WASHINGTON - After months of work on the part of the federal reserve board and preparation by the banks which will be members of the new system, the twelve regional banks opened their doors, to business Monday.

Operations Limited Now.

For the present the operations of the banks will be limited largely to the rediscounting of notes, drafts and bills of exchange, but as experience is gained, steps will be taken to have them exercise their other functions under the currency act.

Officials here will watch the progress of the system with interest.

ENOUGH FOR ENTIRE ARMY

Horticultural Inspector Compiles Interesting Figures on Prune Crop.

Idaho has furnished this year enough Italian prunes to feed the entire standing army of the United States for five years.

This statement was made by H. P. Ashby, deputy state horticulturist, who has been making an investigation of the prune crop this year.

According to the figures which Mr. Ashby has made, each soldier would receive 5.87 pounds of prunes, 4.25 pounds of carbohydrates, and ample laxative properties to keep the military machine in a sturdy healthy condition.

In order that the Italian prune may be enjoyed by our eastern friends, he said, they must get into the transportation company's vault the sum of one hundred and eighty thousand dollars. The timber cruiser collects a toll of forty-eight thousand dollars in boxes, the paper mills call for eighteen hundred dollars and the steel trust for one thousand, nine hundred and fifty dollars for nails. After the man has punched the ticket for thirty-eight thousand dollars for refrigeration, the Idaho grower will remain up in the background, wasting a fine crop of two hundred and ninety thousand, two hundred and fifty dollars, his share in the net profits as a reward for a forlorn hope.

Two thousand acres of bearing prune orchards in Idaho produced six hundred cars of prunes from this year about 10 cars of dried prunes remain yet on hand. This represents about 40 per cent of a full crop, with about one-half of the total acreage in bearing. The average yield per acre this year was low, owing to freezes in the early spring. The prune orchards situated in favorable localities yielded as high as a car per acre.

"One orchard on the high west of Idaho, consisting of two and one-half acres, produced a crop which sold for fourteen hundred dollars; another two and a half acre orchard produced 7572 pounds which sold for \$1125.00. An orchard near Meridian, consisting of 15 acres, produced 392 tons, which sold for \$117,000.

"These high yields are due not only to favorable locations, but also to the method employed in operating the orchards. It has been found that flood-irrigation during the freeze period in early spring helps to insure the crop against frost. The method employed in putting the trees in con-

ENOUGH FOR ENTIRE ARMY

Horizontal Inspector Compiles Interesting Figures on Prune Crop.

Idaho has furnished this year enough Italian prunes to feed the entire standing army of the United States for five years. This statement was made by H. P. Ashby, deputy state horticulturist, who has been making an investigation of the crop this year. According to the figures which Mr. Ashby has made, each soldier would receive 58.17 pounds of prunes, 13.64 pounds of carbohydrates, and amplexative properties to keep the military machine in a sturdy healthy condition.

"In order that the Italian prunes may be enjoyed by our eastern friends," he said, "they must pay into the transportation company's vault the sum of one hundred and sixty thousand dollars. The lumber cruiser collects a toll of forty-eight thousand dollars for boxes, the paper mills call for eighteen hundred dollars and the steel trust for one thousand, nine hundred and fifty dollars for nails. After the iron man has punched the ticket for thirty thousand dollars and the steel trust for one thousand, two hundred and fifty dollars, his share in the net profits as a reward for a fortiori hope.

Two thousand acres of bearing prune orchards in Idaho produced six hundred cars of green fruit this year about 10 cars of dried prunes remain on hand. This represents about 40 per cent of a full crop, with about one-half of the total acreage in bearing. The average yield per acre this year was low, owing to frosts in the early spring. The prunes orchards situated in favorable localities yielded as high as a car per acre.

One orchard on the bench west of Idaho, consisting of two and one-half acres, produced a crop which sold for fourteen hundred dollars, another two and a half-acre orchard produced 15,472 pounds which sold for \$115.00. An orchard near Meridian, consisting of 15 acres, produced 19 1/2 cars, which sold for \$11,700.

"These high yields are due not only to favorable locations, but also to the method employed in operating the orchards. It has been found that flooding the orchard during the freeze period in early spring helps to insure the crop against frost. The method employed in putting the trees in condition

REPUBLICANS HAVE MAJORITY

Returns Show That Party Have 18 Senators and 31 Members of House.

