OPPOSE BONDS RELEASING BONDS

Settlers Reclaiming and Operating Co. Files Petition in Pittsburg

CASE INVOLVES RUBY PROJECTS ON THE NORTH SIDE

Report Says American Waterworks Concern Will Take Twenty Million Capital

Pittsburg—The Settlers' Reclaiming and Operating Company filed Thursday a petition in common pleas court asking that the California & Idaho Company, W. S. Rubin, president, and the board of directors be restrained from releasing a guarantee of the California & Idaho company's bonds and returning equivalent now held by the American Water Works & Guarantee company on a mortgage for \$7,500,000.

The application will be argued before Judge J. A. Evans, February 26. According to the petition, the California & Idaho company was organized to reclaim, cultivate and improve land in Lincoln and Gooding counties, Idaho, and to establish irrigation systems. It has a capital stock of \$10,000,000 of which it has received \$2,000,000.

An issue of \$4,000,000 that might be made was secured by 100,000 shares of the capital stock of the Sacramento Valley Irrigation company and 500 shares of the Twin Falls Water-Works & Guarantee company. The latter was conveyed to the Farmers Loan & Trust company of New York and J. D. O'Neil of all lands and franchises thereafter acquired by the defendant company payment of principal and interest was guaranteed by the American Water Works & Guarantee company, which pledge \$1,252,500 in securities.

BOLEY LOSES CASE.

Judge Stockslager Upheld in Suit Involving Possession of Land.

Judge Stockslager of the Fourth district sustained by the plain's application court in an opinion handed down on Friday in the case of *Jones vs. Boley* against M. H. Boley. This action was instituted by Boley to compel Boley to make payment of the purchase price and take on a certain piece of land in Twin Falls county.

In the records of the case it is shown that on December 25, 1923, Boley and Boley entered into an agreement under the terms of which Boley agreed to convey to Boley 10 acres of

land for a stipulated price and to give him a good and sufficient warranty deed therefor. Boley made a payment on the land under the agreement. He also paid twice amounting to \$135.00 for that he learned that Boley's father had an equity in the land and that the father refused to convey the land to Boley. Boley refused to clear the title to the land but insisted in being compelled to his payments and taking a deed for the land under the circumstances. Boley's father was in possession.

When the land was purchased both father and son joined in paying for it and the title was taken in the name of Boley. There was an oral agreement between the two that the father's interest was to come out of the sale price and the father refused to surrender possession until his interests were taken care of. In the trial court judgment was returned in favor of Boley. Boley appealed to the supreme court. The law applicable to the case is thus set forth in the syllabus of the opinion:

"Where parties enter into a contract for the conveyance of real property for a valuable consideration, whereby vendor agrees to give vendee good and sufficient warranty deed therefor, vendor must place himself in a position to comply with the requirements to convey clear title, and in case of default vendee is entitled to compel him to do so, or to rescind the contract and demand repayment of money paid by him on the purchase price.

"Held, that the evidence in this case sustains the findings of the lower court, and that the lower court committed no error in its rulings on the admission and rejection of evidence."

The supreme court opinion was written by Chief Justice Allard and was fully concurring in the view of the judgment of the lower court.
