PARIS EXPECTS SIEGE Turkey May Enter Into World Conflict as Ally of Austria and Germany

Russians Claim Great Success on Western Border of Prussia. English Warship Sinks German Auxiliary Cruiser Off African Coast

Sail Lark Out, Aug. 27th, 1914. All Summer forecasts have failed. Longley has been taken by the German British cruiser sinks Kaiser Wilhelm der Gross, off the west coast of Africa.

Japanese Vice Admiral Kato sends wireless message to governor of Kiao Chow, declaring the port of Tsin-tai (Shanghai) closed to Japanese ships.

Washington—An acute situation has arisen in the Balkan states over the possible entry of Turkey into the European war, according to official notices to the American government from various sources.

Many Washington diplomats familiar with the situation consider it practically certain that should Turkey ally with Germany and Austria, Italy would abandon her position of neutrality and join Great Britain, France, Russia and Serbia, who could count on the assistance of Greece.

Greece is under marked by her army mobilized along the frontier watching Turkey's movements. The troops of the Ottoman empire are ready to move at any moment to that effect, Italy's order for mobilization on August 27 is believed here to be due to some extent Turkey's military activity.

The United States is watching the situation in Turkey particularly because of the presence there of hundreds of American missionaries.

Amos A. Morgan has been making long efforts on the situation for a time a week ago the situation seemed alarming. The governor of one of the Turkish provinces had threatened to Americanize Turkey and England went to war.

Morgan immediately denounced the situation with the Turkish foreign office and exact assurances that if any subordinate officials had been so inclined they would be censured and that Americans would be accorded courtesy and respect in any eventuality.

For a time the Washington government had under consideration a suggestion for Americanizing Turkey, but that a warship sent to Turkey for auxiliary effect on the receipt of reassuring advice from him the plan was abandoned and the officials here now declare there is no cause for alarm.

The cruiser's North Carolina and Tennessee, now in European waters, are a million of relief, would be available in case of emergency to bring American aid. Latest reports show that Americans feel safe and that they are confident of their existing position of a problem, however, rapidly being solved by the American government's board of relief.

GOVERNMENT TO BUY SHIPS

Bill for Incorporation of Ten Million Dollar Company Presented in House.

WASHINGTON—Plans for building up a permanent American merchant marine by the purchase of foreign flag ships to be operated by the government went forward Monday in congress and at the White House.

In the House, Representative Alexander H. R. S. presented a bill for the incorporation of a \$10,000,000 company to own and operate ocean steamers under supervision of a shipping board composed of the president, the secretary of the treasury, the postmaster general and the secretary of commerce. The government would subscribe for 51 per cent of the capital stock of an appropriation. Ships would be bought by the government of \$20,000,000 foreign tonnage.

President Wilson reiterated his determination to urge the ship purchase plan and said he expected it to be in operation within two or three weeks. Reports that he had authorized the advisability of abandoning the project, said, were without foundation.
