The experiment carried on by J. L. Danbe on his ranch east of this city under the direction of Government Expert Kinn, will be watched with interest by a large number of the ranchers here threatened with property trouble. Mr. Danbe, at his own expense, is drilling a number of wells down below the water table and believes that the wells will drain all of his land. From the well now being drilled a large portion of his land is being drained. It is expected that by sinking a number of wells along the edge of Rock Creek canyon that the land in the entire neighborhood will be relieved of its water. While the indications point to the wells as the solution, in another direction, the Canal company is using a large amount of drainage tiles as a remedy. The outcome of the two different methods while costly to the individual, will be worth thousands of dollars to the whole tract and should be made a part of the expense of all the ranchers. It is too heavy a burden to place on any one of the individuals and should not be his loss to redden land injured by water from neighboring land.

JURORS HOLD THE SACK

Idaho Laws Law in Providing For Court Fees. A peculiar situation exists in Idaho, which has been the means of forcing many people to hold the sack, and they are still holding it without any hope of the condition being changed. Idaho laws provide no means of taking care of the jury fees in either the justice or probate courts. Practically all other fees are provided for, but the jury has had to be forced to secure, and there are thousands of people who do the latter in this state.

To illustrate, Hill Smith brings suit against a brother-in-law, with a judgment for certain of the costs, but when it comes to trial Brown exercises his constitutional right of trial by jury. He has legal no provision for the jury's pay and the law makes none. The case winds up and Brown wins, thus adding the cost into the plaintiff's bill, but Smith does not sue for the jury. They have given their time, lost probably more than the jury fee would amount to by being called away from their business and forced to serve when unprepared regardless of what may happen to them. Some business men have been known to forego other of the litigants to pay them for their time and expenses of which wins. Similar cases are tried in the district court and the result is the same except that the district court always assesses the cost against the people of the county and it comes out of the taxpayer's pocket.

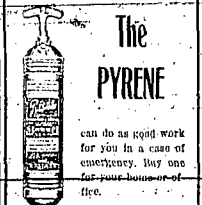

MAINTENANCE CASE DECIDED

Action a Test Case Brought by the Settlers.

A decision in the case of J. E. Pohlman vs. the Salmon River Canal company was rendered by Judge Walters of the district court, at Idaho Falls, Monday morning. The case involved the right of the entrymen to one year's water deliveries without charge, and the amount of the maintenance charges an amount in excess of 25c per acre for the year 1912. The court found for the defendant company.

The action was a test case, undertaken by the settlers' association, in that the proposition was advanced, that if the proposition was advanced, that the settlers' association should commence and that the contract implied that for the two years succeeding the year 1912, the maintenance charges should not exceed the sum of 25c per acre.

The association based its case upon the agreement of the contract with settlers, in substance, no charge shall be made for the delivery of water prior to January 1, 1911, but that during the interval during the delivery of water, the charge shall not exceed 25c per acre and that after that date the yearly maintenance charge shall be the amount of the cost of the water system. The association relied in its position accentuated by the fact that the canal company, being unable to furnish any water at all, commenced prior to January 1, 1911, delivered water at intervals during the season of 1911, and made no charge therefor.

The association believed the company thereby recognized its obligation to furnish water under the contract for one year without charge, and that the fact that the delivery of 1911 did not constitute the proper and required fulfillment of the contract because of the character of the water delivered, and that therefore the company was liable for the year 1912, for which a charge of 25c per acre would be levied, the first year of the contract, for which no charge whatever should be made, and that consequently the date when the water was delivered, in view of the actual cost of maintaining the system would be extended two years, the period of time contemplated in the contract.

The court in conclusion did not accept the water as the quality delivered, for the 1911, or any of the year's deliveries, to date have met the requirements of the contract, nor did it express any opinion as to the maintenance charges in question, but confined itself to the question of reading into the contract a provision requiring one year's maintenance charges of water, without charge, and of interpreting the intent of the contract so as to require an assessment not to exceed 25c per acre for 1912.—Idaho Herald.

SUGAR CO. MAKES REDUCTION

Trail, Idaho Cuts 10c Pounds for Second Time Since New Tariff.

Lowered the tariff on sugar has unfortunately affected the local sugar market, and the district court, which the Sugar company have found it necessary to finance individuals, says the Idaho States. This is the second time since the tariff was lowered in April, 1910, that the district court has cut the price of sugar from 17c to 15c, and from 15c to 14c, per pound.

The reason we do not pay the dividends we used to is that we do not have the money made by the tariff. For a time after March 1, prospects looked dark, but they are beginning to pick up a little now and it seems no longer the uncertainty of the past.

Without doubt the present conditions will not make anything to boast of. The 24 cent reduction on the sugar tariff has hurt us and if the \$1 reduction that is scheduled to take place in 1916 is not repealed, I certainly do not know how the old tariff will help us.

The tariff on sugar cuts will dump here, but on American markets at a price far below anything we can reach, but so simple cannot compete with

HAVE YOU REGISTERED

Terms of New Registration Law For Coming Election.

Have you registered? The new registration law provides it is not necessary for any elector who has registered and voted at the last general election to register again for any general or special election, unless such elector has been removed from the rolls by another county, or failed to vote at a general election. The registration officers are the clerk of the district court, justice of the peace, or notary public. August 1 is the last date when an elector can register for registration officers cannot register after August 1 by posting their names preceding any election at which he desires to vote and the primary election falls on September 1.

The county commissioners are required at their first meeting in July of this month, to cause 15 days notice to be given in some newspaper in the county or by posting their names and general description of the election precincts and the location of the polling places, naming the above registration officers and the date when names may be made at any time up to a week on the 30th day next preceding the general election.

When an elector inquires from one county to another the registrar before whom he wishes to register in the new county must notify the registrar of the old county of the fact. An elector may be registered on the day of election
