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A GERMAN MOVE IN HOLLAND

A bargain that was concluded before the war began is of interest now as showing Germany's commercial expansion toward the North Sea which England hopes to check.

The Government has taken a decision which, in my opinion, will prove to be the most important and its consequences more far-reaching than any action taken by the general authority for such a time.

It has granted the Vulkan company in other words, to Mr. Thyssen, for the two names are practically synonymous—license to establish a private harbor on the New Waterway at Visardburg.

From this and from the fact that the New Waterway is one of the most important outlets to the sea on the whole continent of Europe, it will be seen that this development is of great importance.

Rather more than two years ago Mr. Thyssen made strenuous efforts to obtain an independent position on the Waterway.

It was at once felt by far-seeing men in Holland that there might be ultimate danger to Dutch neutrality in the judgment of an undertaking of the kind within two or three miles of Rotterdam.

The Dutch Government had one simple means of retaining the whole proposal. Thyssen were free to buy any land behind the water, but that happened to be in the water, but the few feet of ground he immediately above the high-water mark are the property of the Dutch Government.

Late Frosts on Mindoko Project and Hurt Ovens as Causes.

The wheat crop on the Mindoko project as well as throughout Cassia county is falling short of expectations this year. Fields which had been estimated at 40 to 50 bushels per acre, are turning out from 20 to 25 bushels.

The shortage of dry farms is attributed to the late frosts and exceptionally dry summer, while on irrigated lands, rye and small have had a bad effect. Late planting also plays an important part in keeping the grain yield in the section down to a profitless minimum. In view of the high prices being paid for wheat, this shortage is being pointed out in the extreme. Furthermore, many farmers had planned on feeding large numbers of hogs, and now find those hogs short on straw.—Barley Bulletin.

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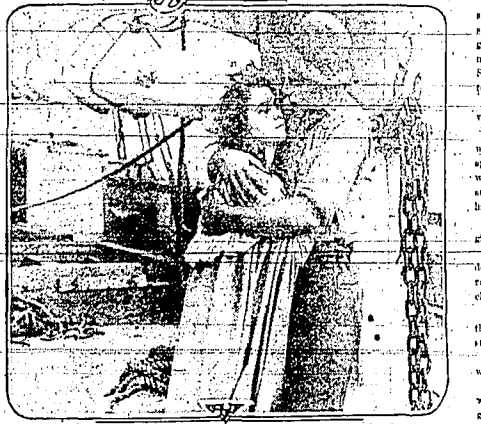

CANCELLATION OF JOINT RATE
State Commission Appeals to Interstate Commerce Commission for Reversal.
The Interstate Commerce Commission has been requested by the public utility commission of this state to cancel the new joint tariff passenger rates known as the Montana Pacific tariff rates as they may apply to the state of Idaho for the tariff which goes into effect on October 1, would be the cost of passenger tickets via the Denver & Rio Grande, and the points in the state north and south, forcing passengers to be routed through to any of these points via the Union Pacific. The public utility commission proposes to make investigation into the right of the tariff point into effect.
That this tariff is the result of a new between the Union Pacific and Missouri Pacific closed the Kansas City line on west bound traffic. It is now claimed the Union Pacific is retaining the rates of the Denver & Rio Grande. While the new tariff does not prohibit the purchasing of tickets via the Short, in any point on the Denver & Rio Grande, it does make it impossible to route passengers on through rates over this road.
When the October tariff came into possession of the public utility commission an investigation was immediately started. The result in a decision has been reached to file the Interstate Commerce commission to cancel the proposed tariff. (Capital News)

WORKING A CIRCULAR FIELD

Flow That, Once Started, Will Do the Work Without Any aid at Steering Gear.

One of the latest innovations in farming implements is a gasoline-driven vehicle that guides itself around the field and needs no attention except to be started and stopped at the right points.

This vehicle, which travels in a constantly narrowing circle, is so designed that any of the devices used in power farming, such as plows, rippers, cultivators or sprayers, may be readily attached to it, but in order to use the implement, it is necessary to abandon the usual rectangular form of field, with straight rows and adopt a circular field with circular rows spiraling toward the center.

The method is not adapted to big farms, but is intended for truck gardening and for farming on a small scale where the expense of employing an operator for the machine would be prohibitive.

At the center of the field an iron post is erected and strongly guyed. At the top of the post is a drum, and from this a slender steel wire runs through a guide pulley and to the steering gear of the implement, which may be anywhere from twenty feet to several hundred feet away.

At each trip of the vehicle around the field the wire winds once around the drum, and this guides the implement, the width of one furrow closer to the center. This process is continued until the implement comes as close to the center as the guy wires will permit.

The drum is then released so that it will revolve freely and the implement is driven in the field under hand steering, unwinding the wire as it goes.

The implement has already been used successfully in working a circular field containing about seven acres. —Popular Mechanics.

