AMERICAN LOSS AND GAIN IN EUROPE'S WAR
That the European conflict marks the beginning of a new commercial and industrial era in the United States, says an authority in the New York Journal of Commerce...

The "favorable conditions" mentioned by Professor Seligman, refer to the possibility of securing solutions in which to transport this greatly increased output of industry, and he says that what is "really the crux of the problem" is "our ability to establish a merchant marine." Having pointed out various ways in which this might be done, Professor Seligman adds that "in one way or another our carrying trade will increase con-

based on an investigation conducted by the research department of the Institute. The summary follows:
LOSS
(1) The tendency to drain gold from this country, which must be offset by maintaining reserves, restricting credits, and avoiding inflation of currency.
(2) Closure of European market for American securities and sale at low prices in this country, resulting in checking all permanent financing and stopping new projects and enterprises that have not been financially probable permanent diversion from the United States and Canada of large amounts of European capital which would otherwise have come to us...

(3) Cutting of certain raw materials (chiefly chemicals) which are essential to some lines of manufacture; reduction in European demand for raw materials, partly manufactured, and manufactured goods, resulting in partial readjustments and in losses.
(4) Increase in the cost of living.

PROFIT
(1) Opportunity to increase the prestige and banking connections of American in international financing.
(2) Opportunity to enter South American and Oriental markets and acquire a larger share of this trade.

(3) Supply of foodstuffs and military supplies at high prices in European markets, resulting in prosperity for producers of these goods and for industries which cater to these products.

While admitting the opportunities of the United States to build up its export trade, Dean Johnson points out the "difficulties of breaking into new markets, even when they are temporarily left open; and as for extending its financial influence, he says: "It is likely that the banks of South America and the Orient will increase their deposits in New York...

"For the present, however, we are confronted by a closed market for securities with no definite prospect of its being reopened. Broadly speaking, only hand-to-mouth financing is possible."

A striking feature of the situation, in Dean Johnson's opinion, "is the uneven influence of the war on American industries..."

"There is scarcely a business in the country that does not need immediate readjustment. It may not be radical in most cases, but it will be enough in thousands of instances to make the difference between profit and loss, between success and failure. The readjustment may come simply in the form of orders for stock and raw materials. It may consist in securing additional capital for some timely expansion. Every business needs, more than ever, hawk-eyed watching and quick decision."

ly with the growth of manufacturing industry, and the combined result will undoubtedly be temporary prosperity. So much for the immediate effect of Europe's war on our business, and what we come to expect in other respects is a "more complicated situation," says the writer, because:

"In the first place, the prodigious destruction of capital which is to be expected the world over will also affect the situation here. As the European countries would need much of their future surplus to repair the ravages of war, there would be so much left to invest in the United States. Our tempo of progress will therefore become slower. The relative decrease in the amount of available capital will mean a higher rate of interest. Specifically, also, this will mean a further fall in the price of securities and especially of bonds, government as well as railway and industrial. The tendency of wages, also, through out the world will be downward, because dearer capital means less efficient production, and less efficient production tends to a lowering of wages." TALKS ON THRIFT

No. 4.—SYSTEM IN SAYING.
"Provision for others is the fundamental responsibility of human life," —President Woodrow Wilson.
A regular plan of saving, adopted and religiously carried out, has been proven by the experience of many thrifty people to be the only way to save successfully.
Most of us need to be forced in some way or another to do many things which would really be greatly to our advantage.
Adopting a definite system surely helps you save because in a way it forces you to economize. You will feel that you must save and you will save.

When you have acquired the habit, your saving will be as regular as clock work, you will gradually build a substantial capital from your earnings and put yourself in a position to add to your capital, when necessary, through credit, because, with some money and a reputation for industry and thrift, you will be entitled to the confidence and co-operation of financial backers. And this will open the door to the broadest success, if you have the other qualities that make for success.
In the tenths of family incomes from \$10 to a few, a quarter goes to rent, a half to food, and its preparation, and the last fourth is the margin left for clothing and sundries. "People" law" an economist call it, knows few exceptions in moderate incomes.
If a family can reduce a month's rent to less than two weeks' income, can pay for a month's food, fuel and service on less than two weeks' pay, a beginning has been made in larger possibilities of thrift and saving for the future on a systematic basis.

UNABLE TO REACH CASTAWAYS

Terrible Weather Encountered and the Bear Was Forced to Turn Back.