Verification of the statement made in the Capital News a week ago that the Republicans have control of the next legislature was secured yesterday on a check with the secretary of state's office showing that there are 18 Republicans in the senate and 31 Republican representatives in the house, of a clear majority in both branches of the legislature. It is not now believed these figures will be changed. Owing to the fact that there is a far more representative in Idaho county which the state board of canvassers will be called upon to decide, the entire possibility for the Republicans to gain one more vote as well as for the Democrats, but it will make no difference in the majority. The narrow margin of control in the house, however, is sufficient to give the organization in the legislature which controls the committee and the speaker as well as to add interest to party measures presented to that body.

New Majority Members. There are 61 members entitled to seats in the house of representatives. While the apportionment was not changed at the last session, two new counties were carved out of old Lincoln county, which before had but two representatives. Each of these two counties, together with the old county, is entitled to a representative which accounts for the extra member. Instead of being three members in the house when the legislature meets again, as there was last session, there will be 61 members. Of this number the Democrats have 24 and the Progressives one. If the vote for representatives in Idaho county is decided for the Democrats and their number is scaled that party will have 25 members. It was thought at one time that should the tie be decided in favor of the Democrats and the one Progressive member vote with that party, it could be voted for by a majority of 50 to 11 in the house. Instead of 61 which places the control with the Republicans.

In the senate the Republicans have 18 senators, a sufficient number to control. The Democrats have 12, the Progressives two and the Socialists one, making a total of 22. Control of the Democrats, Progressives and Socialists have fifteen votes to 18 for the Republicans.

ENOUGH FOR ENTIRE ARMY

Horticultural Inspector Compiles Interesting Figures on Truce Crop

Idaho has furnished this year enough Italian prunes to feed the entire standing army of the United States for five years. This statement was made by H. P. Ashby, deputy state horticultural inspector, who has been making an investigation of the truce crop. According to the figures which Mr. Ashby has made, each soldier would receive 547 prunes from this year's crop. The prunes are 2.55 pounds of carbohydrates, and a nutritive properties to keep the military machine in a sturdy healthy condition.

"In order that the Italian prunes may be enjoyed by our eastern friends," he said, "they must pay into the transportation company's vault the sum of one hundred and eighty thousand dollars. The timber cruiser collects a toll of forty-eight thousand dollars for boxes, the paper mills rack for eighteen hundred dollars and the steel trust for one thousand, nine hundred and fifty dollars for nails. After all these levies have been paid the truce crop for thirty-eight thousand dollars for refrigeration. The Idaho prunes still look up in the background, waving a flag of truce for two hundred and ninety thousand, two hundred and fifty dollars. His share in the profits as a reward for a forlorn hope.

Two thousand acres of bearing prune orchards in Idaho produced six hundred cars of stone fruit this year, about 10 cars of dried prunes remained on hand. This represents about 40 per cent of a full crop, with about one-half of the total acreage in bearing. The average yield per acre this year was low, owing to freezes in the early spring. The orchards were planted in favorable localities, and as high as a car per acre.

One orchard on the bench west of Holes, consisting of two and one-fifth acres, produced it crop which sold for fourteen hundred dollars; another two and a half acre orchard produced 15,672 pounds which sold for \$1125.83. An orchard near Meridian, consisting of 15 acres, produced 19 1/2 cars, which sold for \$11,750. These high yields are due not only to favorable locations, but also to the method employed in operating the orchards. It has been found that by heading the orchard during the freeze period in early spring helps to insure the crop against frost. This method entails cutting the trees in contact with the ground for wintering also has the effect upon the making of the next year's crop.

Mr. Ashby also gave the following interesting suggestion on the care of orchards during the winter months: "The most important thing to do is to keep the wood around a central pile, each year a new layer is added. A layer of bark, also made annually, covers the wood. Next to the bark is a layer of wood, a delicate layer of living tissue called cambium, the cambium is the life of the tree; expose it to the air and the subsequent loss of its moisture for evaporation means the death of the cambium. The cells of the cambium are plump little rounded protoplasmic semi-fluid in consistency in the growing season.

"The damage in winter consists largely in rough drying of the cambium, due to the fact that, while evaporation still goes on during the winter, the tree can not take up moisture from the frozen soil to make good this evaporation, the cambium therefore becomes so thoroughly dried out during cold weather that the tissues are killed.

"A cover crop will tend to hold what snow falls and will to a marked degree, prevent deep freezing of the soil. "While the wood of the tree should be well opened before cold weather sets in, it is also a poor practice to allow the tree to dry out in the sun, in fact a poor irrigation should be practical.

"When the ground which is used, ground care should be given to keep from piling up around the trees and thereby providing a home for mice." Statesman.
