 It is expected that some of these furs will come from the heads of Idaho women—but not at 10 cents net—Suzanne Leaver.

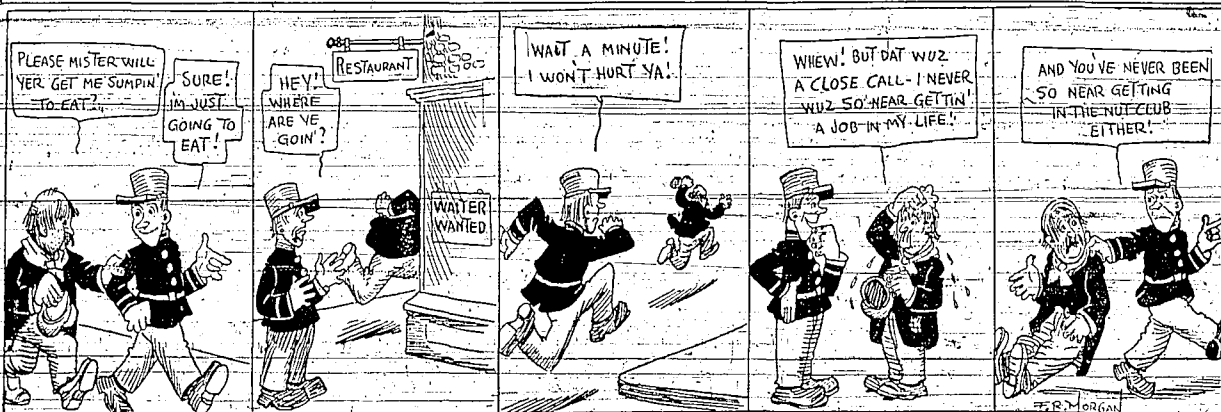
