Some of the Power Rates to Be Higher

PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION ORDERS TRUCE

Commercial Schedule for All Consumers Put on Same Plane

The schedule given herewith is the result of the conference of the representatives of the companies, who they returned to the commission their opinion that they were willing to submit to these rates temporarily in order to make the commission in arriving at a fair basis and the working out of an equitable schedule.

communities in the south and south-east the rates will be marked. The rates established are said to be lower than those in any adjoining state, and considerably lower than the rates prevailing in the east. It will be noted, too, as significant that from this time forward there will be but one set of figures for all commercial rates set out entirely. This will simplify the situation and make it much easier for any consumer to compare rates in any one and only one way.

This schedule does not apply to the Utah Power & Light company, but operates extensively in the extreme southeastern section of the state. Just why this is not so is not made clear. One explanation is that the Utah concern is operating in non-competing territory. Another is that it supplies such small communities and the expense of reaching these small communities is so great that the rate applied to the other companies might not be fair for this concern.

Great good to the public and to the power companies is expected to flow from this sort of a tariff commission.—In brief it is expected to end the ruinous "power war" and it is expected to prevent many consumers against extortion.—Stateman.

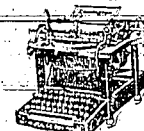

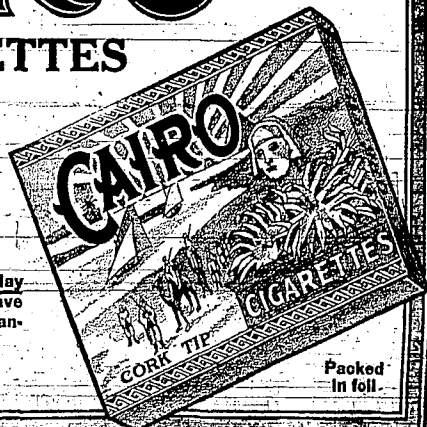

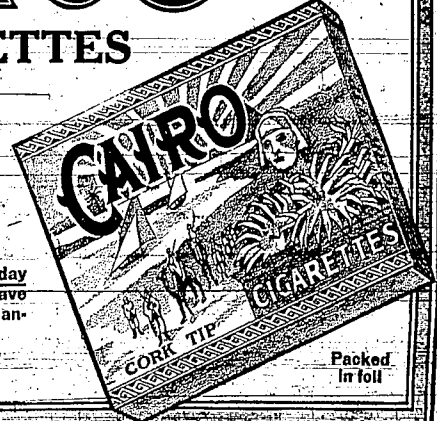

CONVICTS ON STATE WORK

State Land Board And Warden Plan To Use Men.

Idaho, Idaho, March 25.—(Idaho) launched a new scheme to solve his convict labor problem today when the land board and the prison board, in joint session, decided to employ convict labor in the reclamation of wild areas of state land in the Gem State.

The plan is to use the best land in the state; water is available by pumping from Snake river and the state is already taxed for maintenance of the system.

There are now 250 convicts in the penitentiary. If it is proposed to place 100 of them in a colony on this land under prison guard and have them clear the acreage, level the land and plant the canals and laterals and put the entire 10,000 acres under cultivation. This land is now held at \$25 an acre or \$250,000 for the tract. Brought under cultivation it is estimated it will be worth \$100 an acre.

Warden Swook, Equal Commissioner Day and members of the land board will visit the Gem district tomorrow and talk out definite plans. State laws permit the employment of convicts on public work outside the prison walls, and great things are expected from the new scheme. It has never been tried elsewhere.—(Idaho Falls) Register.

HEALTH AND HYGIENE

Why Should the Baby Have Whooping Cough?

Here are the facts for the one—it is hard to see how they can be misunderstood; whooping cough is not a highly contagious disease. It is generally spread only by close contact, such as kissing or inhaling the spray which is thrown from the mouth of an infected person. It could be controlled with no great difficulty and yet it kills ten thousand children and never, every year in America.

This is almost unbelievable, but nevertheless, it is true. Of all the children under one year of age who have whooping cough, 27 in the hundred die. Of all who have it between 1 and 2 years of age, 11 in the hundred die. Of those between 2 and 5 years of age, 5 per cent die; above 5 years of age, happily, the mortality is very low.

Yet there is no need to panic. Parents should protect their children from a disease which kills one in four of every infant under one year that is attacked.

It is fatal, of course.

It is safe to say, however, that an infant whose child has ever had whooping cough is unimpaird of its vigor and forgetful of its illness.

The most serious complication of the disease is the pneumonia which frequently results from this influenza, sometimes in a few days, and death when it takes place is usually the result of pneumonia rather than of the disease itself. In most cases, however, the coughing spells are quite more frequent and more severe up to a certain point and then gradually

How Can They Be Careless!

With a disease of this severity and with such fatal results in so many instances, how can a mother knowingly expose her child to whooping cough? The danger was low even in a mother who has seen her own child exhausted by whooping cough but sufficient to others by failing to prevent the spread of the disease.

To prevent whooping cough from spreading further but few things are so important as to keep the child from contact with other children. A child who has whooping cough should not be allowed to go to Sunday school, to day school or to the homes of other families, and should not play with other children.

Isolation should be enforced in whooping cough as in diphtheria and scarlet fever.
