Enters European Fight as Enemy of Austria and Germany

Declaration Made Saturday—Hostilities Begun Monday With Attacks by Austria on the Border

Twin Falls Section No Longer In Arid Region

RAINFALL OF USE MONTH GREATER THAN TOTAL YEARLY FALL

Twenty-Four Out of Twenty-Five Days of the Month. Rainy for Twin Falls Section.

With a total precipitation exceeding that for many normal years, so far as the government reports will show, the history of this section, even the old timers have an story which will duplicate the records of the twenty-five days of the month with only twenty-five days of the month.

Estimates place the total precipitation for the month at about an inch. Government reports will probably show slightly more. This for an arid country, where the liquid water is so scarce, is a miracle. Out of a total of twenty-five days, twenty-four have had at least some rainfall. Today, the twenty-fifth, being the first clear day for the entire month.

But the rain has been worth a million dollars to the ranchers of this section of the Snake river valley and to the settlers of the Salmon river tract. It has meant their salvation in giving the sprouting crops of grain and grass a thorough soaking and thus conserving the small amount of stored irrigation water until needed forty to fifty days hence. The cloudy weather has also allowed the moisture to sink in and thus give the best kind of spring growth to the many fine farms surrounding the town of Twin Falls.

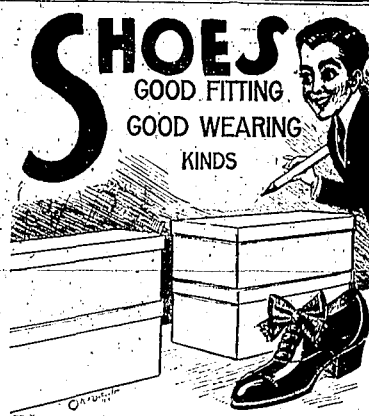

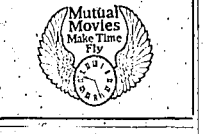

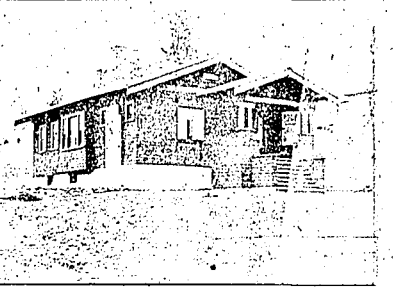