FINE SOUTH AMERICAN FRUITS

In Argentina the Grape Has Been Developed—Chilcan Apples Rank With the Best.

In Argentina the grape is the fruit which has attained the greatest commercial importance, and the Mendoza country seems to lead all other sections. The net profit from vines in good bearing condition is said to be about \$170 per acre. In 1910 the production of vines was 92,674,000 gallons; valued at more than \$25,000,000. Leaving Mendoza and passing over the barren heights of the Andes at an altitude of more than 10,000 feet the traveler arrives in Chile. One seems to have reached another California. There are many similarities, and all of the fruits grown in California are produced in Chile, probably in equal perfection, but with far less care, and the industry has not developed as in North America. The grape industry is a large one, and a good quality is produced, most of which is consumed at home. The apple grown in Chile is said to rank with the finest in the world.

Fear of the Automobile.
Child training, especially when it runs counter to the impulse of freedom, is a difficult work. But one of the first things the child learns is fear of death. One mother makes a careful practice of reading to her two small children every newspaper account of the death of a child under an automobile. She leaves out any horrible details of the accident, which might injure the child's sensibilities, but she impresses the event on the child's mind by giving the name of the unfortunate victim, his age and as nearly as possible the location of the accident.

Both mother and school teacher may impress on the child mind the dangers of the streets and cite daily examples of the result of child carelessness. It is one of the best means by which the youngsters may be convinced of the need for exercising caution.

The killing of children under the wheels of automobiles has started with the coming of summer, and more each day. Here are a few of the children, informed of the manner of each accident.

Milk-Fed Dances Are Lazy.

MINERAL CONTENT OF APPLES

Idaho Experiment Station, Finds Ash Amounts to 2 to 35 Per Cent of Fresh Mature Fruit.

Fruits of all kinds that grow on plants which receive the largest portion of their food supply through the soil always contain a rather large amount of mineral substances.

In the apple, for instance, it has been found by work carried on in the department of agricultural chemistry of the Idaho station that the ash amounts from 2 to 35 per cent of the fresh mature fruit. This total ash is obtained by drying a suitable quantity (the quartered apples at a degree of about forty degrees C.) for several days and then burning it in an electrical furnace at a dull red heat until practically all the carbon is consumed. The total amount apparently does not vary to any great extent with varieties or with irrigation or non-irrigation.

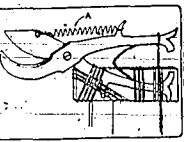
When this ash, which from the majority of varieties is perfectly white, is further subjected to analyses, the following are the most important elements found: Silicon, iron, aluminum, phosphorus, manganese, calcium, magnesium, potassium, chlorine and sulfur.

Although no one has been able to determine the exact function of these various elements in plants and fruits, it is generally believed that sulphur and phosphorus enter into the living substance; that potassium, magnesium, calcium and iron, although not entering into the living substance, are essential, but owing to the fact that they are so widely distributed in the soil are absorbed by the root hairs of the tree, and find their way to the fruit through the tree sap.

CLIPPER FOR PRUNING TREES

Device Ripped Up With Aid of Wood Arm on Long Handle and Mounted With Cord, Worked Well.

Having some high branches to prune and being without a clipper used for such work, a pair of ordinary hand

clippers was rigged up on a wood arm that was mounted on a long handle, with James M. Kane of Boylston, Pa., in Popular Mechanics. One hand of the clipper was fastened to the arm and a heavy cord attached to the other. An auxiliary spring, A, kept the lower jaw from sticking.

GOOD TREE PRUNING POINTS

Object Should Be to Preserve Symmetrical, Well-Balanced Top, Open in the Center.

There can be no trifold rules laid down relative to the pruning of a tree. No two trees are exactly alike, and each one must be treated individually. The object should be to preserve a symmetrical, well-balanced top, open in the center, without crowding the branches in any part.

All branches which grow toward the center of the tree, and those which cross or interfere with each other, should be removed. A one-toothed pruning saw is best for this purpose and the cuts should be made smoothly and close to the body or main branch of the tree from which the superfluous branch is pruned.

There is usually a little ring or enlargement at the base of each branch; the saw cut should be made ordinary and downward through this enlargement.

SELECTING TREES TO PLANT

Deal Direct With Nurserymen Rather Than Through Agents in Ordering Stock for Orchard.

Phil J. G. Moore, Wisconsin agricultural college, believes that the trees used in planting the orchard do with future success or failure. "Thousands of inferior trees are being planted each year," says Prof. Moore. "The tree standard upon which to purchase is the size. The two-year-old tree is usually best for commercial planting, although one-year-olds are quite generally used."
"In ordering nursery stock deal direct with the nurseryman rather than through agents, unless you know them personally." State the kind of trees wanted, refuse substitutes and be willing to pay a good price for the right kind of trees. "Take good care of trees upon arrival, to insure healthy growth when they are planted."
