NEED FOR A DAY OF REST

Harvard Scientists Assert It Is Necessary to Restore the Nervous Tones.

The refreshing influence of the so-called day of rest on the tired and overworked is attested by the strenuous routine of a busy life is a feature which he himself can duly appreciate in the effects on his "feelings" and "spirits".

Harvard scientists have been making a careful study of the whole question of fatigue and efficiency from a physiological standpoint. A long series of experiments have been made on first-year medical students who were following a regular routine of school work during six days of each week.

The routine was interrupted each day by the students, but in no case in precisely the manner of the "week days". The daily observations made of these persons during several weeks show that at the beginning of the week the general results tend to be high, that from then until the end of the week there is fairly continuous decline, and that following the interruption of the routine by the intermission of Sunday it returns to the original high level.

The decline is interpreted as a cumulative result of general fatigue incident to routine. What is even more significant, however, is the added fact that a pronounced break in the routine on the day of rest occasionally may bring about a return of sensitiveness to a high point, or, in other words, it restores the nervous tone.

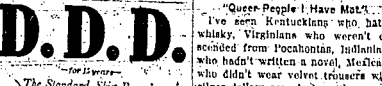

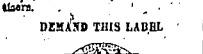

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Utilities Commission Session

The first installation of 100 kilowatts and the first installation of 100 kilowatts at Howard Ford plant in Colorado, in 1904-1906 was the design of the electrician at the Madison River plant of 2000 kilowatts, the largest plant at Logan of 2000 kilowatts, and of the Haines plant in Colorado.

Mr. Nunn was then asked if he believed in any engineering professional societies. He then named the American Society of Civil Engineers and several others in the United States.

Mr. Nunn then asked in detail what he considered the principal elements in the making of railroads and in connection with this he showed the rates could be made cheaper by the proper construction of the plants without putting too much money into them.

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Mr. Nunn spoke of the ideal plant which would be loaded to load factor at 85 per cent which would be sufficient to run a plant taking in but one dollar that more power would be used at times than at others.

Mr. Nunn said that it was twenty-four years since the first hydroelectric plant was started, and that in that length of time that industry had come to mean only the industry of electricity.

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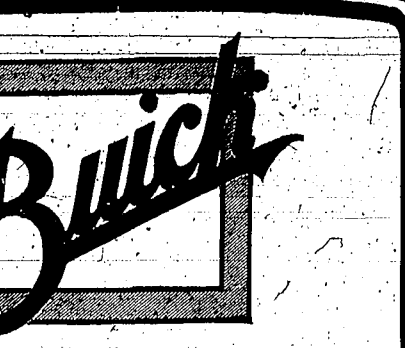

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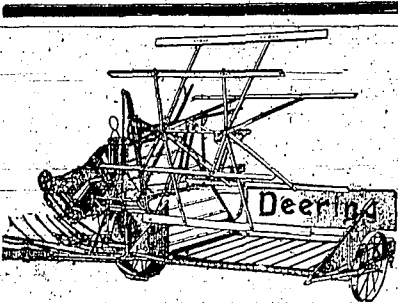
