JAMES H. WISE OUT
FOR DISTRICT JUDGEWell-Known Attorney of City Put
Forward for PositionMR. WISE HAS BEEN A RESIDENT
OF CITY FOR SEVERAL YEARS—Shoshone Journal Speaks Good Word
for Twin Falls Man—Stands Square
for Local Option.

James H. Wise, Twin Falls lawyer, was over this way on Wednesday and returned home yesterday morning. Mr. Wise is the first of the candidates for the judgeship in the Fourth Judicial district to be announced. He was chosen for the position by the members of the Idaho State Bar, who selected him by gubernatorial appointment. That was when political calculations launched a coup with the election of a Democrat as governor. The lawyer had no time to be appointed by the legislature, so the choice of a friend who always considered him the right sort of judicial officer. Now they are offering him for a commission direct from the voters.

The friends include all sorts and conditions. He is a man of his word, square and honest—and has no enemies of his own and was never accused of being afraid to express them. For balance he is a staunch Republican, although reared in the Democratic atmosphere of his youth, and though a morphine and opium user, he is well, although his environments have been otherwise.

It has been largely his influence that has made the Twin Falls community want to cut off the most notorious and enforcement of the prohibition law and the very liberality of the temperance cause in Idaho. And yet he is not a fanatic on the liquor question at all. "It is just business," he says, "and I stand for its regulation in county and state. I am not a teetotaler, nor do I want nobody to misunderstand me on this matter. I am for the protection of the home, the wife and children, that liquor seeks to destroy. My position in this is not inconsistent with that of the Democratic party, the party of the people, or the party of the majority in the matter of protection in traffic laws for the benefit of wage earners. It strikes me the helpless ones need protection first." Mr. Wise is a prominent member of the Masonic Lodge.

There are two judges to elect this year from this district. Judge Waters, who has worn the robes of the exalted office for eight years, can have another nomination if he so desires, according to reports, but the chances are slim. All others are up for the other.

It is another likely that Waters and Wise will be the choice of the Republican nominee as expressed at the September primaries. Judge Stockinger, with more than 10 years' service, and the Breckinridge Attorney, James H. Bowdish of Lincoln county, are considered available judicial material for the other place. He is one of the ablest of all the Democratic lawyers in the state.

The country of Elmore, Gooding, Lincoln, Minidoka, Blaine, Cassia and Twin Falls constitute the fourth judicial district.—*Standard Journal*.

PROTECTION OF PARK GAME

ALL UNION PACIFIC

Stations on Short Line Will Be Union
Pacific in Future.

All lettering on engines and cars belonging to the Oregon Short Line and the Oregon-Washington railroad & Navigation company will be changed, according to orders which will be issued in the near future, by the Union Pacific system.

"Union Pacific system" will be the lettering on the engines and cars of those lines with O. P. & W. R. & N. underneath.

The Union Pacific officials have prae-

dicted that the new cars in the course of construction will bear this new lettering, it is said. The change in lettering will be done chiefly to correct the impression that the O. P. & L. and the O. W. & N. company are separate lines and that the two roads are independent while many roads have followed.

"As a forerunner of the change, of the lettering upon the equipment, the Union Pacific system has erected a large sign at the Salt Lake freight station, which is the terminus of the Union Pacific system. The old sign on the front elevation of the building reads "Freight Station, O. P. & L. R. R. & S. P. L. & B. L. & W. R. R."
