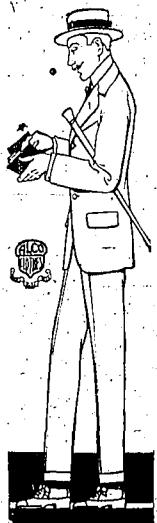

Avala, the Cuban consul general at Liverpool. No Warning Given. An investigation failed to reveal that the steamer was given warning of the proposed attack by the submarine which appears to have been lurking off the Irish coast, bent upon destroying the largest and fastest ship engaged in trans-Atlantic traffic. The lookout sighted the periscope of the submarine about half way and the next instant they saw the trail left by the torpedo as it flung on its course. The torpedoes tore through the hull, the missile pierced the liner's side, followed almost immediately by another which hit the deck with wreckage which littered the decks with wreckage. The course of the liner was at once turned shoreward. Four torpedoes apparently were fired at the liner, but only two found their mark. The loss of life caused by the torpedoes themselves and the explosions they caused must have been terribly heavy, but the exact number of bodies brought here bears evidence of the huge weight. Many of these bodies were seriously injured and more than a score died after they were removed to Cork and Queenstown hospitals.

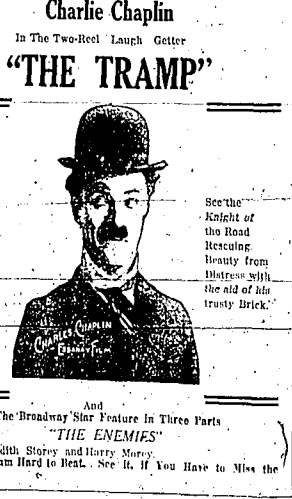

ROAD BUILDING

GUARD AGAINST ROAD ABUSE

Some Punishment Should Be Meted Out to Those Who Deliberately Cut Up Highways Built for Public.

You bought and paid for the road that runs by your doorway and the other roads by your township and county. That is, you paid your part in building the highway. If you are a property owner you paid that part directly in so many dollars and cents of road and bridge tax. If you are a renter you are not escaping. You are paying in rent and indirectly.

The road is your road. If it is cut up by the hauling of heavy loads on narrow-tired wagons you will have to stand for the trouble and discomfort of next winter, when the ruts are full deep. If you permit heavy rains to scour out the foundations of a wooden culvert and that culvert finally falls in or is washed out, you, as one of the daily users of that road, will be inconvenienced.

Most of our roads are dirt highways, writes H. S. Sullivan of Missouri in Farm Progress. Only a small, very small, percentage of the highways of this country are "hard roads." One hundred years from now we may have the beautiful "metal" highways such as are found in the older European countries, but this is a big land of ours. It is a country of magnificent distances, and the rock and concrete roads are going to be built very slowly.

It is the dirt highway that suffers from carelessness. Two or three men in a neighborhood can spoil more miles of highway than the remainder of the community can build. They are abusers of what other men build. They will pile on the heaviest load it is possible to pull and they never use the wide-tired vehicles that might help the wagon track stand up under the big loads.

Good or bad weather is all the same to them if they have something they want hauled. The sensible man knows that the use of a dirt road for heavy hauling in bad weather will spoil the highway. He won't do any teaming that he can avoid, but the road butcher will go right ahead. He will spoil his own roads and the roads of others.

There ought to be some punishment provided for the man who will deliberately cut up the roadway built by the community and paid for with the public money. Some states have laws providing punishment for the man who roves, who uses "kiddling" logs, who fills mudholes full of old ralls, chinks and poles, and who will pile a wheelbarrow full of rocks in a rut, to become a menace to all vehicles as soon as the road dries off.

But these laws are seldom enforced. Not from any lack of offenders or from the lack of knowledge as to just who the offenders are. Good people are afraid to complain against such men. They are found in every neighborhood and they go along for years in a domineering, overbearing manner, working all manner of injustices because they have their "bluff in" on the community. They are the gentry whose gates are closed, whose fences are all closed, whose dogs are "sheep killers,"

and who are known in the neighborhood as "bad men to have trouble with."

Most of our dirt roads are so abused in winter that they have to be partially rebuilt in the spring. This cuts up the road tax and the days of road work that might be expected to make the roads of this year better than those of last. Late fall, winter and early spring are seasons when fences are all closed and should be guarded against abuse. Why not try a little of "road conversation" in your neighborhood this year?

Bridges Should Be Painted. Recent investigations of the Illinois state highway department indicate that few highway steel bridges in that state are painted after their final completion and acceptance. Very serious corrosion results and is illustrated in a number of cases, says the Engineering Record. A serious factor in the corrosion of iron and steel is the use of salt to clear the roadway of snow and ice. This was considered at least partly responsible for the bad condition of truss members in a bridge fifteen years old.

POULTRY

MAKING WINTER FLOCK LAY

Unless Proper Quarters Are Provided Hens Will Not Produce Eggs— Mistake to Overcrowd.

