TRYING TO SETTLE WATER TROUBLES Canal Company and City Water Company Before Commission

CITY WATER COMPANY ANXIOUS TO INCREASE WATER SUPPLY Canal Company Wishes to Have Its Legal Status Defined, Hearing Held in Boise Saturday

Twin Falls water troubles were aired on Saturday for the information of the public... There seems to be a serious situation in that city, due largely to the fact that it has cropped out beneath the Twin Falls Land & Water company and the city of Twin Falls.

Present at the conference with the public utilities commission Saturday were E. H. Critchlow, of Salt Lake, one of the members of the Idaho Waterworks company; President Harlin, Secretary W. O. Taylor and Attorney M. Bowen, of the Twin Falls Land & Water company; Mayor H. Butler and Superintendent Willard Wyatt, of the Twin Falls Waterworks company, and Paul S. A. Heller, engineer of the Twin Falls South Side.

There seemed to be a disposition on the part of the commission to get together in some kind of agreement to live over the lumbering industry in the Twin Falls area, to save the trees and other vegetation and protect the city against fire.

CHINESE RUN OUT OF CITY Small Mob Gathers Up Celestials Monday




