REBELS JOINED AT VERNA

Make Common Cause Against The United States In Issue

O'Shaughnessy Given Pass Port by Mexican Provisional Government

(Special to The Times) Salt Lake City, April 23.—Nelson O'Shaughnessy, American Charge at Vera Cruz, was handed his passport by Huerta and arrived at Vera Cruz this evening. The giving of passports to minister of charge of affairs in most cases has preceded a declaration of war. Charge Alvaro was handed his passport at Washington at 12:30 p. m.

General Zapata, commander of rebel forces in southern Mexico, has formally declared war against the United States. He has ordered all arms to be used and it was announced at noon they would make common cause against Americans. The entrance of arms has been restored by the United States. General Carranza, first chief of the Constitutional army, has notified President Wilson that he considers seizure of Vera Cruz unjustifiable and invites the president to withdraw troops from Mexico, and plans him to deal with the constitutional government.

General Carranza has demanded reparation for insult to the flag at Tampico. He has ordered all arms to be used and it was announced at noon they would make common cause against Americans. The entrance of arms has been restored by the United States. General Carranza, first chief of the Constitutional army, has notified President Wilson that he considers seizure of Vera Cruz unjustifiable and invites the president to withdraw troops from Mexico, and plans him to deal with the constitutional government.

Rebels Arise! American Troops, Nogales, Ariz.—The Constitutionalists are rising trenches in Nogales, Sonora, to prevent American invasion. It is reported that the rebels have taken a meeting of Constitutional chiefs in Nogales, Sonora, and it is believed that if American soldiers alighted there in Sonora they would be fired upon and if the American machine landed in Vera Cruz, they would be shot.

Less than half an hour after leaving the side of the United States transport Prairie the Mexicans had landed and the absence of resistance at the water front and failure of the Mexicans to lay down their arms, the Mexicans had possession of the water front.

The reported union of the continental Mexican forces to fight the United States in a very serious aspect to the Mexican situation and will mean long and costly warfare to sub-

due the much larger combined forces. Such action also has a sinister look with possibly much behind it to complicate the adjudication of Mexico. It does not seem possible that the Villa would stake his chances for success under protection of this country, unless some strong promises have been made by certain powers who have large interests in Mexico.

A RIDICULOUS PROPOSAL. The country has been favored of late with disconcerting evidence of the ignorance of some members of congress on the subject of our navy. Lack of elementary knowledge in such high quarters on matters of grave national import is greatly to be regretted, and when to this is added the fact that these ignorantly made and adopted of an active spirit of mischief, the situation becomes deplorable.

And now comes Senator Weeks with his amazing proposal to place the fast scout cruisers of the navy in service as carriers of mail and freight between New York, New Orleans and the Pacific coast. This is an impossible scheme for the introduction on the floor of the senate of such an utterly impractical proposal as this for it is a fact which must be well known to every one of the senators, representatives, congressmen, that there is within a few minutes' reach of the capital at all

times a body of expert advisers, not merely in the navy, but in every other government department, who are not only willing, but very eager to afford all possible technical information and enlightenment on subjects which the members may wish to bring up for discussion, either in the house or the senate. If Senator Weeks had taken the trouble to consult the secretary, he would have been instantly assured that to use naval vessels for the transport of mail and freight was a proposition impossible from every point of view.

In the first place, the transfer of vessels from naval to commercial service would violate one of the very first principles upon which an efficient government is maintained, namely, that every ship shall be in such a condition of efficiency that, in the sudden crisis of war, it can instantly proceed to the appointed rendezvous in which the mobilized fleet is being assembled. Of all types of craft there is no one whose service would be more quickly called for than that of the scouts, whose duties would require them to operate far in the van of the fleet, where they could obtain the earliest possible information as to the strength and destination of the enemy's forces.

In these days of watchful government where, as in the case of the German navy, from three fourths to four-fifths of the principal units are maintained in full commission and active service, a decline here may be struck contemporaneously with the declaration of war, or even in anticipation of it. It has always been a characteristic of our foreign policy, and was no more so recently today, that we have been reluctant to make any distribution of our military forces which might bear any hostile construction by the nation with whom we conduct diplomatic exchange, our best service, as we have shown in a recent article, is altogether limited as it is, and were the only three distinctively scout vessels that we possess to be transferred, as Senator Weeks has suggested, to commercial work, it is perfectly conceivable that a sudden declaration of war might find the "Cloister" at Valparaiso, the "Salem" at Buenos Ayres, and the "Birmingham" in the Straits of Malacca.

