NEW AUTO FUEL MAKING GOOD

McKeesport Man Has Substitute for Gasoline at Two Cents a Gallon

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 19. — John Andrus, a McKeesport, Pa., chemist has invented a new fuel for automobiles. The fuel which is called Zolzin is expected to revolutionize the production of automobile power. Mr. Andrus is now conducting a test of the fuel at the Indianapolis Speedway under direction of its management, where a 100-mile run is in progress. The stock car began the grind today and made an average of about 50 miles an hour, completing the first lap of the run. The remainder will be run tomorrow.

The test is not for speed, but to learn the lasting qualities of the fuel and whether the chemicals will be harmful to engine.

The test is being made with a view of manufacturing the fuel at once if it is proved satisfactory.

Tomorrow night the second day's run the engine of the car will be taken down to learn whether there are any injurious effects from the chemicals. The test today was highly satisfactory.

The new fuel which consists of nine-tenths rain water mixed with a chemical solution is said to cost less than 2 cents a gallon.

The fuel was mixed at the pits under observation of the American Automobile Association officials and the actual running time for the 50-mile trial was nine hours, 25 minutes and 32.810 seconds.

Those in charge of the test today declared that the better results would be obtained tomorrow if weather conditions were more favorable. It is expected that Zolzin will make a run for fuel that gasoline.

John Andrus of McKeesport, Pa., the inventor, recently was paid \$20,000 by the government for big discovery of a method of torching armor plate. Among others interested in the new product are: Carl G. Fisher, president of the Ford company; A. C. Newberry, of the National; Howard C. Marmon, of the Nordyke & Marmon company. — Indianapolis Gazette Times.

MARRIED MEN LIVE LONG

Statistical Expert Has Proved That Husbands Are Better Blisks Than Bachelors.

Dr. Hans Curdick, the German statistical expert, has discovered a new "barrier" between men and women. After studying the statistics of deaths and marriages he declares: "It men want to enjoy long life, they should marry; if women want to grow to a good old age they should remain spinsters."

He admits that his conclusions can be established with greater certainty when the city of London published its proposed statistical tables of widows; widowers, divorced persons and persons who secured aquaratus at various ages, but he says that tables already available show that married women die sooner than the unmarried, whereas married men live longer.

Statistics show that the fatal age for all males, married and unmarried, is about forty-four, whereas for the married men it lies between fifty-five and sixty.

The fatal age for all women is about fifty, ten years more for unmarried widows, and nearly ten years less for married.

Thus, if Doctor Curdick's statistics are to be believed, the woman who remains single may expect 20 years more of life than her married sister.

Marriages dissolved by the death of the wife, but in an average ten to fifteen years, those dissolved by the husband's death usually last 20 to 25 years.

According to this the number of spinsters in the average community is always considerably in excess of the number of widows. This is only one of the interesting questions which will be answered by the elaborate statistics now being collected in Berlin.

HAS A BACKBONE OF STEEL

Broken Vertebrae of Man's Spinal Column Replaced in Most Unusual Operation.

As a result of one of the most remarkable surgical operations, Frank Harrington, aged fifty-nine, of Vernal, near Jilghampton, N. Y., will hereafter be known as a man with a steel backbone. A steel rod, joined to his spine, has been inserted into the vertebrae of the spinal column, replacing 20 of the vertebrae, which were crushed by a fall from a scaffold.

Several weeks ago Harrington tripped and fell from a landing on his back. It was found that the lower and middle portions of the spinal column had been crushed and the resulting pressure on the spinal cord had paralyzed his legs. It was believed that he would be unable to survive, but he was taken to the hospital. Drs. C. S. Wilson, W. H. Wilson and H. O. Crozier finally decided upon an operation in an effort to save his life.

As a preliminary the surgeons removed the pieces of the 20 crushed vertebrae, then took a careful measurement of the portion of the spine remaining. They ordered a rod, two and a half inches long, shaped like the spine, with flexible joints, to correspond, extreme care being taken that every nerve branching from the spinal cord should be in its proper place. Harrington was placed in a plaster cast. He has improved so much that he is now able to move his legs in the bed and the surgeons believe that he will entirely recover and be able to walk as well as ever.

Not Fated to Commit Suicide.

