Cut-throat competition, special con-

tracts to favor customers, discrimination between communities, juggling of

schedules to cover the real rates charged for light-and-power-unre-

asonable efforts to control rates by

an individual or group of cities and towns in the "power war" that has raged in southern Idaho will be eliminated and made impossible in the future, in the opinion of the public utilities commission.

Unless otherwise specified, in all future

contracts of rates between the state

and the companies, the commission

will order a hearing Saturday afternoon.

These rates, given above, will apply to the Great Sheaf and Twin Falls Water Power companies, the Southern Idaho Water Power company, the Idaho Falls Light and Power company, formerly the Beaver River company, the Idaho-Oregon Light &amp; Power company and to the Idaho-Railway, Light &amp; Power company. The new rates take effect at once.

The new rates will be effective for consumers of electricity in Twin Falls and will be found on the bills of all consumers at the close of the present month.

The action of the commission in

fixing these rates comes as the result

of an order served on the hydro-elec-

tric companies some time ago to ap-

pear and show cause why a suspended

order was not issued.

The representatives of the compa-

nies, who were with the intention of

getting together in an effort to agree

upon a schedule of rates.

The schedule given herewith is the

result of this conference of the repre-

sentatives of the companies. When

they reported to the commissioners,

they announced that they were willing to

submit to these rates temporarily in

order to meet the commission in ar-

arriving-at-a-fair-hands-and-the-work-

getting out of an equitable basis.

Representatives of the companies in-

stated that the intention of the com-

mission was to establish a uniform

schedule that would be binding on all

the companies.

Under the terms of the public utility

act the commission has no discre-

tion in the matter. Section No. 18 of

rate for all public service.

communities in the south and south east the sailing time will be longer. The rates will be lower than those in any adjoining state, and considerably lower than the rates prevailing in the east.

It will be noted, too, as significant that from this time forward there will be no difference between the regular commercial rates as cut out entirely. This will simplify the situation and make it much easier for any consumer to know just what he is paying and just what he is getting.

The regular payment will not apply to the Utah Power & Light company, which operates extensively in the extreme southeastern section of the state. Just why Utah is not so is not made clear.

Mr. Newell explained that the Utah company is operating in non-competing territory. Another fact is that it supplies such small communities and that the expense of reaching these small communities is so great that the rate applied to the other companies might not be fair for this company.

Great good to the public and to the power companies is expected to flow from this action of the utility commissioners. In brief, it is expected

that the railroad power will be brought to the market more consistently.

It is suggested that the new rates

will be effective March 31, 1911.

A curious state of affairs is brought to light with regards to several southern states by the complaint of British creditors. During the war and the reconstruction period following, several of the states as nations borrowed heavily to carry on government as the results of drafts made on them during the war. The bonds, fully due and the states have failed to pay the same until bondholders have laid the matter before the federal government. As an integral part of the great United States the certain states are exempt from drastic action on the part of the bondholders. However, if the same had happened to a central American republic the amount would have been collected by seizing the customs port. There is a private room for doubt under the wide freedom given each state to this nation whether the federal government can force any of the non-delinquent states to pay a just debt to a foreign bondholder.

## AN UNFAIR ADVANTAGE.

In the race for the United States senatorship and also for that of congress, an aspect which is causing some comment in the government-franking system as an aid to evade direct primary laws. There are two candidates for United States senatorship who are now in congress and one more who is a candidate to succeed himself. According to the custom all of these three can make use of the franked letter to take up communication with their constituents.

In fact some of them are sending out such franked letters to voters all over the state and while the letter is a public notice, yet the real object in sending them out is to impress the voter with the great friendship of the sender for every voter thus receiving literature.

Outsides of this purpose not five per cent of the data or the matter sent is worth while to the recipient. It is to essence an adroit way of approaching the voter at the expense of the government.

The method is one that should be condemned for the reason that it sets at naught the purpose of the direct primary law of this state.

Frank R. Gooding, Chief Justice Aladel, James H. Hawley or any other candidate in private life is limited by law to the expenditure of ten per cent of the first year's salary in getting nominated.

Even a hundred thousand dollars for canvassing that big state is a very small sum. If these men must use of that amount pay postage on printed circulars, must pay for printing the circulars and all other incidentals of the campaign. On the other hand

by the means of the government frank on letters, the members of congress can save postage in any sum which will cover the whole state with circulars and not have to report such as a primary campaign expenditure, for the reason that it does not represent actual money.

The sums held good for pay for service for each of the congressmen allowed so much for clerks hired. The candidate in private life must charge such service to private expense.
