leaves its home waters, is a vast fleet, and rapidly increasing, both in tonnage and efficiency. Out of the 7,000,000 tons of merchant vessels, an ordinarily reported by the Bureau of Navigation, 6,283,000 tons are engaged in American trade, and only 727,000 tons are reserved for foreign carrying.

Of the 6,283,000 tons, 2,800,000 tons are engaged in the coastwise trade of the United States, and 3,483,000 tons are engaged in foreign trade.

The coastwise shipping of the United States amounted to 6,300,000 tons in 1913. This year's tonnage is expected to increase for greater than the 1,500,000 tons of British shipping employed wholly or partly in the coastwise trade of the United Kingdom, with the entire German merchant marine, in both foreign and domestic commerce, 5,500,000 tons, or with the total 1,152,500 tons of Italy.

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## PANAMA AND COASTWISE TRAFFIC

There has been in the Panama canal, and in the coastwise shipping, a very noticeable increase in tonnage. A few years ago the tonnage of coastwise American ships which could have been handled at once in the case of the railroad, and now we hear very little of such single ship influences. 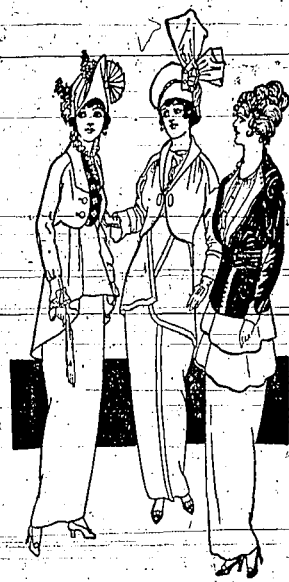

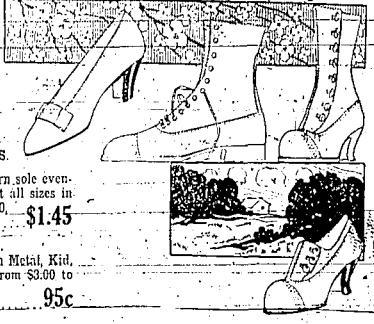

Mr. Chairman Ladies and Gentlemen: I believe it is the duty of a man when he occupies such a high position as that of United States senator to state plainly to the people his position on all of the important questions of the day.
