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
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FOR POISONING RABBITS

Government Agent Finds New Formula Effective

After a week of visiting in several localities which are known to raise jack rabbits, a government agent says the new formula solution devised by the government is so thoroughly effective that its success in exterminating the pests will be measured only by the interest and co-operation taken by the farmers.

One rabbit per half a dozen in a "hot" quarter mile will be exterminated, out poison, and the rest after nothing, will not be effective; but if all the people in any section will

cooperate their efforts will certainly be successful. The government authorities have agreed to furnish the poison, there is no reason why everyone should not put forth some effort.

The formula follows: One ounce of strichloro-put in one-quarter pint of water, add one-quarter pint of oil of camphor. Make stars, points, etc., and place in a shallow saucer.

Take from stove and add one ounce of oil in solution, one-quarter pint of water, stir into eight quarts of cold water.

After stirring for four hours, add eight quarts of clean water.

This should be distributed about a mile, spoonful in a place along the trails.

WILSON'S PLAN FOR TRUSTS

Fundamentals Include Elimination of Uncertainty in Present Laws.

Washington — President Wilson Tuesday gave the members of the cabinet his ideas on the government's relation to big business. The field that antitrust legislation should cover and the spirit with which he believed the task should be approached.

Peace and not war, a feeling of friendly collaboration rather than of hostile antagonism, and yet a constructive program that would adequately meet the needs of the times—these are the fundamentals of the president's plan of action, to be embodied in the measure which he will read at the joint session of congress next Monday. The substance of the document is the cabinet's opinion of the measure as a progressive declaration that would reassure the business world of the sincere intentions of the administration to deal fairly with it.

Committees Hear Message

Wednesday the president will outline the measure to the Senate committee on Interstate Commerce and the House judiciary committee at White House conferences. While the president has not revealed his views on detailed legislation, he hopes that his message will be the guiding influence that will keep the scope of activity within reasonable limits and will not in any case possibly give any concession of radical bills that might be misinterpreted by the outside world. So far as is known the essential features of the president's program are:

1. Strengthening the Sherman antitrust law to reduce the debatable area around it.

2. The prohibition of interlocking directorates.

3. Creation of individual responsibility and exacting of personal guarantees for all franchises.

The creation of an Interstate Trade Commission to regulate not only of a Bureau of Investigations whether decree or the option or mandate of the contract carried out.

The Business Experts Change

The business program of the administration is changing rapidly, and that is the time and that there should be no delay in accomplishing these reforms on which public sentiment is agreed. The recent action of J. P. Morgan & Co., Inc., voluntarily withdrawing from manufacture of aluminum, is cited by the administration supporters as evidence that the business world expects interlocking directorates to be dissolved. In this connection, Mr. Wilson believes the single most popular opinion has undergone a remarkable change in the last few years.

From a point where doubt as to the existence of trusts was at first excusable and unavoidable combination, the administration has indicated that it now accepts the more developed acceptance of the principle that private monopolies are indefensible and that trusts practiced certain things which ought to be punished. It has extended its requirement that a corporation shall not with respect to personal motto should be vigorously enforced and provision made in all legislation for individual offenses.

Without Regulatory Power

One of the important features of the antitrust program is the Interstate Trade Commission. This organization, born of the campaign of the administration during the last campaign in that it would not be vested with powers of regulation, but would be the medium through which the government would keep the business world informed and eliminate "the twilight zone" in big industry.

There have been repeated requests for information from business concerns and the need of an authoritative source of information has been demonstrated by the many inquiries from business men who would like to know what would be necessary to effectively to combat the necessary inquiries and furnish the required information.

No Slowing Up Now

With the problems discussed of the whole subject in the cabinet meeting, the talk of "slowing up" on the administration program and postponing trust legislation until the December session, apparently disappeared in active measures.

Administration supporters say the house and senate will endeavor to rapid completion so as to cut short the period of doubt as to what adjustments will be proposed for the business of the country.
