ATTACKS ATTORNEYS

Offices of Salmon Water Company
After Legal Advisors.

In a statement issued late this week G. M. Hall, general manager of the Land and Water company, scores the advice the settlers have received from their attorneys with respect to protection of their water rights, recently submitted on completion of works for the diversion of 1000 second feet from the Salmon River, and accuse them with the desire of doing nothing but to tip the scales in their favor.

These legal expenses charges arise from the filing of over a hundred affidavits by farmers and land owners on the part, testifying to the fact that the works are not complete for the diversion of 1000 second feet, and that there are no losses to the reservoir, check basin and main canals, that the canals have not sufficient carrying capacity for the 132,000 acres mentioned. In the company's present opinion, these affidavits be regarded as complete when the supply of water is totally inadequate for the irrigation of the amount of land in a petition to the state engineer.

The settlers further request that the state ascertain by actual tests whether the system was capable of diverting that amount of water.

Mr. Hall insists that the settlers should have waived any protest in this matter. If instructed to having the state engineer reject the company's protest, would jeopardize the company's case against the Utah Construction company, wherein the company seek to have the court rule that the Upper Salmon from diverting water for the irrigation of their project. In this manner, Mr. Hall intimates, the settlers have been striking at their own interests, and his statement concerning with it the idea that the settlers are merely assisting the Utah Construction company to deprive them of their water.

"It is true," states the state engineer's office, "that we did not want, by our protests, to raise any question as to the priority of the water right, that we simply desired to have the engineers in charge of the construction work do what they could to see that the water was diverted so that it would satisfy that official or rather enable him to make an intelligent report to the Land Board upon the facts. He indicated that under the circumstances he would make no report to the company to turn 1000 second feet of water into the system, but that he would make a thorough investigation of the reservoir, canals and especially the check basin, and his report would be based upon the capacity of the system to convey the water claimed in the notice. This is all we can desire under the circumstances."

At a recent conference on the action of the settlers follows:

"That the people under an irrigation project would take such an action is unusual and it is not probable that the settlers on the Salmon river intend to do so, but if they do, then it is understood that the affidavits signed by them would be used in such a manner that such would be their effect.

"It can hardly be considered probable that the settlers who present these affidavits are in the employ of the Twin Falls company, who have filings on Sheepskin creek or of the Utah Construction company, who have filings on the Upper Salmon river in Nevada, both of whom are trying to establish rights against the filings made by use on the Salmon project."

This is really an extreme view. However, it can not be denied that there are some settlers on this project who in their course of action have done something done which is expected by the Water company, would not stop at injuring their neighbors or themselves, if so doing they thought the company might be injured.

It really looks as if the people on the Salmon river to have made their bones, who desire to see the community prosper and who wish to see a settlement of controversies as to the water supply, should see to it that they are not misled, led into false ways, who are inclined to accomplish anything, but the stirring up of trouble.

That the very large majority of settlers were uninformed when they signed these affidavits, can be easily believed.

The conditions were favorable for such a trick to be turned for the reason that notice had been given that the state land board had directed the state engineer to make an examination of the Salmon system, and that if the works were constructed in accordance with the contract with the Water company, asking settlers to call to the attention of the state engineer, and to the state land board to complete the construction work.

"Proof under a water permit, and proof of completion of construction are two separate and distinct matters. One is a condition of the permit procedure to be defined by statute. Proof of completion under the statute contract goes to the land board and is a matter of contract."

though the water company, as long ago as 1908, made application for a diversion and the land board had directed the state engineer to make it and report, but for some reason was not done.

That the settlers' claim will result from the filing of these protest is not probable, as the law contemplated protests may only be made by interested parties having other water claims or permits but the same stream.

The settlers' claim is based further to S. E. Holden, formerly state engineer, that the water company obtained a certificate from the state during his administration of that office which is analogous to a patent granted the right of the latter company to against those of other claimants.

Another matter on which Mr. Hall is evidently disinterested, is in regard to his letter published in The Herald on Dec. 12, in which he states that at a meeting of the state board of land commissioners held on November 28th, an order was made directing the state engineer to examine the Salmon River project for the purpose of determining the amount of water construction work called for under the contract with the state has been done; it being understood that the question of water supply is not involved in this examination.

Upon inquiry N. J. Jenness, register of the land board, advises that there is no minute entry of any such action and that as far as he is advised, no member of the board authorized the publication of the Herald letter or that the board, individually or collectively had agreed that notice should be given along the lines of the Hall letter. Furthermore, he advised that in his opinion, the question involved until after the first of the year, and that all concerned would be given due notice by some affirmative act of the board prior to the time of such hearing.

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





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WILL APPOINT REFEREE

Company and Settlers' Attorneys Agree on Plan.

