MEN SENTENCED FOR MULLROY MURDER

Irely Confesses to Premeditated Killing

COMPANION SAID TO HAVE OCCUPIED MINOR ROLE

Drausen Debach Baals Two Lives and Spouts Out a Third on Blue Lakes Grade.

Louis Irely and Carl Jacobs, who have been held in the county jail at Shoshone, Idaho, were arraigned for the murder of Michael Mullroy, who occurred on the Blue Lakes grade, were brought before Judge C. O. Stockler.

In the district court in Shoshone on Thursday and pleaded guilty to killing Mullroy. The judge accepted their guilty plea and sentenced Carl Jacobs to ten years for his accomplices. Irely, in his confession stated that he had planned the murder and that Jacobs assisted in the job. He also said that they were all drunk at the time.

Ayer Irely, and his son, Carl, denied the charge that they way to where they were arrested while walking along the railroad track. Mullroy was known in this city having worked here for some time. The two criminals had also sought refuge in the city before going to Jerome. They were en route when Jerome was committed.

WILL SUPPORT BRIDGE MEASURE

N. P. Guthrie Favors State and Federal Aid for Hansen Bridge.

Attorney W. P. Guthrie is enthusiastic over the proposed plan to build a bridge over the Snake river between the two rim rock bridges near Hansen and Mustard and submitted to the Times that he would, if elected to the state senate, do all in his power to get the state to make such appropriation.

The trial will be held at Irby and ended nine days. Interest was intense and the courtroom was crowded, at every session. Judge Walters presided for the disqualification of Judge Grinnell.

Askev will be sentenced Monday.

ONE CONVICTED TWO ACQUITTED

Irby Was Found Guilty of Voluntary Manslaughter.

Idaho Falls—George Askev, guilty of voluntary manslaughter, Mary A. Parks and Albertson of the jury agreed Saturday afternoon that George Askev, his daughter, Mary A. Parks, and his son, Albert W. Askev, charged with conspiracy to murder George T. Parks, a well-known attorney and husband of Mary A. Parks.

Parks and his wife had separated, the latter going to her father's home. She filed suit for divorce, but that was denied.

On March 22 she went to the parks home to secure her personal belongings. There found some people moving in. Mrs. Parks forbade them the place, but her husband came up and told the people to move. A scuffle between the husband and the visitors followed, during which Mrs. Parks was driven back to the Parks home that afternoon, her father and brother accompanying her. Trouble started and Parks was shot through the heart and died.

The contention of the state was that the three entered into conspiracy to kill Parks, the motive being to secure property.

George Askev, testifying in his own behalf, claimed he had no knowledge of what had taken place in the house, Mrs. Parks and her husband went into a room while he and his son stayed in the kitchen. Hearing a struggle in the room, he entered and found his wife and son fighting. The older brother had a pistol, when the latter drew a pistol from the bed and fired at him, the woman knocking the gun to one side, the shot going wild. The woman and her husband then climbed for powder out of the gun. Parks then pointed the gun at Askev, who fired at him, the bullet hitting the wall.

They were on their way to Jerome to Twin Falls when the crime was committed.

Albert Askev corroborated his father's story in part, testifying that he did not enter the room until after his mother and son had left. Mrs. Parks did not testify.

CLUBMEN PLAN PROGRAM

The bridge, which will bring a great deal of trade to that city and to Kimberly, is one of the most feasible and least expensive projects of its kind ever attempted.

Mr. Guthrie, as a member of the senate will have greater opportunity to obtain such measure as a less road will be known in the state than in the rest of the country.

He is anxious to this end, and is now attempting to obtain an appro-

priation.

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WONDERFUL ESCAPE FROM DISASTER

Young Girl Hit By Passenger Train Saturday

THROWN BY A HUNDRED THIRTEEN FEET BY COLLISION

ATA KIDS MIRACULOUSLY ESCAPE WITH ONLY SLIGHT INJURIES, NEAR KIMBERLY.

Atta King, a fourteen year old girl, was thrown by a passenger train which was brought to the Twin Falls hospital Saturday afternoon by the Short Line passenger train which had struck the buggy, containing her and smashed it to kindling.

The only injuries suffered by the girl were several slight bruises on her hip and shoulder.

According to the accounts of the accident, the noon west bound passenger train was running at a high speed to make up time and struck the young girl at a crossing two minutes earlier.

The driver of the buggy was picked up unscathed a distance of one hundred thirteen feet from the crossing, as great was the impact of the collision, while the buggy was wholly and so finely scattered that the driver and passenger, who was in the right portion of the vehicle, found.

The horse had crossed and the collision cut away the ribs without injury to the animal.

The little girl on being interviewed by the doctor, became unconscious again, but was quickly resuscitated, the doctor taking a resuscitation set of forceps to help her.

Her parents were not present,

so the doctor sent word to the station.

The girl was taken to the hospital where she was given oxygen and a resuscitation set of forceps.

The doctor said the girl had recovered fully and was soon walking again.

Atta King is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Kimball, of Kimberly.

It appears that the girl was walking home alone when she was hit by the train.

She was taken to the hospital by the driver of the buggy, who was driving to the schoolhouse.

After the accident, the man who had driven the buggy, said he had been driving home from the schoolhouse when he saw the girl.

He stopped and helped the girl to the schoolhouse, where he was met by the driver of the buggy.

SENATOR GOODING FOR BRADY

Former State Senator Fred W. Good- ington of Shoshone urges upon the thinking people of Idaho the vital importance of returning Senator Brady to Congress—in a recent interview he said:

"I want to emphasize the importance of electing Senator Brady and our candidate for congress. The tariff question is not dead. The logic of the position of the Republican party upon this issue has been materially accentuated by Democratic legislation. The so-called 'war tax' is not a war tax but a Democratic deficit tax. It would have been necessary had there been no war. The duty has been taken off of what the farmer has to sell, but has been left upon him what he had to buy. The reduction of the tariff has been upon the finished products and not upon the raw materials of the country."

When we recall that we are the producers of raw material, the beneficial effect upon the west can easily be realized.

"Some of the Democratic leaders are putting up the argument that Governor Hawley should be elected because he would be in touch with the national Democratic administration and could accomplish more for the state. This is a mistaken idea. The Democratic party, in my opinion, is doomed for defeat two years from now, and it behoves Idaho to look to her for leadership. Then even were Governor Hawley elected, he would probably do a disreputable squalor from the west, having done the whip hand, he has been left without the "yellow" influence given by Mrs. Hawley."

If he did not get with the administration, Senator Brady should be elected. He stands for the policies of the execution of which are to the interest of the state. He will be in harmony with the party which will be in supreme two years from now, and can do more for his people than any Democrat could possibly do. He has won the fight. The majority of the people of the state have decided that he was the best man for senator and are for him. His ideas upon the tariff question are sound and in harmony with the party which has once made prosperous times for American farmers and American laborers."
