Bulletin From State Headquarters Trade Local Company



State Veterinarian Reports Expenditures in Excess of Appropriation.

It actually cost the state of Idaho \$42,761.81 to operate the state veterinarian and veterinary and livestock department during the past two years for, while the total expenses of that department amount to \$42,761.81, not including the present amount of the present year, the department collected and remitted to the state treasurer \$10,000.00 for the estimated appropriation.

State Veterinarian V. C. White submitted to the state board of examiners through the state auditor the required statement from his department showing the expenses for the past two years and an estimated appropriation of expenditures for the coming year for 1915-16.

He also submitted a statement showing an itemized account of the expenditures from the previous annual fund appropriated by the last legislature together with an itemized account of the probable expenditures to carry on the preventive and curative work for the years 1915-16. The expenditures from this fund for the last two years amounted to \$25,750.00. He estimated the total expenditures for the next two years as \$77,040. He advocated repeal of the veterinary animal law.

The increase in expenditure for the past two years "is largely" due to the cholera epidemic among horses in this state to control which it became necessary to spend \$13,533.47 extra funds. The last legislature appropriated \$2700 for this purpose in 1910 for the permanent station at Moscow to manufacture cholera serum. The amount was exhausted by Oct. 1, 1913, and the department was then forced to spend to assist toward control of the epidemic, averaging to the extent of the state veterinarian was taken from the livestock fund and in exclusive of the \$5000 item appropriated by the legislature. The result added the \$2700 appropriated by the legislature was entirely inadequate.

That came up over the discovery of glanders among horses at Arco and it became necessary to test all the horses from Arco to Challis with the result 3155 horses were tested on 375 places and 116 reactors were found and destroyed. The cost of this work was \$2000.

The department had no money disposed of the glanders situation through the foot and mouth disease broke out among eleven head stock in this county and prevention had to be taken to prevent the disease from spreading. The cleaning and disinfecting of all stock cars in the state had to be accomplished together with all cars that have come into the state at an expense of \$500. It is pointed out the interstate requirements with reference to the movement of stock are very strict--Sanitary News.

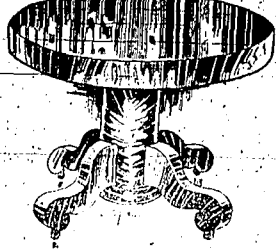

GOVERNMENT CROP REPORT

Negative Production of Varieties for the Northwest

To the November crop report just issued by the department of agriculture, the government undertakes to show the proportion in which the principal varieties of apples are grown in the United States and in the different states including Washington, Oregon and Idaho. According to its figures the Idaho is the leading variety throughout the United States generally and in Oregon, and the Jonathan in Washington and Idaho, while the Ben Davis ranks second throughout the United States, the Ben Hough in Washington and Idaho, and the Yellow Newtown in Oregon.

In a statement of the Wisconsin average annual production of the leading varieties by state, Washington is accredited with 2,000 bushels of Ben Davis out of a total of 25,000 bushels for the United States.

GOVERNMENT CROP REPORT

Mostly correct for the country as a whole, varies somewhat from actual conditions in the Northwest, according to more recent statistics prepared by the North Pacific Fruit Distributors. The department of agriculture estimates the 1914 apple crop for the United States at 258,892,000 bushels, which is an increase of 115,432,000 bushels over 1913. It also estimates the production for Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana at 2,500 bushels, which is an increase of 11,500,000 bushels. The distributor after their last survey, including all districts, by making the government's percentage leads in estimating the total crop of both commercial and non-commercial apples at 19,427,528 bushels.

It is estimated that the so-called central organization merely about 410 bushels, and all of the district or substantial shipping associations affiliated with it, somewhere between 310 and 312 more. These figures in all probability will be slightly higher in January.

Just how the fruit shippers of the Northwest are affected by the interest revenue tax which went into force December 1, is pointed out in a bulletin recently issued by the traffic department of the North Pacific Fruit Distributors. The hardest is not heavy.

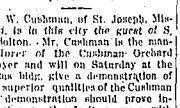