If Senator Weeks had taken the trouble to inquire, he would have been told that one of the chief difficulties of the naval constructor is to find space for such equipment, stores, bedding, accommodations, fuel, etc., as must be carried by a warship in

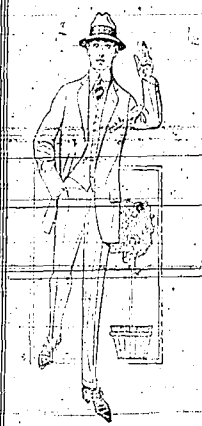
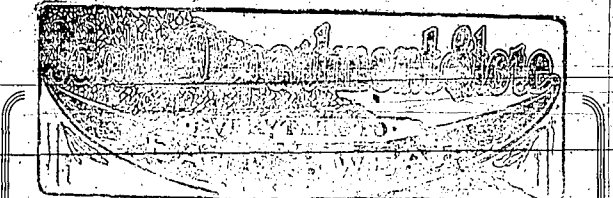

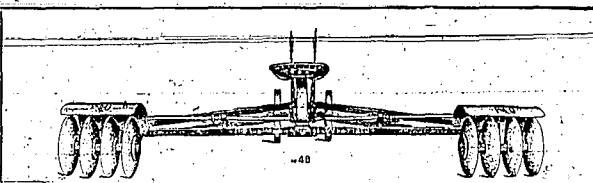

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

League of Commercial Bodies' Hold Meeting In Pocatello.

The state league of commercial bodies of southern Idaho held a very successful meeting in Pocatello the first of the week. It was the largest meeting ever held by the league and Secretary McMillan of the Commercial club states that much good will come from the meeting. The following resolutions were adopted:

"We are committed on resolutions heretofore submitted following for your consideration:

"Whereas, the great need of Idaho at the present time is the immigration of more people to develop its resources and the encouragement of the investment of foreign capital in the state to its benefit and the support of its government; and whereas, the passenger traffic to the Panama-Pacific Exposition in 1915 will offer a splendid opportunity to satisfy this need;

"Resolved, That the Idaho State League of Commercial Bodies heretofore endorsed the work done by the Panama-Pacific Exposition Committee of Idaho in being the first to complete its building; and that we pledge the cooperation and support of its members to this committee in the work of interesting business and investors in the state.

"Whereas, The Idaho State League of Commercial Bodies' Realizing that the circulation of highly colored literature in the form of expensive booklets and pamphlets is a wasteful and unprofitable expense to the individual as well as the state commercial bodies we desire to discourage the issue of expensive advertising literature, and to encourage the issue of small, economical booklets containing facts based on existing conditions that will be beneficial and instructive to prospective home builders and capitalists.

"Resolved, That the better cooperation of this league be given the railroads by advertising and exploiting the resources of Idaho and that we urge upon the railroads the issue of such a publication through the state of Idaho either going to or returning from the exposition.

"Whereas, the issue of advertising of Commercial societies of Idaho for the purpose of cooperation and raising the standard of their efficiency. With these objects in view, we recommend that all commercial bodies of the state affiliate with the league and accept membership in the same, and that all meetings of these bodies be held in accordance with the resolutions of the league.

"Resolved, That we endorse the editorial work that is being done by the Sew Idaho First magazine, and realize that the cooperation of this magazine with the Idaho State League of Commercial Bodies will be a most beneficial and profitable one.

"Whereas, an exhaustive scientific study of the rivers and their courses in Idaho has been made and an inventory of geological surveys of the United States, thereby giving valuable data for use in determining the amount of water available to be appropriated by irrigation projects and for use and development of power, thereby saving the taxpayer in the state from actions due to lack of knowledge of the matters, and

"Whereas, The Interstate Commerce Commission has been established by the act of Congress, approved August 4, 1887, and the act of Congress, approved March 3, 1907, which gave the state of Idaho a seat on the Interstate Commerce Commission.

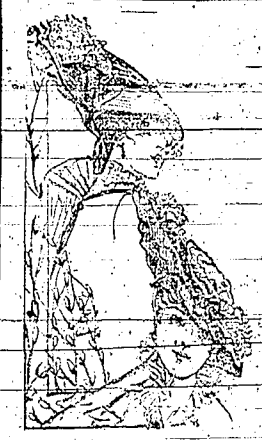

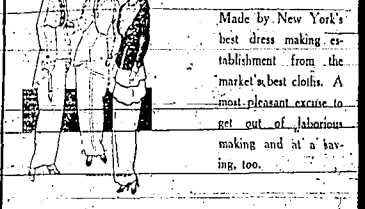

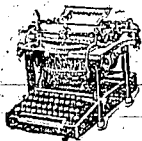
