PRESIDENT'S WIFE CALLED BY DEATH

Had Suffered Many Months But Now Realized Her Condition

FACTS OF DEATH GREAT SHOCK TO THE COUNTRY

Funeral Was Held Monday at the White House, Remains Taken to Her Home in Home, Georgia.

Mr. Woodrow Wilson, wife of the United States president, died at 6 o'clock Thursday afternoon in the arms of her devoted husband.

The president was completely unshaken by the shock, and his grief was unobscured. He bore up well under the strain, however, and devoted himself to his daughter.

The end came while Mrs. Wilson was unconscious. Her illness took a turn for the worse before 1 o'clock in the afternoon, and from then on she grew gradually weaker.

Keeling at the bedside at the end of the afternoon, the president, Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, and Mrs. Wilson's daughter, Dr. Cary T. Grayson, U. S. senator, and a nurse were in the room, and the president's secretary, Mr. Clegg, was also present.