(By H. L. KEMPNER, Missouri Experiment Station.)

Farmers lose thousands of dollars every year because their poultry is not properly housed. Unless proper quarters are provided, hens will not lay during the winter and it is a waste of feed and time to "hold" them over. The most common mistake is to keep more hens than the house will hold. A better plan would be to cull the flock and comfortably house those that remain. If a poultry house is roomy, it does no harm to keep the birds shut up on stormy days. The house should be dry. This is accomplished by having a good dry floor and a good system of ventilation. Above all, the quarters should be light and clean—the house a pleasant place for the hens to live in.

The Missouri College of Agriculture

gives the following prescription for hen-happiness and a full egg basket: Allow each hen four square feet of floor space.

Provide one square foot of glass to every 15 square feet of floor space. Locate the windows on the south side and place the tops not quite half as high as the house is wide.

Ventilate by placing one square foot of mullin to every 15 square feet of floor space, or by making a slot front similar to the cupolas in barns. Be sure the house is free from cracks and that there are no openings for drafts on the back, ends and roof.

Build a floor eight inches higher than the surrounding ground. Fill in four inches of coarse gravel, then two inches of clay and then two of dirt. This will make a dry floor.

Provide eight to ten inches of roosting space and one nest to every six hens.

Cover the floor with a foot or eighteen inches of straw. Feed the grain in the straw so as to encourage exercise.

SELECTION OF BIG LAYERS

Many Difficulties in Choosing High-Producing Breed—No General Agreement Yet as to Type.

There are several difficulties that surround the selection of high-producing hens. The individuals are small. Their production, compared with cows, for instance, is also small. The standard yearly profit for each hen is somewhere around one dollar. One cannot spend a great deal of time on each individual hen. So that from a general farmer's standpoint, trap nests, the one accurate way of getting at the big layers, are out of the question. The fact that the individuals are so small also makes it difficult for even those who have given the matter considerable attention to select by type. There has been no general agreement as to what the egg type is.

POULTRY NOTES

Have a double floor in the pigeon house.

Furnish abundant sunlight in the pigeon loft.

Feed a little hempseed to pigeons that are "going light."

The present prices for squabs are likely to be maintained for years to come.

Squabs rarely do better than this season—a fine egg stimulating feed in cold weather.

Be careful not to overfeed the first week of fattening. It is better to feed lightly three times a day.

The more heavily you are feeding, the more demand there is for charcoal. Make it an article of everyday diet.

The name "thruster" is derived from the fact that the bird usually splits open the middle and the halves protrude.

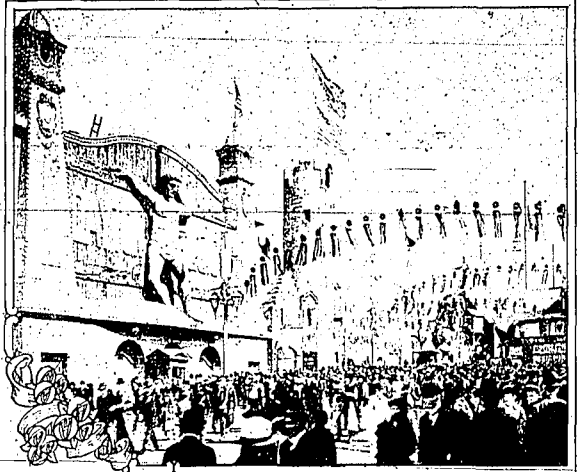

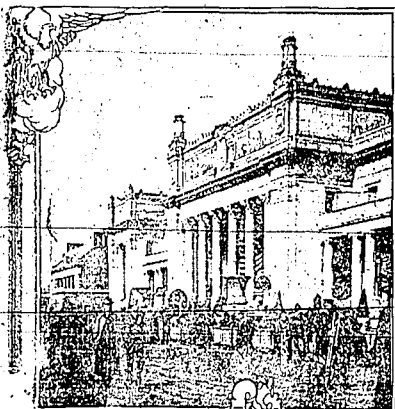

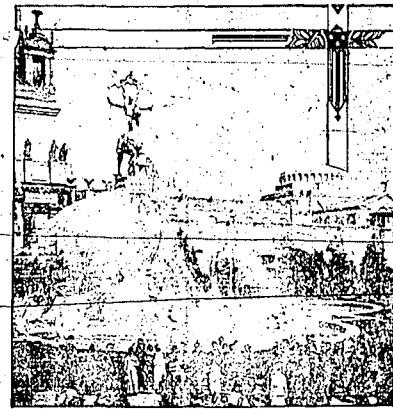

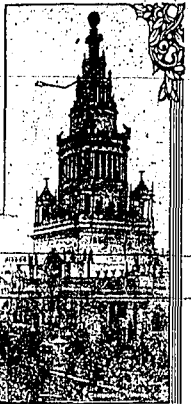
Fountain of Energy When President Wilson Opened the Panama-Pacific Exposition