Nome, Alaska, Sept. 1.—The United States revenue cutter Bear, which arrived here last night from Wrangell Island after an unsuccessful attempt to rescue 22 castaways from the Stefansson ship Karikuk, who have been on the island since March 10 last, reports encountering terrible weather.

The Bear, after leaving Nome July 21, went to Point Barrow for the north extremity of Alaska, to deliver the United States mail. She then proceeded west, between Wrangell and Herald islands, about 75 miles from Wrangell Island, she found her way blocked by mountains.

The Bear was several miles from the "Whaler" Fluvia, which was crushed in the ice near Domination point last night.

A heavy southerly gale is blowing in the ice and the Bear cannot get through.

The Canadian explorer ship Korokuk under command of Captain Robert A. Bartlett, was crushed in the ice north of Herald Island Jan. 1st.

OLD PRIZE OF WAR POLES MENACE CZAR IN NAVAL STRENGTH

Belgrade Has Been Fought Over For Many Centuries.

Ten Million of Them in Russia Hate the Government.

France and Russia Almost Equal to the Triple Alliance.

None of Countless Devastating Conflicts Since the Celts Built the First Fortifications Seventeen Hundred Years Ago.

If the spirit of the soldiers slain in Belgrade, the capital of Serbia, during the last thousand years could be re-encarnated as an armed host would be represented as has not been seen since Xerxes set out from Sardis to conquer the Greek world.

The Celts gave to Belgrade the name of Singidunum, and as such it was known until the seventeenth century A. D. The Romans took it from the Celts and called it Singidunum.

Toward the end of the sixteenth century the Turks, who had been expelled and took it, and the following century it fell into the hands of Hungarians.

The Serbian kings first gained its possession in the fourteenth century, and after 25 years the Serbian prince, George Brankovich, ceded it to the Hungarians.

The Turks under the Sultan Selim took it from the Hungarians and retained a Turkish possession until the Austrians captured it in 1683.

Then the Turks regained the city and held it until 1739, when, by a most brilliant campaign, Prince Eugene of Savoy reconquered it for the Austrians.

The dual government succeeded, much friction, and in June, 1902, the Turkish commander bombarded the Serbian quarter of the city.

Old-Time Friends at War Four of the Nations Involved Have Been at Peace With One Another for Century.

Germany and Russia have been at peace more than a century. They were the first great powers to declare war on each other.

Great Britain and Austria-Hungary have been on good terms for a hundred years. They never have clashed over colonies or trade.

Have the Battling Nations of Europe Food Enough for the Non-combatants?

The great war in Europe has brought to the front the question whether non-combatants can be fed while the armies, which fight upon their behalf, are contending for victory in the field.

Conditions are little better in England than on the continent; in the matter of the food-tonnage available they are worse for England never has known a month's supply of meat and cereals.

Have Been Forced to Surrender Their Nationality, While in Austria and Germany They Were Recently Treated.

Russia does not present an unbroken front to Austria or German arms. There can be little doubt that the most restless element in that vast empire is made up of the ten million of Poles who have been forced to surrender their nationalities.

On the other hand, 4,000,000 Poles within the boundaries of Austria-Hungary are expected to give wholehearted support to Emperor Francis Joseph.

The spectacle of the Poles of Russia, who are expected to give wholehearted support to Emperor Francis Joseph, and joining in sympathy with the Austrians will be a natural result of the treatment the ten million have received as subjects of the czar.

Russians and Poles, although both of the Slavic race, have strikingly different common political antagonisms between them.

Russia denies her Polish subjects everything that savors of preference in military and political life, although they come of a fierce race, ambitious to rule.

The Poles of Russia are subject to intolerance, it is said. The conservatives belong to the National League, which is described as an organization to encourage patriotism.

Germany's policy toward the Poles within her gates has not been pursued with the ruthless severity of Russia.

TWILIGHT OF KINGS—GLORY OF WAR GONE

Rulers Order Prayers and Then Start Hell on Earth.

Republic Marches East in Europe and This War Probably Will Deliver the People From the Sword.