George Ulrich, of the federal court at Boise, indicated Thursday afternoon that the testimony upon the availability of water that he, water supply, and the duty of water, two of the important elements in the motion for injunction, will be taken at Twin Falls by a referee, C. O. Longley, for the settlers, preferred Friday, with H. L. Moore, attorney of the Land and Water company, and Richard and Henry, representing the landholders.

The hearing before Judge Ulrich will probably be deferred until early next week, giving the parties an opportunity to hear all testimony offered on those hotly contested points. The hearings in Twin Falls will commence directly after the hearing at Boise. It is expected that the referee, after hearing all the evidence, will be able to make any intelligent report on the condition of the construction work of the system at this time, they being of the opinion necessary to determine the defects, if any exist. Mr. Rodden pointed out as an illustration of this point that to examine the cause of the King River fire, when it was necessary to do so, he and his wife were unable to get a boat of their own, when as a matter of fact, they are entitled to one.

The officers for the water company are co-operating with the settlers in every manner possible, and are at the present time threatening to sue the settlers for damages for damage to the property of the company. One of the directions before the court on Friday will be the entry of a court order which would have the effect of stopping the suit between the settlers and the water company.

The officers for the water company, however, have been instructed by Mr. Leesley that "everything possible will be done to reach a speedy settlement of the case."

An examination of the company's system is being conducted by Mr. Wiley, attorney of the state,

assisted by Joe Hyatt, a Twin Falls engineer. It is understood that they are to pass upon the construction work done by the company.

The settlers feel that any adjustment to be made and consequently were unable to arrange to have an engineer accompany the engineer's party. The evening before the party started on its journey to the west, Mr. Rodden, attorney of the settlers, advised the water company, advised the settlers' association that the water company would have no objection to a qualified man accompanying the party. Neither Mr. Wiley nor the engineer ever came to the party, thought it would be possible to make any intelligent report on the condition of the construction work of the system at this time, they being of the opinion necessary to determine the defects, if any exist.

Deputy Sheriff Bob Ogle made a trip to Burley, expecting to find there a check artist, who had been engaged for the individualized exhibition of checks, which in presentation proved no good, and was met with inquiries "on the part of the official in charge of the jail, Harry, who explained that he had the matter adjusted and that he had failed to return and that the Burley office had now lost all confidence in him."

The man who is known as Ed Bishop lives in the Burley section of the country and in company with George Blaine of the same neighborhood spent several days last week in Idaho Falls, having sold a few checks and smoking checks presenting checks signed by each other. That is to say, Bishop would present a check signed by Blaine, and Blaine would present a check signed by Bishop, doing it both ways. In several instances, they experienced some difficulty in having the checks cashed they presented on "down-town friends" to endorse them. The checks passed through the hands of a number of business men and were returned with the cruel notation that bankers have a habit of putting on checks that are not worth much. The return of the checks was due to the fact that the friends who had endorsed them and the affair was referred in the editorials who arrested Blaine and are holding him in jail here. Word was telephoned to Burley and the officers arrested Blaine, who is now in the officers' lockup in the county jail.

Deputy Sheriff Ogle, who is in charge of the jail, did the shorts and is now held on the charge of murder. The government has asked him in the interest of leniency to be held in the state of Illinois or Indiana. The Post-Crepe Tribune says:

"Taylor entered the jail and passed into the outer corridor for the purpose of letting the prisoners out to take a walk. When he reached the door he locked the door to the outside behind him, and then opened the locks that let the men from their cells. The bath tubs located in an alcove in the corner and after the men were released from their cells, the prisoner by the name of Charles Moore, called an automatic pistol on the deputy sheriff and fired twice. At this juncture a Greek prisoner grabbed the head of Moore and prevented him from firing again."

Taylor was hit by one of the bullets and fell to the floor. The ball penetrated the stomach, just under the heart, and did not come out.

"An amateur Mexican band, who were in the city, heard the commotion and gave the alarm. Sheriff Taylor happened to enter the building just at that time, and running to the steel doors, unlocked it. Moore and the Greek were still within the corridor of the sun, and Lowry drew his heavy revolver and raped Moore twice over the head with it, rattling him out of consciousness.

According to the prisoner, the gun was loaded with blanks, but Moore evidently had planned the affair for real days. After shooting Taylor he stepped back to the main door, and pointing the pistol at the balance of the inmates held there in the corridor, who were all within the depths of the den of sin, and Lowry drew his heavy revolver and raped Moore twice over the head with it, rattling him out of consciousness.

With this information, the Herald will, of course, proceed with such care as will restrain us in possible underhand methods.

In the meantime, the Herald remains officially designated by the state court as the paper in which final proof must be taken on the Salmon tract.
