STATES POSITION ON PROHIBITION

Haines Denies That All Idaho Parties Are Pledged Dry

SPokane Says Prohibition is Not an Issue

Spokane Paper, Haines Interview in Which Gov. Haines Refused to be Questioned on Prohibition

Governor John M. Haines, Republican candidate to succeed himself as governor of Idaho, arrived in Spokane yesterday morning from Sand Point en route to Whitney and Shoshone counties to consult with friends relative to his candidacy. In commenting on the political situation as to the status of the prohibition question in that state Governor Haines said: "It is not true that all three parties in Idaho at their state conventions inserted planks in their platforms pledging to abstain from the liquor traffic. That impression seems to have become general, but is slightly erroneous. Only the progressive party positively inserted prohibition in the other two parties merely pledging themselves to submit to the voters at the next general election a constitutional amendment providing for state-wide prohibition, and other voters, the republicans and democrats pledged themselves to give the voters a chance to decide the matter."

Haines Refers to Platform

When asked where he stood on the prohibition question the governor stated he did not care to be interviewed on that issue. His party's platform, as announced, was his platform, and regardless of personal opinion, he would abide by that platform and carry it out to the letter.

Prohibition, however, is not the big question with us, declared Governor Haines. "What we are mostly interested in is the reducing of our burdensome taxes. There are no initiatives or referendums now pending looking toward this, so it is in an economical administration that our hopes lie."

COUNTY DIVISION ELECTION CALLED

Board Makes Election Day Double Duty

PETITION OF WEST-END CITIZENS FOR TEST VOTE GRANTED

Wible County Participates in Deciding Whether It Shall be Divided in Coming Election

The county commissioners acting upon the petition filed by about fourteen hundred voters of the West End of Twin Falls county have decided to call for a county division election for November 3rd, the same date as the general election for state and county. While the petition for division must come from the territory comprising the proposed new county, the whole county votes on the question.

The declared intention of the high people to make the issue clear out and fight it out in the open is meeting with favor here and the people accept the change thus laid down and will spend considerable time in campaigning against division.

HARVEST BIG CROP

Wah Construction Company Has 12,000 Tons of Hay in Stock

Ten machines began mowing the last third of the season, the second crop of alfalfa in a 150-acre field at San Jacinto, last Tuesday, and when this is in stock at the end of the week the Wah Construction company will have harvested over 12,000 tons of hay. In addition, it has begun the harvesting of 4,000 acres of grain, principally oats, and also blends of getting away with 125 acres and oats at a time on the San Jacinto ranch alone. GERMANS WIN BIG VICTORY

Paris Admits Defeat After Desperate Fighting

Allied Troops Forced Back After Three Days' Battle. Japan Begins Bombardment of Tsing Tau

LATE WAR NEWS

Salt Lake City, Aug. 25th, 1914. Germans have taken Brussels three days to pay war tax of forty million dollars. If not paid then the city will be destroyed.

Belgium beginning to manifest discontent against Allies for not giving them proper support against Germany. Five forts at Namur taken by Germans, four forts still holding out, but capture seems imminent.

London and Paris greatly disappointed because of German success in yesterday's battle. Both experts here had news of today's fighting. Francis Joseph signs decree placing Vienna in state of defense. Great battle still progressing in province of Holland.

Kaiser's nephew, Count Von Seiwitz, taken prisoner. Thirty thousand Germans are attacking Malen, Belgium. Services ordered Shubans. Practically no news from front today, owing to darkness and cut cables. It is understood attack continues at Klein Chaou.

PARIS—The French war office has issued the following announcement:

EX-GOVERNOR GOODING FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR

There is certainly nothing truer than that men may justly be judged by their performances. In his candidacy for the republican nomination for United States senator, F. R. Gooding asks nothing better than that the people study his record as governor, as well as his election and his record in his accomplishments determine whether he deserves their confidence and support.

F. R. Gooding came to Idaho first and has remained in the state ever since. There was no special good fortune attached to his success in business. It came because of persistent hard work coupled with business judgment and thrift. His reputation for honesty in business is well established. What he has promised he has done—what he owes he paid. His gifts to institutions and to people were given outright, and did not carry an obligation of any kind. His private life has been open as the day. The same thing can be said of his public career. There have been no reservations—no star chamber proceedings in his service to the people. The reasons for his success have been those that have been expressed and have been altogether creditable. He has not been insincere.

The French and English, the plan of attack having failed owing to unforeseen difficulties, have retired on the covering positions." The fighting was furious, according to all reports.

WASHINGTON—It is reported that the German embassy has received reports by wireless from the German chancellor, advising the ambassador that the allies are as usual as whipped; that the French army in Alsace has been utterly routed; that the Russians have been overwhelmed and that a big army under the crown prince is nearing Paris, having defeated all the forces of the powers in his pathway. Vienna reports to the embassy also say that Germany is about to invade England with a big fleet of Zeppelins now nearing completion.

LONDON—There is no joy in the metropolis of England over Monday's reports from the front. While the Paris reports give assurance that the setback of the allies before the Germans is only temporary and that the retirement was made in good order, there is a universal apprehension here.

FILER PIONEER CALLED BY DEATH

F. E. Allen Dies On His Ranch Monday Night

DECEASED WAS FOUNDER OF THE FILER STATE BANK

Funeral Services Were Held Today, Death Caused as a Surprise Both to Relatives and Friends.