Before establishing hell on earth the plastic king commend their subjects to God. See the king's exclamation, "Let us pray" says the Chicago Tribune in an editorial captioned "The Twilight of the Kings."
"And now I commend you to God," said the Kaiser from his balcony to the people in the streets. "Go to church and kneel before God and pray for his help for our gallant army."
"Pray that a farmer dragged from a barren field shall be speedier with a bayonet thrust than a winemaker from his vines in the Ardennes; that a Berlin lawyer shall be speedier with the rifle than a Moscow merchant; that a machine gun manned by Heidelberg students shall not jam and that one worked by Paris carpenters shall not jam; that a livestock breeder, armed in a quarrel in which he has no heat, shall outmatch a wheat grower from Poland; that Cossacks from the Don shall be lured into barbed wire entanglements and caught by masked gnomes; that an inspector of Salzburg shall blow the head of a baker from the Loire.
"Go to church and pray for help;" that the hell shall be hotter in innocent Ardennes than it is in equally innocent Poles; that it shall be hotter in innocent Kovno than in equally innocent Poles.

And the plastic ear commends his subjects to God that they may have strength of arm in quantity they do not understand; that they may suffer and endure and the name of Hohenzollern be greater than the name of Hohenzollern, that may be greater than the name of Hapsburg, that its territories shall be wider and the territories of Hohenzollern and the territories of Hapsburg less.

The plastic emperor of Austria commands his subjects to God, to suffer divine assistance to crush the parents of Serbia, dragged from the wheat field when it was ready for the scythe and given to the scythe themselves.
This is, we think, the last call of monarchy upon Divinity which Asmodeus waits in armor. The kings scribble their names and call it God, but out of the sacrifice will come, we think, a resolution firmly taken to have no more wheat growers and growers of corn, makers of wine, miners and fishers, artisans and traders, railors, and storekeepers offered up with prayer to the Almighty in a feigned slaughter, arms laid at each other without hand and without cause they know, or if they knew, would give a penny which way it was determined.

This is the twilight of the kings. Western Europe of the people may be caught in this debacle, but never again: Eastern Europe of the kings will be tomahawked and the name of God shall not give grace to a hundred square miles of broken bodies.
It is twilight, and here it comes with a sword to deliver the people from the sword.
—It is the twilight of the kings. The republic marches east in Europe.

If plebeians come again. If plebeians should come again Great Britain and France would be the nations to profit by it. British owners of merchantmen would no doubt seize the opportunity to send out fleets of privateers to make up for the fortunes of war, the losses sustained by the curtailment of ordinary commercial work.

Long-Distance Slaughter by Cold Calculation Now.

The glory and the romance of war is dead. It has become chiefly a matter of cold calculation, a bloody business of long-distance slaughter, with no longer any opportunity for dashing personal heroism—Henry M. Hyde in the Chicago Tribune.

Never again can a Napoleon, looking down from a hilltop, direct the movements of his army of 50,000 men as it manoeuvres under his eye on the plain below.

The modern general, directing a battle line 150 miles long—as the Japanese had at Mukden—will never be within sight of his troops. Oyamada, the Japanese chief of staff, was killed by the rear when that general's headquarters were over-run.
Never again will a commander being orders from headquarters to division and corps commanders, have two horses abated under him as he dashes across the battle front. Orders go out today from headquarters over the field telephone wires, which reach every brigade commander, as he, too, sits in safety far back of the line of fire.

Never again will a battery of field guns gallop madly into action, with the numbers sitting with crossed arms on the caissons and the infantry cheering their rescuers.
Modern field guns are located out of sight over the shoulders of a hill, three miles or more away. The gunners never even see a sight of the army they are firing at. Their fire is guided by calculations carefully made by an expert mathematician, who sits down in a hole in the ground and figures trajectories and angles and makes allowances for wind resistance.

"Hold your fire until you see the whites of the enemy's eyes." Is an heroic motto that will never be given in a modern battle.
Never in a modern battle will a platoon with a solid column of charging men be shown rallying on a shattered battle flag, which can be seen but dimly, through clouds of black smoke.
There are no battle flags; no smoke, and no charging columns on modern battle fields. The presence of a flag on the battle line would instantly reveal its location to the enemy. Smoke powder has taken the place of old old cloud-bulching explosives, and old clouds that used to smother the enemy's artillery fire and to drown his trenches in a flood of bulgite, each shaped shell bursts into from 100 to 300 projectiles. Then, while this fire is at its height, the infantry sets up a second or two at a time, and dodging and bent over, to the ditch through which flows the little stream.
Perhaps by the time the infantry is within close striking distance of the enemy they have taken the place of his artillery. Then they may be possible to order a charge with bayonet over the last few yards, which will finally drive the foe from his trenches.
