 1913.

HUNTS FOR LOST TREASURE

Gold Buried Thirty Years Ago by Miner. He is Now Looking for It.

The following interesting story of lost treasure and faith unshaken is told by Edward Cornelius, an old resident of Murray, who has been working in the Kellogg mine, apparently for 33 years, but in reality, he says, he has been working to locate \$35,000 which he buried in 1853 in a Dutch placer country, which was reported to be unusually rich.

In 1853 he and his partner left Montana for the new gold country around Murray. They loaded their pack horses, he says, with \$25,000 in gold, all in \$20 gold pieces, planning to use this money to buy up all available placer country, which was reported to be unusually rich. They came down the Prospect creek trail and over the Mullen road, down to what is now Kellogg. They there heard that the country for which they were headed was not as rich as at first reported, and as the country was full of gold hunters, was wild and rough, they decided to cache their money. Cornelius says and so into the Murray country he divested himself, making any bargain to buy the placer ground.

The gold was hidden in the flat which extends from the Kellogg depot to the Bunker Hill and Sullivan mills. It is asserted, and the gold hunters might as well be having a fire and two tree trees, burning the gold in a Dutch oven in the center of this triangle.

Cornelius and his partner remained in the Murray country for a year and on their return to dig up their money and sell the country they found indicated every landmark. The pair

searched for days and finally gave it up. On several occasions Cornelius has returned and made a hunt without result. It was when he learned that sewer excavation would extend through the ground in which he buried his money 30 years ago that he came to Kellogg, took up his pick and shovel and kept his eyes open.—Hick-fort Courier.

EXTRA SESSION TALK VANISHING. Opposition to Proposition Is Heard From All Sections.

The prospects for a session extraordinary are rapidly vanishing. It is now almost safe to say that an extra session will not be called by Governor John M. Hickey, although the chief executive has not as yet authorized a definite expression defining what he proposes to do. It is current rumor, however, that in some cases such tremendous opposition came from all parts of the state to the convening of a session extraordinary as to prohibit the serious consideration relative to convening the law-making body. Some of the strongest protests are known to have come from members of the legislature—both senators and representatives. They, as well as party men from all parts of the state, have been fully consulted by the governor, both by person and by letter. While all agree that attention, including the drainage act, the log-off land act, the revenue act and the Crary act, land matters, it is now said that the governor has been advised these matters, while urgent, can wait another year for settlement.

Taxpayers generally over the state, already burdened with heavy taxes they find almost impossible to pay, and they, therefore, are in an anxious position known to the chief executive. The original plan to call the legislature into session was for but a period of a week to hold down the expense. It is believed now, however, that an extra session could not be confined to a week.

It would, it is claimed, want a longer period to consider the legislation they might pass upon. Could these members be slow to enact certain legislation and none other it is said that the session extraordinary might be a go yet. But those who have had experience in signing members of this law-making body must positively declare this cannot be done.

Therefore, it has been pointed out by the session committee, that the session plan to remedy these evils should be given publicity and the people of the state should be given an opportunity to discuss the plan pro and con before a law-making body meets to pass upon it.

One feature or plan that might be put forth by the session committee, in consideration, now before the session, consideration should, it is feared, be given fully interested, be published and discussed so that the people would

have an intelligent idea of just what was proposed.

The same thing is true of the discussed plan to permit the larger sale of the state land and timber holdings with which to raise funds to be loaned out and to develop the state. It is claimed, say party leaders, that this is too big a question to pass simply judgment on and a legislative body should convene and adopt any plan of this kind without first giving it long and serious consideration; might do decidedly more harm than good. The fact that even the press of the northern part of the state has in a number of instances voiced disapproval of the convening of a session extraordinary is said to have gone a long way towards placing a strong array of opposition against the proposed call. It was from the drainage section of the north that a delegation of citizens came to Boise to urge the governor to issue a call for the special session in order that the Elliott drainage bill might be regularly passed, for it was discovered when a text was made up, that it had in its haste to run the house rampant, taken an irregular course.—Capital News.

Deane and County Officials Involved

Deane - Attorney E. R. Dandridge, W. H. Hyatt and J. W. On return, it is said, the accused attorneys charged that the sheriff had violated the local option law and illegally sold liquor in his possession unlawfully and contrary to the orders of the court. The sheriff will be given a hearing on Monday - Stateman.

Porello Man Said to Have Attempted to Burn Home of County Attorney

This morning the court of Judge Holl was occupied with the preliminary hearing of Walter A. Grant, who is being held on various counts, the principal of which is arson. It is alleged by John Thomas, who appears in the light of an accomplice, that Grant is responsible for the attempted burning of County Attorney Smith's home last July, and the county attorney appears as the complaining witness. The state was represented by Prosecutor Attorney General D. C. Macomber and Attorney H. H. Ferguson, while Grant was represented by Attorney Clark & Bugdo, and the hearing was held before the probate court in Grant did not desire to appear in public, so it is said.

AFFECTS IDAHO SHIPPERS

Supreme Court Holds That Only Damages Specified Can be Collected

A decision by the supreme court of the United States just handed down, which is of great interest to the cattle men and sheep men of Idaho is that regarding the railroads and livestock liability rulings. The series of decisions handed down by the highest tribunal of the nation involves the livestock liability, in loss in transit, from recovering anything but the value stated in the livestock contract, which is the stipulated time shipment is made.

Most railroads have heretofore noted for animals lost in transit on behalf of the shipper. The new ruling is to pay more than the amount stated in the contract and are upheld by the supreme court of the United States in this case. The present rules on the shipment of livestock, particularly animals shipped in less than carload lots, are not equitable. The ruling stated in the limited livestock contract is entirely too low, and the rate imposed when a shipper declares actual value is too high. The ruling is an effort to prohibit such declaration of actual value. A specific limitation will be placed on this point.

A station shipped from Chicago to Merid, Iowa, over the C. M. & St. P. railway takes a minimum value of \$200. The rate now is \$1.00 per head. The ruling provided the shipper signs the limited livestock contract. The signing of such contract, however, binds the shipper to accept \$100 as the actual valuation for the animal in case of injury or death, whether the fault rests with the railroad company or not. If the actual valuation, as \$1000, has been declared, the freight rate advances to \$15, which is an exorbitant increase in rate, even though designated simply to cover the cost of insurance.

If the same steamer be shipped from Chicago to Plain City, Ohio, the minimum weight at which he will be shipped is 7000 pounds, and the rate amounts to \$21.70, provided the shipper signs the limited livestock contract, which requires him to accept \$100 as total compensation in case of injury or death of the horse. If the shipper declines to sign such limited liability livestock contract and ships the horse at an actual valuation of \$1000 for the horse at a minimum weight of 10,000 pounds and one and one-half first-class rates, so that the total charge will amount to \$62.50, a most exorbitant increase in rate imposed upon the shipper who declares the actual valuation. -Statesman.
