ATTACKS ATTORNEYS

Official of Salmon Water Company After Legal Advisers.

In a statement issued late this week G. M. Hall, general manager of the Land and Water company, scores the advice the settlers have received from their attorneys with respect to prosecuting the proof the company recently submitted on completion of works for the diversion of 1000 second feet from the Salmon River, and accuses them with the desire of doing nothing but stir up trouble.

These sweeping charges arise from the filing of over a hundred affidavits by farmers and land owners on the tract, pointing to the fact that the works are not complete for the reason that there are excessive losses in the reservoir, check basin and main canals, that the canals have not sufficient carrying capacity for the 122,000 acres mentioned in the company's proof, and that they should not be regarded as complete when the supply of water is totally inadequate for the irrigation of the amount of land in a petition to the state engineer.

the settlers further request that the state ascertain by actual tests whether the system was capable of diverting that amount of water.

Mr. Hall insists that the settlers should have waived any protests in this matter, claiming that such protests in the matter, if instrumental in having the state engineer reject the company's proof, would jeopardize the company's case against the Utah Construction company, wherein the company seeks to prevent the people of the Upper Salmon from diverting water for the irrigation of their project. In this manner, Mr. Hall intimates, the settlers have been striking at their own best interests, his statement carrying with it the idea that the settlers are merely assisting the Utah Construction company to deprive them of their water.

The legal advisers will be interested to know, in this connection, that prior to the making public of Mr. Hall's statement, C. O. Longley, leading counsel for the settlers' association, conferred with the officer in charge of the state engineer's office in regard to this very matter. He later in talk with this gentleman, Mr. Longley, advised The Herald Thursday.

"It gave the state engineer's office the assurance that we did not want, by our protest, to raise any question as to the priority of the water right, that we simply desired to have the engineer for the state make such an investigation of the works of diversion that would satisfy that official, rather enable him to make an intelligent report to the Land Board upon the facts. He indicated that under the circumstances he would not require the company to turn 1000 second feet of water into the system, but that he would make a thorough investigation of the reservoir, canals and especially the check basin, limiting his report to such work and not including any report upon the capacity of the system to convey the water claimed in the petition. This is all we can desire under the circumstances.

Mr. Hall's comment on the action of the settlers follows: "That the people under an irrigation project would make such an action in unusual and it is not probable that the settlers on the Salmon tract intended to do so, or that they understood that the affidavits signed by them would be used in such a manner or that such would be their effect."

"It can hardly be considered probable that those who procured the affidavits are in the employ of the Twin Falls company who have filings on numerous crops of the Utah Construction company, who have filings on the Upper Salmon river in Nevada, both of whom are trying to establish rights against the filings made by me on the Salmon project.

"This is an extreme view. However, it can be fairly said that there are some settlers on this project who in their own course of opposition to everything done or proposed by the Water company, would not stop at injuring their neighbors or themselves, if by so doing they thought the company might be injured.

"It really looks as if the people on the tract who desire to have made their homes, who desire to see the community prosper and who wish to see a settlement of cooperatives, as to the water supply, should see to it that they are not misled by bad advisers, who are not working to accomplish anything, but the stirring up of trouble.

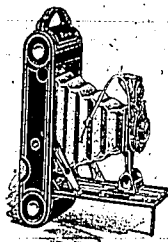
"That the very large majority of settlers were misinformed when they signed these affidavits, there can be no doubt.

"The conditions were favorable for such a trick to be turned for the purpose of having the Land Board, that the state land board had directed the state engineer to make an examination of the Salmon system and report if the works were constructed in accordance with the contract with the Water company, making settlers to call to the attention of the state engineer, anything which should be done to complete the construction work.