The tragic intentions of a married couple named Bill have caused some amusement to the townfolk of Harris, Idaho. By the way, the couple's repeated attempts to commit suicide. M. Bill started by trying to hang himself in the cellar, but the rope was not strong enough to carry out his wishes, and, safely, if suddenly, he was deposited back on the floor. Mrs. Bill, deeply affected by her husband's act, in despair proceeded to do likewise, with a similar result. The couple then tried suffocation by gas, but when realizing the mistake stopped the supply, fortunately, but unwittingly, preventing the tragedy. Undamaged at this new failure, and as though "never say die" was her motto, Mrs. Bill then herself down to the creek well. M. Bill followed. They expected to drown, but there was barely three feet of water. After hoping against hope for several hours their whereabouts was discovered by neighbors, who promptly located them out of the well and back to wisdom. They have promised not to start again.

COLORADO TO TAKE CHARGE

C. S. Troops Will be Removed From Coal Fields.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 22.—Colorado is prepared to reassert its sovereignty in the coal mining districts which have been occupied by the federal troops for nearly seven months.

"We believe," says the communication, "that the start is now in a position to assert authority and we agree with you that you cannot in fairness to the president lend honor for federal aid, much as the army might be desired. You should therefore propose to accept for the people of this state the responsibility of again being a state."

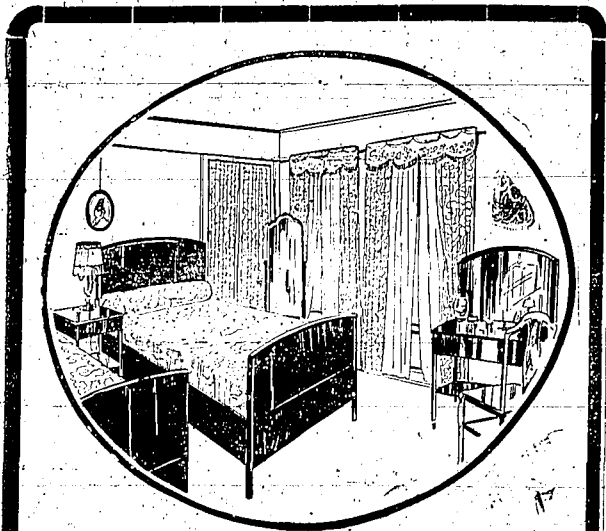

HEROISM OF LEMAN

Belgian General's Defense of Liege Told By German.

Finally blew Up Last of the Forts and Was Found by the Victors Unconscious Beneath Masses of Debris.

Rotterdam.—This is the story of the fall of Liege in the simple, graphic language of a German officer. It was told to a Dutch reporter.

General Lemans's defense of Liege combined all that is noble and all that is tragic. The commander of one fort at the moment when the bombardment was at its heaviest, went mad and shot his own men. He was disarmed and bound.

The cupola of another fort was destroyed by bombs dropped from a Zeppelin. The officer who was swept away like sand castles on the sea-shore before the relentless waves of our eleven-hundred siege guns.

As long as was possible General Lemans respected the fort daily to see that everything was in order. The general's legs were crushed by a huge pile of falling masonry dislodged by our guns. Undaunted, Lemans visited the forts in an automobile.

Fort Chateaufrontale was destroyed by a German shell dropping in the magazine. At Louchy, one of the strongest of the Belgian defenses, the soldiers were shot down and he himself helped to man the guns. For some time, with a mere handful of men, he held out, but nothing could have stood against the tide of shells from our guns.

When the end was inevitable the Belgians disabled the last three guns and exploded a supply of shells kept in readiness. Before the general's men destroyed all plans, maps and papers relating to the defenses.

Hidden beneath the debris and planned beneath a massive beam we found General Lemans. "Great is General's merit," said a wounded aide-de-camp.

With a gentleness and care which showed our respect for the man who had related us so valiantly and stubbornly, our infantrymen removed the general's limp form and carried him away. We thought him dead, but he recovered consciousness, and looking around, said:

"It is as it is. The men fought well. Then turning to us he added: "Put in your dispatches that I was unconscious."

We brought him to our commander, General von Emsch, and the two generals saluted. "We tried to speak words of comfort, but he was silent. He is known as the silent general."

He was unconscious. He said to put that in your dispatches," he said, and "now he would not speak."

Extending his hand, our commander said: "General, you have fought gallantly and nobly held your fort."

General Lemans replied, "I thank you; our troops lived up to their reputations."

With a smile he added, "War is not like mathematics."

He had reference to the fact that General von Emsch, was recently with General Leman during the Belgian maneuvers. Then, doubting the "war," General Lemans "thundered" at General von Emsch.

"No," replied the German commander with a bow. "Keep your sword." To have great swordsmen with you has been an honor. And the first General Lemans's eyes was dimmed by a tear.
