LIVE WASHINGTON NEWS

Items of Interest From the Nation's Capital.

(Special Correspondence.)

Working on Marble Creek Cases—Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—At the regular meeting of the public lands committee in the Senate, Senators Borah and Brady appeared with Attorney General Clegg and State Land Commissioner Day in behalf of Marble Creek land cases. Speeches were made by Senators Borah and Brady treating the early passage of the Marble Creek bill which authorizes the secretary of the interior to make transfers necessary enable the state to get lands of equal value to the lands in township 44 range 2 and 3 east Boise meridian, which are now under litigation by the department of the interior. It is known as the Marble Creek land cases.

The Idaho delegation are solidly back of this bill, and the senators are receiving letters and telegrams from Idaho asking for immediate action on these cases.

By way of confounding Senator Brady had the following to say with reference to the Marble Creek cases: "The Idaho in the Marble Creek have been in dispute practically since 1891. The whole trouble arose over the fact that the national government did not properly regard anti-entrustment provisions of the act of March 3, 1879, which is the act of Congress at that time, but filed on the lands.

"Several attempts have been made to settle the matter, but without avail. However, I feel quite sure that we have the matter satisfactorily settled and that the settlement will result in the return of the Marble Creek lands to the state and the state will get lands of equal value to the lands given to the settlers.

"This is a happy ending to the long-standing case, and the state gets the land of equal value for its school fund, and everybody should be happy."

French Bill Will Save \$55,000 Annually For Idaho.

Representative Burton of French,

last week, spoke in the house of representatives, an advocacy of his bill, providing for an appropriation of \$125,000 for the survey of the two million acres of New lands scattered throughout the state.

Mr. French urged upon congress that these lands have been owned by private companies for ten or fifteen years, but in view of the fact that they are unimproved, they are not paying taxes, and consequently are not paying taxes. General Patch took an active part in the deliberations and with other adjutant generals in attendance was shown many concrete plans which are the result of the meeting, and a visit to the general plan of organization for the national defense was made. Western Boys to Receive Bare Military Training.

The war department last week has authorized a system of conducting military training camps during the winter in the summer for the purpose of giving special military instruction to the boys of the state. This higher institution of learning. The camp was a success and the movement will be broadened this year by the establishment of a number of additional camps. There is an effort being made to secure the establishment of one of these camps in the northwest and the southwest.

Federal Aid Traced for Idaho Yellowstone Highway.

The Upper Snake River Valley Highway Association, in organizing the Boise-Yellowstone Park Highway, are endeavoring to obtain federal aid for payment of the highway as extended through the Teton national forest which adjoins the Yellowstone Park. Representative French believes that the federal government ought to bear the greater portion of the expense for the highway, inasmuch as the forest reserve occupies the major part with the forest service at this time, and that the necessary funds be made available for road construction work from the funds authorized for road building within national parks.

The national question of the highway to Yellowstone Park is being taken up by the highway. Mr. French favors it, but thinks the work could be handled through the forestry service.

...the trust will merge again. One of the most significant comments came from Senator Gallinger, leader of the Republican minority in the upper house, who represents the more conservative type of Republican.

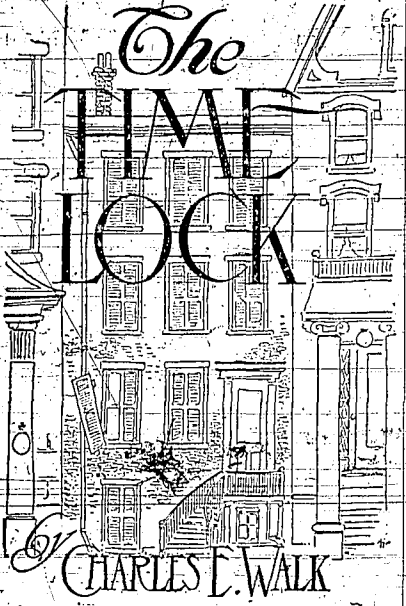
