

Hagerman Valley Strong for State Highway.

The mass meeting held in the opera-house last Tuesday evening was probably the largest attended and most enthusiastic meeting ever held in the Hagerman valley. RAILROAD DEVELOPMENT IN IDA-

Bald Northwestern and Hill St. and Hill Bald Gilmore & Pittsburg.

New Meadows, March 7.—The Chicago & Northwestern and the Hill systems will jointly build a new road to the balds between the Big Salmon and the Gilmores, as an extension of the Gilmore & Pittsburg from Salmon City to Lewiston.

The Pacific & Idaho Northern will

then be extended north from New Meadows down the Little Salmon river to the junction of the Big and Little Salmon rivers at Buckles, a distance of 16 miles, and thence westward to its northern terminus at Weiser in Boise, where it will be connected with the Western Pacific, which is to be built to Boise from Winemucca, Nev.

The foreground is the status of the railroad situation in Idaho, according to information obtained from an unusually authentic source.

There is now enough heavy steel rail for main line construction, laid up to the yards of the Gilmore & Pittsburg, Salmon City, to connect the railroad all the way down the Big Salmon river.

There is no longer any doubt among those in a position to know that the D. & I. N. is really well prepared to compete with the Northwestern. The latter is ready to make public his plan of connecting up with the "Pit" road and extending it to the Pacific coast.

Among higher railroad circles, the belief is held that the Northwestern will be compelled to merge with the Hill system, to a point at least Idaho Falls, Wyo., to a point at or near Idaho Falls, Wyo., from where

it will be extended to and connected with the Gilmore & Pittsburg, go down the Salmon river to the junction with the Hill road, over which the Hill road, over which Northwestern trains will be operated to "Pit" coast points. This is to understand, would give the Northwestern the shortest transcontinental line from the West Coast to the Pacific coast, by about 200 miles.

It is further understood that the Hill system, the Northwestern and the Western Pacific are very friendly, and that the Northwestern has asked the Hill system to make a joint statement to the effect that the Hill system, the Northwestern and the Western Pacific, are in full agreement to work together harmoniously.

It is now believed they will be

this year, by these three great systems.

Corroboration of the report received by local residents that the Northwestern is to merge with the Hill road to the South Pass in the continental divide to enter eastern Idaho has been received from another report from Lander, Wyo., which is at present the center of activity. It contained the statement that the Mountainer, of that place, which says:

"Active negotiations are being made by contractors for the construction of the Northwestern extension from Lander to Idaho Falls, for delivery of material in Lander as in early date, and the Northwestern has already secured a right-of-way through the canyon across the Wind River, which is 20 miles distant north of Riverton. This would bring their right-of-way to or near to Waboba, from which point they are now said to be surveying south to the Salmon.

"Lander is to be made a division of the Northwestern coast line. It is said, with shops equipped for locomotive repair, and the Northwestern will be extended to include Wyoming to provide adequate divisional and shop facilities."

The financial department of the Northwestern has made application to the State Tax Commission for permission to issue \$25,000,000 in bonds to finance the construction of the line.

According to reports from Seattle, the Northwestern has agents in the Goldfield there arranging for the purchase of a tract for a terminal on Pacific Coast.

Last year Northwestern engineers

have scouted the Teton mountains

for a easy grade without finding one

which would be practicable.

The Northwestern engineers have

studied up in central Wyoming. Last summer

the engineers succeeded in finding

way across the Tetons and eight-of-the-way agents have just obtained the land.

The Burlington engineers are in the hills at Waboba, running a line to the South Pass mining district. It is said, and on through into Utah and Idaho, to compete with the proposed extension of the Northwestern from Lander, Idaho Falls and the "Pit" road to the Pacific coast.

The line is to be built by the Burlington. There is stated to be a right-of-way filed at the head office of the Burlington from this place of a right-of-way filed by the Burlington from the mouth of the canyon across the Wind River, which is 20 miles distant north of Riverton.
