Secretary Lane to Urge Passage of Irrigation Bill

WILL PROPOSE BOND ISSUE FOR \$200,000,000

The Governor of the State of Utah Brings Good News for the West from Washington.

Governor bonds issues aggregating \$100,000,000, or a federal and cooperative bond issue of \$200,000,000, expected to be the ultimate outcome of the conference of the western representatives to be held in Denver April 9 in response to the call of Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior.

This is scheduled to be the chief topic for discussion at the conference of governors and other representatives of the western states in Denver next month, and the definite and tangible plan for the reclamation of the arid lands of the west is expected to be the definite outcome of the meeting.

Secretary Lane has been in conference with Governor Hatcher, in accordance with the other western governors, on the subject of the conference. He is urging all the western states to send representatives to this meeting.

A government bond issue of \$100,000,000 and an aggregate issue of \$200,000,000 by the western states directly affected is to be the central idea of a bill that Secretary Lane proposes to be enacted into law.

The west can use profitably and wisely \$100,000,000 in the next two years to the advantage of the country.

The government will place upon a leasing basis the western resources which will have been developed.

It is not without precedent in history for the United States to improve its own property and for its advances take a mortgage upon the wealth it creates.

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ENFORCE CAREY ACT CONTRACTS

Decision Important to Settlers Rendered by Supreme Court

MAKES NO DIFFERENCE IF TITLE IS STILL VESTED IN THE U. S.

Basin of Action a Water Contract With Which the Government is Not Concerned.

Carey act irrigation companies have the power to enforce the terms of their water contracts with settlers even when the title to the land is still in the United States, and the United States cannot be made a party to the suit.

This point is emphasized and made clear in a decision handed down in the state supreme court on Saturday in the case of the Idaho Irrigation Company against the United States.

Incidentally Judge C. A. Davis, sitting on the bench of the Fourth Judicial District, when this case was heard there, is reported to have satisfied a demurrer holding that the United States must be made a party to the suit in that it will hold the title to the land.

It is held by the supreme court that the basis of the action is a water contract, and not a contract with the United States.

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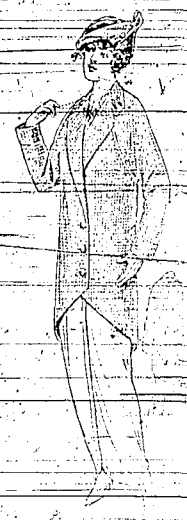

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

North Portland, Ore., Mar. 9, 1913.

Cattle

Cattle and calves were the largest in the history of the yards, 2,700 head being received. Prices for a casual off-day almost reached their former level. The receipts for a better part of the week were light. But, clearing throughout the week at a steady and remains steady at this price.

Hogs

Spring slaughter was also large, choice light stuff closing at slightly less than last week. Tops dropped to \$12.25 and \$12.25 standard for work with three loads at \$8.75. Week's range averaged \$8.00 which is about ten cents under February level.

Sheep

Sheep house activity was limited by a short run and the trade absorbed everything in a night. Generally, both wool and shorn stuff was offering with prime fat wool bands selling around \$5.50, wethers \$5.75, yearlings \$5.00 and ewes \$5.00. A differential of 50 cents was made for shorn stuff. Sheep market took a decidedly upward trend.

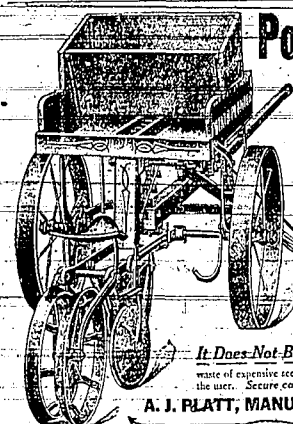

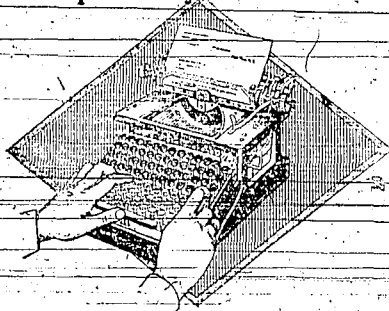

RAILROAD DEVELOPMENT IN IDAHO

Bullered Northwestern and Hill System Will Build Gilmore & Pittsburg.

New Meadows, March 7.—The Chicago & Northwestern and the Hill system will jointly build and use the new road to be built down the Big Salmon river as an extension of the Gilmore & Pittsburg, from Salmon City to Lewis-ton.

then be extended north from New Meadows down the Little Salmon river to the junction of the Big and Little Salmon rivers. The distance is about 12 miles. The "Big" road will be extended to the southern terminus at Webster to Boise, where it will be connected with the Western Pacific which is to be built to Boise from Winnemucca, Nev.

The foregoing is the status of the railroad situation in Idaho, according to information obtained from an unusually authentic source.

There is now enough heavy iron rail for main line construction, piled up in the yards of the Gilmore & Pittsburg at Salmon City to extend the railroad all the way down the Big Salmon river.

There is no longer any doubt among those in a position to know that the P. & I. N. in reality has Hill property and will be taken over by Hill when the latter is ready to make public the great plan of connecting up with the "Big" road and extending it to the Pacific coast.

Among higher railroad circles, it is held that the Northwestern will be extended from near Idaho Falls, Wyo., to a point at near Idaho Falls, perhaps at Hilder, Idaho, from where it will be extended to and connected with the Gilmore & Pittsburg, so down the Big Salmon river, to Lewiston, where it will be connected with the Hill road, over which Northwestern trains will be operated to Pacific coast points. This is understood, would give the Northwestern the shortest, transcontinental line from Chicago in the Pacific coast, by about 200 miles.

Corroboration of the report received by local writers that the Northwestern and the Burlington are joining for the South Pass in the continental divide to enter eastern Idaho has been received from another source, from Lander, Wyo., which is as present the center of activity. It is contained in the "Wind River" Mountainer of that place, which says:

"Active preparations are being made by contractors for the construction of the Northwestern extension from Lander to Idaho Falls, for delivery of material in Lander at an early date, according to information received yesterday from a reliable source.

The report reached here this morning that 25 carloads of iron were on the way from Haddon to this city, for preliminary work on the Lander yard. The iron used in constructing the extension will be taken from the Northwestern iron works at Boise.

Lander is to be made a division of the Northwestern coast line. It is said with slight optimism for locomotive and car repairs. The yard is stated to be extended to include Wyo. to provide adequate divisional and shop facilities. The general department of the Northwestern has arranged for the Illinois Commission for permission to lease \$1,000,000 in bonds for a vast tract for a terminal on Pacific coast.