The many friends of Mr. F. E. Allen of Filer, were surprised and shocked Monday to learn of his death at the Sunset Ranch, the family home near Filer, last Monday night. Mr. Allen has not been well for some time but few of his friends really knew of his serious condition until the report of his death was received. Mr. Allen was born at Kelowna, Michigan, May 12th, 1867, and was 47 years and three months old at the time of his death. Most of his early life was spent in Kelowna, with the exception of five years spent at Albion, Michigan, in 1885 he was married to Miss Jim Hilkeman, of Albion, who survives him. Besides Mrs. Allen and a daughter, Mrs. Lewis E. Stricker, of Albion, Michigan, the deceased leaves a mother, Mrs. S. H. Allen, of Albion, and two sisters, Mrs. H. W. Coakman, of Los Angeles and Mrs. E. R. Lord, of Albion.

Mr. Allen with his family came to Filer seven years ago and in 1908 founded the Filer state bank, which he later sold to take up his residence upon a ranch. As a public opinion citizen, Mr. Allen did much to help in building up the busy little town of Filer, and has a large number of friends both here and in this city who regret his death.

The funeral services were held today by Dr. J. F. Shepherd, of this city and the remains interred in the Twin Falls cemetery.

County Commissioners Meet Boosters for Discussion

HANSEN MEN GETTING MANY CITIZENS LINED UP FOR PROJECT

Very little opposition met with by the committee in canvassing the county.

The question of the county building, an air bridge across the Snake river north of Hansen was the topic which kept the county commissioners and some twenty-five citizens busy this afternoon at the courthouse. The committee working for the bridge had lined up a large number of citizens from all over the county and the arguments presented took away any objection produced which might have caused opposition. The cost of the bridge, estimated at \$30,000 at the outside, will be covered by a special levy if the commissioners decide to put up the bridge.

AWAIT THEIR FAIR

Two Men Charged With Murder of James Molloy Remain in Jail

Carl Johnson and Louis Frely, the two men being held for the murder of James Molloy at the Blue Lakes grade during the latter part of July, are being kept in separate cells in the county jail by the sheriff awaiting the wheels of justice to determine their fate.

The mother of the prisoner admitted that the killing was premeditated for that motive was robbery, yet ventured to confess to Molloy was found in their person after arrest and a knife belonging to the man was later found in Johnson's coat which he had thrown away while being pursued by the officers, all of which seemed strongly to indicate the motive was robbery.

Letters found in Johnson's pockets indicate that he comes of a good family in Salt Lake City and that he was well liked where he formerly worked in a meat market there and it is likely that had company and too much liquor were charged him responsible for the trouble he is in. 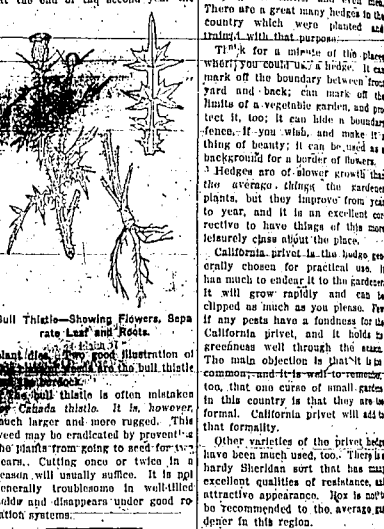

GERMANS WIN BIG VICTORY

(Continued from Page 1)

The plain fact seems to be that, after three days' fighting the allies have been defeated all along the line. The reason given for the retirement is that the "plan of attack" could not be carried out because of "unforeseen difficulties." This is believed to be a ruse to the effect of the popular idea that the Germans have all along been the aggressors and that the announced purpose of the allies on the line of battle extending from Mons, Belgium, to the Luxembourg frontier was to hold the invulnerable neck and prevent any crossing the French frontier, while the Russians operated against the enemy in the east.

The news now at hand giving the outcome of the largest battle of the war so far, leaves the painful impression here that the Germans have won in a highly important engagement and that they will press their advantage to continue the forward movement. There is comfort in the thought, however, that the liquidation of fortification will offer splendid resistance.

LONDON—The big battle front now extends from Mons to Namur, a distance of 100 miles. It will require several days to get the result. The Germans now have Lamelle and have 200,000 men at that point. Luxembourg is in the province of Muerthe et Moselle. It is a mile south of Nancy and about 172 miles from Paris. It is believed also that the cable between Nanking and Shanghai had been cut. The only news that has been permitted to come through is that the Japanese had commenced the bombardment of the German forts.

BERLIN—The blockade of Tientsin has been lifted and the cable has begun. British, French and Russian vessels of war are taking part in the movement.

It is the present time only British warships have received orders to cooperate with the Japanese in the operations against Kias Chow, on the Hainan side. The French navy is expediting orders to assist the English. There probably will not be more than 100 of the three divisions from each nation.

TSING TAI—The Germans have destroyed the rail stations here and are cutting off any supplies to an attacking fleet in giving them slighting points. They have also destroyed the railroad bridge on the boundary of their leased territory. The inhabitants of these villages have been partially exterminated.

LONDON—A Copenhagen dispatch to the Exchange Telegram company dated August 24, says: "The conditions of peace which Joseph of Austria, according to telegrams received Monday, is much worse. His death is a question of hours."
