WANT TO UNLOAD SALEM TRACT Bondholders Ask State to Release Contract.

CLAIM WATER SHORTAGE WOULD
NOT BE CONSIDERED

Settlers of Salmon River Tract Will
Vigorously Protest Against Most of
Company.

To determine whether the Twin Falls-Salmon River Land and Water company has complied with the contract, however, that company and the state of Idaho, which contract was entered into April 1, 1912, and provided for the construction of so-called Salmon River irrigation system, the land board at a meeting November 28th issued an order directing the state engineer to examine the project and to report to the board not later than December 15th. 


